Mrs. Neely Jennings was a child of tender age living with her parents near Pride in a half-dugout at the turn of 1900's. Her daddy had gone to "town" and she and her mother and family were alone at that particular night.

At a witching hour of the night, alone, Mrs. Vaughn awoke to find matches being lit at both windows. There was only one way out (the front door) and it would obviously be foolhardy to take that course.

Next morning there were signs of two men, burned matches, general vandalism of the barn, the calves were with the cows and the ranch was in a general mess.

A Texas "blue norther" is one example. Jewell Jennings nee Vaughn was born in Coke County in 1898 the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Vaughn.

It was late in the fall of 1903 when a history making "blue Norther" hit here. Jewell's father saw the cloud in late afternoon and had his wife and children to "protect" the precious drinking water from freezing.

By morning the country was in a deep freeze with temperature far below zero. A Mr. Slaughter owner most of the deeded ranch land and his cattle were piled six feet high along the drift fences.

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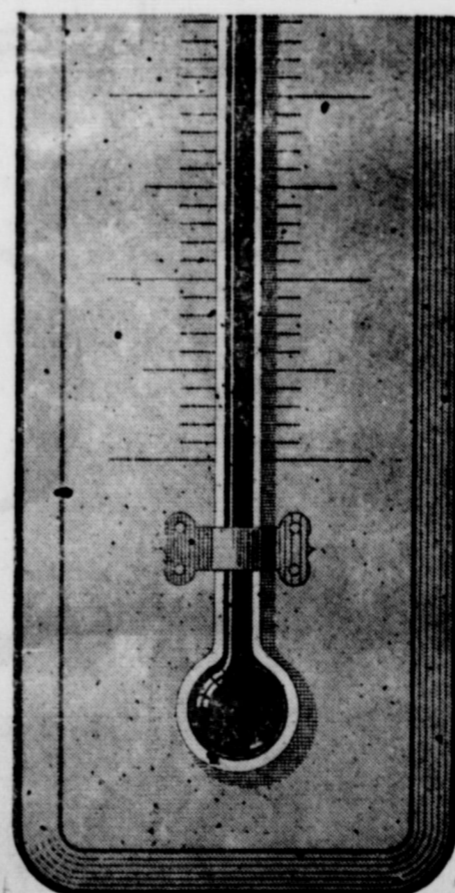
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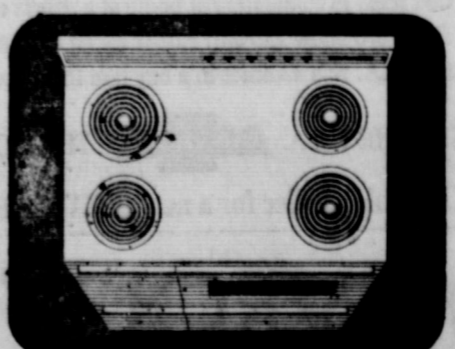

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:

If you have ever visited an Internal Revenue Service office you may have seen some taxpayers waiting for an audit with an anxious frightened look on their faces. The good tax folks are not in business to frighten taxpayers. Internal Revenue has the job of seeing that you pay only the tax that you owe by helping you get all the deductions you are entitled to. They don't want to collect any more tax than you owe. It is a business transaction. There is no need to be frightened.

EARLY CLAIMS FOR BENEFITS URGED HERE

O'Donnell and Area residents 65 or over who have not yet applied for Social Security benefits are advised to file a claim regardless of whether or not they are planning to retire in the near future. John G. Hutton, Lubbock, Social Security district manager, explained that it may be to the benefit of an applicant to file when reaching age 65 to protect his Social Security rights. A number of people who applied last year found that they had lost some benefits by not applying earlier," he said. "We have found that the best way for a person to protect his Social Security benefit rights is to apply at 65 whether or

not he intends to go on working. Even if benefits are not payable right away, there's an advantage in having your claim already approved when you actually retire".

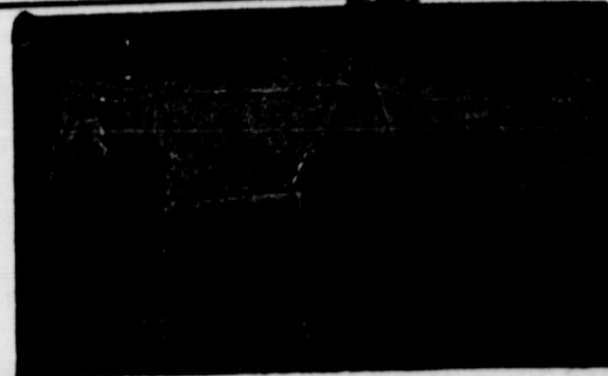

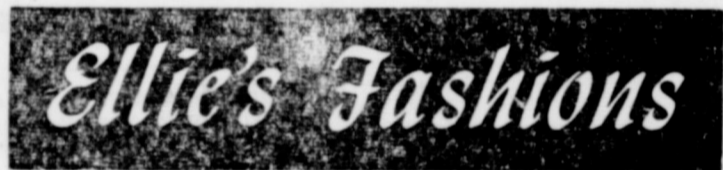

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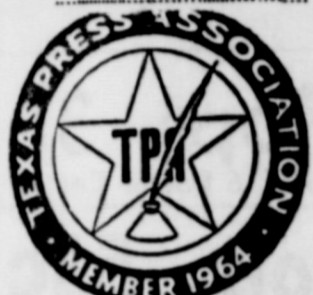

ACCENT ON HEALTH...

Ten killers are at large in Texas. These killers aren't bandits or criminals - they are the ten leading causes of Texans' deaths. The ten killers account for a giant share of 82,692 Texans who died in 1963.

The latest statistics released by the State Health Department categorize, profile and dissect the leading killers. This is how they stack up on paper. Heart disease took the lion's share... one out of every three deaths in the State. National statistics also show the same leading cause of death. Apoplexy - or stroke, is classified as the third most deadly, with 11 percent of the death total. Accidents, as the fourth leading killer, claimed 5,999 lives, or seven percent of the total. Death due to accidental causes takes the largest percentage of lives for the age groups between one and 45. Disease of early infancy, fifth in sequence, takes its toll... of course below the one year marker. Pneumonia ranks sixth in the line-up of killers claiming five percent of the deaths. General arteriosclerosis, diabetes mellitus and congenital malformations are the seventh, eighth and ninth cause of death, respectively. Suicide is the tenth leading cause of death. It first ranked tenth in 1955. Deaths from suicide increased

County selected service business grossed \$730 thousand in 1963. Lynn County's 58 service establishments had total receipts of \$730 thousand in 1963, a decrease of 8 percent from 1958, according to a report of the 1963 census of business just released by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce. The last previous census of business covered operations during 1958.

The service trades in the census of business included those providing: personal services to individuals; miscellaneous business service; auto repair and other auto services. Also included were motion picture projection and distribution business; motion picture theatres; other amusement and recreation services; and hotels and motels.

The selected service trade establishments in the county employed 81 persons (exclusive of proprietors) and had a payroll of the year of \$135 thousand. The state as a whole included 60,879 establishments with receipts of \$1,879.3 million.
