Baptists Vote To Rebuild Fire-razed Church Sunday

\$110,000 Insurance Was Carried On Building

Sunday morning Members of the First Baptist Church here voted at the morning service to rebuild the fire razed new church destroyed by fire shortly after noon Saturday. A special collection of more than \$6500 was taken up at the morning service and more is still coming in.

Mrs. Noble Reports Fire

Shortly after 12:30 p. m. Saturday Mrs. J. Mack Noble noticed waves of smoke rolling over the new building. She at first thought it was gin smoke and then called the fire department. By the time of the arrival of the Fire Boys, the flames were leaping from several windows and the auditorium and educational building seemed a mass of flames. Calls were put in for the Tahoka and Lamesa fire departments and both towns promptly responded. It seems likely the fire had been burning thirty minutes or so before discovery to generate such intense heat. One of the most heart breaking points of the fire was when the New England style steeple fell in with the auditorium roof at about 1 p. m. The fire was brought under control at about 1:30 and the Baptist Church across the street to the east and neighboring houses were out of danger due to "wetting down" by the firemen. Portions of the fire gutted structure continued to smoke until about 3 p. m.

Members Weep At Fire Scene

During the unfortunate fire, members of the church stood helplessly by watching their dream church tumble to ashes and wept unashamed. At the Sunday service there was hardly a dry eye in the congregation. The beautiful new church was to have held their first services on Nov. 26th with dedication services to follow in 2 weeks.

The new church was said to have been one of the most beautiful on the South Plains and estimated cost of the structure at the time of the fire was \$85,000 but actual value was more as much had been donated. An insurance policy of \$110,000 was carried on the structure divided between five insurance companies.

Insurance May Pay Rebuilding

The church hopes that the insurance will rebuild the church to the point which was reached at the instant the fire started and the church will suffer little financial loss. However, building material will be higher and more difficult to secure than last spring when the building was started.

The exact cause of the blaze will probably never be fully determined. As far as the Index can learn a workman left the building at about 11:30 a. m. and all was well at that time. The interior had recently been painted and the fresh paint probably added to the ease with which the flames spread. Apparently the blaze started in the upper story or in the roof of the structure.

The new church construction was supervised by a building engineer from Abilene and costs of the church were met by members contributing with the exception of a \$35,000 loan from an insurance company. Fortunately no major church furnishings had been installed at the time of the fire however the church kitchen had been furnished and a piano for the educational building had been moved in.

Aside from the always useless waste that any fire loss entails, the greatest loss will be the time element. However, the daily increasing costs may bring a loss.

AROUND THE HOUSE

To keep peanut butter from losing its oil and getting too dry, store the jar upside down. Once it does get dry, though, you can soften it up by adding a little peanut oil, olive oil, or salad oil, and mixing it thoroughly. Or, mix some horse-radish with it, and you'll have it moist again. In fact, the horse-radish improves the taste of the peanut butter so much, it's a good idea even if the peanut butter isn't too dry.

CHRISTMAS SEALS

Tuberculosis Is Nation's Most Costly Communicable Disease

In its never-ending battle against tuberculosis, the National Tuberculosis Association again this year continues its sale of Christmas seals for funds with which to carry on its program of education, medical research and rehabilitation against the nation's most costly communicable disease.

The story of Christmas seals in this country is the story of the battle against a disease that takes more than 40,000 lives a year in the United States.

BUY AND USE CHRISTMAS SEALS

In this country since 1907. In that year, the late Miss Emily P. Bissell put on a seal sale in her home town of Wilmington, Del., to raise funds to help a group of doctors continue the treatment of a small number of tuberculosis patients. When a Philadelphia newspaper threw its support behind the sale, success was assured and \$3,000 was realized. Miss Bissell's goal had been \$300.

THE IDEA was imported from Denmark. In that country, Christmas seals had been sold in 1904, the year the NTA was organized, because an obscure postal clerk, Einar Holboell, thought people should help needy children at Christmas time. He conceived the idea of a Christmas seal on letters as a way to raise money. The first seal funds in Denmark were used to build a sanatorium for tuberculous children.

Jacob A. Riis, an American citizen of Danish birth, proved the bridge over which the seal traveled from Denmark to America. He wrote an article about the Danish seal which was published in this country, and suggested that the idea be adopted. Miss Bissell remembered the article when she was looking for a means of raising funds and acted on his suggestions.

THE AMERICAN Christmas seals are sold by local tuberculosis association which retain approximately 75 per cent of the proceeds. The balance is forwarded to the state association which, in turn, allocated six per cent to the national. Thus, 94 per cent of seal funds are used to support tuberculosis control programs within the state where the money was contributed.

The national and local associations are fighting tuberculosis on four board fronts:

1. Education—getting true facts about tuberculosis and its prevention to large groups of people.
 2. Case finding—searching out tuberculosis wherever it is and seeing that treatment is provided for persons with active disease.
 3. Rehabilitation — helping the tuberculosis patient adjust to his changed condition and prepare for useful living when his disease is arrested.
 4. Medical research—aiding qualified investigators, through annual grants, in their continuous search for more knowledge about tuberculosis.
- This is the broad program of NTA that benefits when Americans buy Christmas seals.

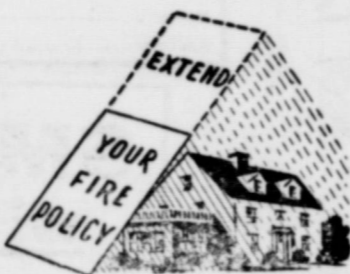

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Turkey, Pumpkin Pie Will Vie for Honors At Thanksgiving Table

AS THE FROST gathers on the pumpkins, it's time to start making plans for the bountiful feast of Thanksgiving. Here's an excellent opportunity for parading the colors of fall as well as the fruits of harvest.

Smart homemakers will plan the menu around simple foods, part of which can be prepared a day or two before the day of Thanksgiving. Then, they, too, will be able to be thankful for planning which didn't force them into the kitchen for the whole day.

With the menu I've planned for this special occasion, you may clean and stuff the turkey the day before. Refrigerate both bird and stuffing before putting together to avoid spoilage. That leaves only the roasting to be done on Thanksgiving.

- *Chestnut Stuffing (For 16-pound bird)**
- 1/2 pound butter
 - 1 pound chestnuts, cooked and chopped
 - 3 quarts toasted bread cubes
 - 1 1/4 teaspoons salt
 - 1 cup chopped celery
 - 1/4 cup chopped onion
 - 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
 - 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning
 - 1 1/4 cups hot water

Melt butter, and add bread cubes, salt, celery, onion, parsley, chestnuts and seasoning. Mix thoroughly. Add hot water to moisten.

When bird is stuffed, estimate the weight of bird by adding 25 per cent to the dressed weight so that total cooking time may be determined. Lay, breast side down, in a shallow baking pan, in a V-shaped rack. Bake uncovered at 325° half the estimated baking time, then breast up until the cooking is completed. Brush the skin lightly with unsalted fat, such as lard, to prevent blistering. If desired, cover with a cheesecloth, lightly moistened with fat, to prevent drying out. Remove the cloth during the last half of the roasting period if the bird is not evenly browned. Roast a 10-16 pound bird 18-20 minutes per pound.

***Glazed Onions (Serves 8-10)**

- 3 dozen small white onions
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1/2 cup stock or water
- Salt and paprika
- 2 tablespoons sugar

Peel onions, cook five minutes in boiling salted water, drain thoroughly, and turn into small baking dish with butter, stock or water, salt, and paprika. Cover and bake in moderately hot oven (375°) half an hour; then remove cover, sprinkle with sugar, and allow onions to brown.

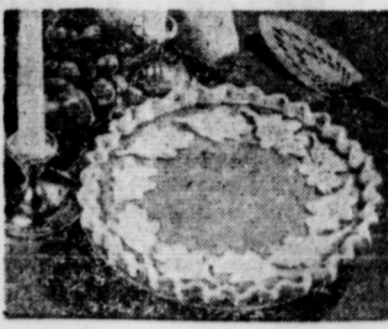
- *Cranberry Sweet Potatoes (Serves 8)**
- 2 cups cranberries, chopped
 - 1/2 cup raisins
 - 1/2 cup walnuts, chopped
 - 1 tart apple, peeled and sliced



The regal bird, tender and brown from the oven should be placed on a platter large enough to hold it easily. Bright red cranberries in peach halves give it a lovely garnish.

LYNN SAYS: Here's How You Can Decorate Holiday Table

If you have a gourd, set this at the center of the table on a display of autumn leaves. Fill the gourd with fruits such as shining red apples, tangerines, bananas and grapes. Beautifully colored leaves can be used on the plates if you are serving chilled vegetable juice or fruit juice as a first course. Place leaf on plate and the glass of juice right on top of the leaf.



Pumpkin pie appears at the table dressed up with leaves cut from thin slices of cheese. Make a leaf pattern from cardboard, place on thin slice of American cheese and cut out with sharp knife.

- *Perfection Salad (Serves 8)**
- 2 tablespoons gelatin
 - 1/2 cup cold water
 - 2 cups boiling water
 - 1/4 cup mild vinegar
 - 1/4 cup pineapple juice
 - 1/4 cup sugar
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1 cup finely shredded cabbage
 - 2 cups finely diced celery
 - 3 tablespoons diced pimiento or red pepper

Soften gelatin five minutes in cold water. Add boiling water and stir until dissolved. Add vinegar, pineapple juice, sugar and salt. Chill. When almost set, stir in vegetables lightly. Turn into previously wet individual molds and chill. Unmold, garnish with lettuce, mayonnaise.

- *Custard Pumpkin Pie (Makes 1 9-inch pie)**
- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
 - 2 cups, cooked or canned pumpkin
 - 1/4 cup sugar
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1/4 teaspoon ginger
 - 1/4 teaspoon cloves
 - 1 1/2 cups evaporated milk, top milk, or light cream
 - 1 9-inch unbaked pastry shell

Combine eggs and pumpkin and blend. Mix sugar, salt, and spices and add to pumpkin mixture. Blend in evaporated milk. Pour into pastry shell. Bake in a hot oven (425°) 15 minutes. Reduce temperature to moderate (350°) and continue baking 45 minutes or until knife inserted in center comes out clean.

- *Mincemeat Custard Pie (Makes 1 9-inch pie)**
- 1 9-inch unbaked pastry shell
 - 1 1/2 cups mincemeat
 - 3 eggs, slightly beaten
 - 1/4 cup sugar
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 2 cups milk
 - Nutmeg
 - Cheese

Line a 9-inch pie pan with pastry, fluting edges. Spread mincemeat evenly over pastry. Combine eggs, sugar, salt and milk; pour over mincemeat. Sprinkle with nutmeg. Bake in a hot oven (450°) for 15 minutes. Reduce heat to moderate oven (350°) and bake 30 minutes more, or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Serve warm with cheese.

Let the youngsters have fun making place cards if you're serving a crowd. In one corner of the card, have them paint a brown-yellow or green-red leaf or some fall flower such as chrysanthemum. Make food platters as pretty as possible. For instance, the turkey platter should have sprigs of parsley on either end of the plate. Rub a row of fruits on either side, such as crabapples sitting in peach halves, red jelly in pear halves, or cranberry jelly cut-outs on pineapple slices.

Sing Something Purple

The fact that music can bring certain colors to mind has long been recognized by psychologists. Two of them, Henry S. Odbert and Theodore F. Calumet Farm Makes Profit Grazing Calves

Farmers Use Larger Amount Of Income for Fertilizer

Farmers spend a large portion of their income for fertilizer than they did before the recent survey revealed. The amount used, however, still is no more than amount that could be economically.

A fairly general standard farm should be using a value of 100 to 200 pounds strength fertilizer per acre of 160 tillable acres would require 12 tons of per year.

Feeding of proper grain will mature heifers and start them on the road to production.

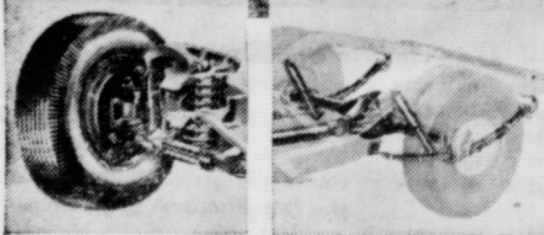
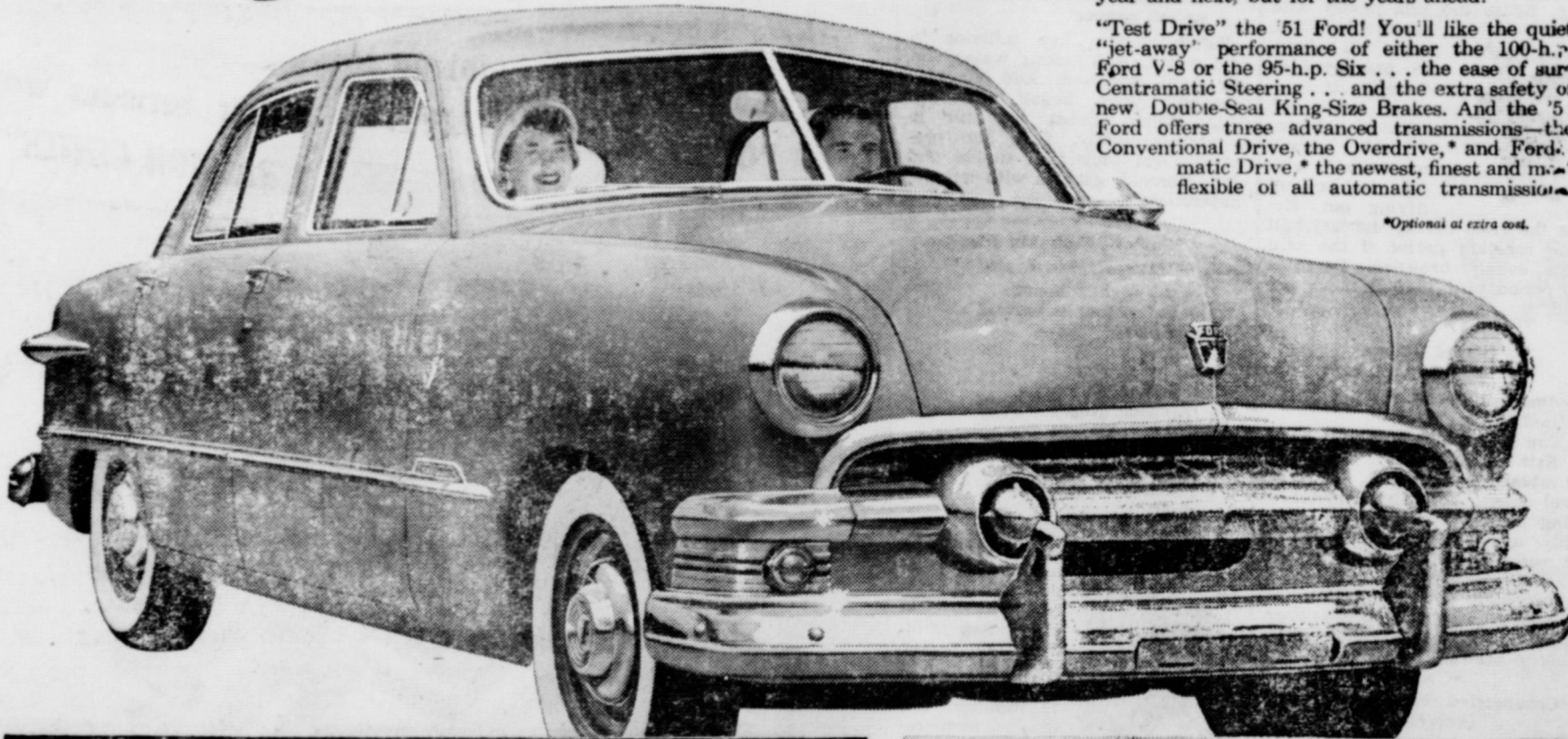

Cattle Class Prizes Largest Ever Offered

The 51st International Live Stock Exposition will be held this year in the International Amphitheatre at the Chicago stock yards from November 25 through December 2.

Increased prize money for the show should help to encourage the exhibition of top livestock from both the United States and Canada, exposition officials reported.

Prizes for all cattle classes will be \$61,370, the largest total ever

offered. Many prize increases made in other breeds to mark the occasion of the golden jubilee show of 1949 are retained this year.

Dr. A. B. Weber, of Kansas State college, will judge the steers again this year. He is the only American to judge these classes since the exposition departed from the custom of having foreign judges two years ago.

Other features in connection with the international that have been familiar in the years since 1900 include the grain and hay show, recognized as the world's largest competitive showing of farm crops.

Farm Expenses Increased Five Fold in Past Decade

Farm expenses have increased almost five-fold over the past decade and not many farmers would care to return to the "good old days" of low expenses—if they had to accept the level of income that accompanied them.

This increase in cost of farm operation has been accompanied by some phenomenal changes in the composition of expenses. Machinery expense made up only 14 per cent of the total in 1935-39 while in 1947-49 it accounted for 21 per cent. Also, farmers are spending proportionately more for feed, fertilizer and crop expense than they spent 15 years ago.

These changes have been accompanied by a substantial increase in man labor efficiency on farms.

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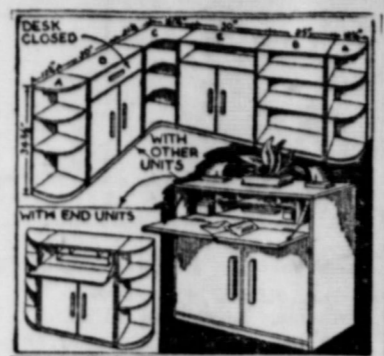

GERM-WARFARE:

Infected Rats Found
 One of the most frightening and horrible discoveries of the Korean conflict was made public when the army disclosed it had found five thousand rats and mice inoculated with deadly plague and other germs in a secret laboratory near Pyongyang.

The army reported more than 5,000 rats and mice were inoculated with such diseases as bubonic plague, encephalitis, and eurirawaddy fever immediately after the U.N. landing at Inchon.

Only 380 of the carriers were alive when discovered and 200 of these were mad from hunger. None were believed to have been turned loose or to have escaped from their sealed cages, though fleas from the dead animals might spread disease.

The project was reported under the supervision of a Russian woman scientist who fled northward after the landing.

The animals were kept in cages in groups of from two to 20. They were well fed and their furs sprayed with a chemical that encouraged the multiplication of fleas.

The discovery will provide a clue to the type of germ-warfare experimentation Communist countries might be carrying out and give the free nations of the world an indication as to what horrors the Communist will resort to.

SPAIN: Bon Is Lifted
 After four years the United Nations had lifted its diplomatic ban against the Spanish government. The action accomplished two objectives:

1. It withdrew the 1946 recommendation to all U. N. members that they withdraw ambassadors and ministers from Madrid.
2. It lifted the 1946 ban against admission of Spain to the U. N.'s specialized agencies.

The United States, however, will not return an ambassador to Madrid. President Truman said publicly recently he would not appoint one.

The U. N.'s resolution left intact the condemnation of the Franco regime for its aid to the Axis during World War II.

The United States voted in favor of removing the boycott which was spearheaded by Catholic Latin American nations.

Revolutionist

 Pedro Albizu Campos, Harvard graduate, leader of the Nationalist party that threw Puerto Rico in turmoil, was arrested after the attempt to assassinate President Truman. FBI agents were trying to connect him with the attempt on the President's life.

WORLD WAR III: Thunder Can Be Heard
 The capitals of the world trembled because many observers believed they heard the thunder of World War III on the horizon.

The thunder was caused by Communist China which adopted the attitude that "American intervention in Korea signals an intention to invade China."

All Communist dispatches and broadcasts hammered out the same recurrent themes:

1. The Chinese Communists will oppose "American imperialist aggressors" with concrete action.
 2. American use of the atom bomb will mean retaliation in kind.
- Observers were further troubled because the Chinese evidently meant business. From three to six Chinese divisions had been identified in action in Korea against United Nations forces. They forced U. N. troops to make withdrawals, and, from early reports, intended to continue their march south.

No one in his right mind can overlook the fact that China could be the strongest nation in the world. The Chinese Communist armies already are estimated at 5,000,000 men of whom 1,000,000 are in Manchuria. Peiping recently announced organization of 5,500,000 armed militia, bringing the country's armed strength to more than 10,000,000.

Its industrial might never has been exploited, but could, within a few years, become one of the greatest in the world. China's war supplies at present are furnished in great part by Russia. There is no reason to believe they will be discontinued.

Observers believe that if China is determined to do so, she can take over Korea. It would mean a defeat for United Nations forces and the first phase of World War III. The answer seems to be hidden in the brain of Mao Tse-tung, China's Communist leader.

MIRROR Of Your MIND

A Mother's Job Is Motherliness
 By Lawrence Gould



Do we ask too much of mothers?

Answer: No, says Dr. James Clark Moloney — we're more apt to ask too little. The fact that a baby needs more "mothering" in his first two years than some "independent" mothers are capable of giving does not make him able to develop normally without it. "We must not lose sight of the child's needs just because some mothers are unable to provide the basic necessity of motherliness."

We must educate prospective mothers to accept and to enjoy the intimate relationship that Nature means them to have with their babies.

Money is Life
 YOU got rid of something quite valuable to get hold of that piece of money. Time, certainly; you are poorer than you were 24 hours ago, poorer in time, for you have 24 hours less to live than you had then. Look at it in another way: You put out a certain amount of energy for this bit of money. You plowed a field or you raised some chickens or you laid some pipe or you taught some children or you sold a bill of goods. Whatever you did to earn the money, it tired you a bit. You put out the work, — and the money came back to you. Money is time, money is energy. Furthermore, money is knowledge.

Why is a skilled workman paid more than an unskilled one? Not because he works harder or sweats more. He is paid more because his work is better, and his work is better because he knows more. Now, what would life be without time, energy or knowledge? Not much! So if a robber ever says to you: "Your money or your life!" you would be quite correct (even if untactful) if you said, "My dear fellow, you repeat yourself; money is life!"

Life Comes from God
 AMONG the many differences between a Christian and a non-Christian is this: the Christian knows too much to say, "My life is my own, to do with as I please." Consider those three elements of life: time, energy, knowledge. Time itself is certainly God's gift, the Creator's gift. None of us can make a moment of it. We can accept it, use it; or we can waste it; but it was given us in either case.

Energy cannot be created by you or me. Each of us has a certain (and a different) amount; we inherit it, but only God in the long run is the source of energy. To make a long story short, life is God's gift, not our creation. It is a blank page on which we write, an empty field in which we can sow as we will. But though the writing and the sowing are our own, the page and the field are God's. So the Christian recognizes this as the central fact of his life: I belong to God.

Now if that is true it is also true that our money is also, just as much as life itself, ours only as a trust from God.

Stewardship
 "STEWARDSHIP" is the word which recognizes God's right in our lives; it is the word which describes the principle of life for those who honor God as source of all they are and have. When the proverb-writer says, "Honor God with thy substance," he has just said, "in all thy ways acknowledge him." No man is likely to do what is right with his money who habitually does wrong with his life. No man is going to admit his partnership with God in money matters who does not confess God to be the Lord of all his life.

Now there are two principles brought out in our Scripture about stewardship of money in particular. One is this: God looks on what we have, not on what we haven't. A widow who gives one tiny coin, if that is all she has, is more generous than a millionaire who has just given half a million to Charity. Second is the principle of willingness. The Lord loves a cheerful giver. Sour givers, regretful givers, stingy givers, no. But the Lord does love the man who gives with a smile.

It isn't how much you give, it's the fact that you give, it's HOW you give. Is your heart generous in the first place?

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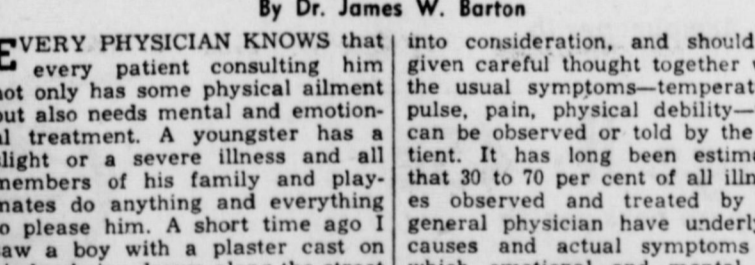

 "STEWARDSHIP" is the word which recognizes God's right in our lives; it is the word which describes the principle of life for those who honor God as source of all they are and have. When the proverb-writer says, "Honor God with thy substance," he has just said, "in all thy ways acknowledge him." No man is likely to do what is right with his money who habitually does wrong with his life. No man is going to admit his partnership with God in money matters who does not confess God to be the Lord of all his life.

Now there are two principles brought out in our Scripture about stewardship of money in particular. One is this: God looks on what we have, not on what we haven't. A widow who gives one tiny coin, if that is all she has, is more generous than a millionaire who has just given half a million to Charity. Second is the principle of willingness. The Lord loves a cheerful giver. Sour givers, regretful givers, stingy givers, no. But the Lord does love the man who gives with a smile.

It isn't how much you give, it's the fact that you give, it's HOW you give. Is your heart generous in the first place?

KEEPING HEALTHY
Every Patient Wants Emotional Care

EVERY PHYSICIAN KNOWS that every patient consulting him not only has some physical ailment but also needs mental and emotional treatment. A youngster has a slight or a severe illness and all members of his family and playmates do anything and everything to please him. A short time ago I saw a boy with a plaster cast on his leg being drawn along the street by two playmates. For several days afterward, the boy, wagon and playmates were all together. Then I noticed the boy sitting on his wagon, the cast removed, and the playmates not present. The boy looked disappointed because he was no longer receiving any attention.

This looking for sympathy and attention is not confined to children. Many grownups, with a slight or severe illness, also expect it. In *Texas State Journal of Medicine*, Dr. A. Hauser, Houston, states that nearly all diseases or illnesses include an emotional or psychic side which should be taken into consideration, and should be given careful thought together with the usual symptoms—temperature, pulse, pain, physical debility—that can be observed or told by the patient. It has long been estimated that 30 to 70 per cent of all illnesses observed and treated by the general physician have underlying causes and actual symptoms for which emotional and mental disturbances are responsible.

Dr. Hauser suggests that the physician should always have in mind that mental and emotional factors must be considered in the treatment of the case because treatment of the emotional and mental effects on the illness means a quicker recovery of the illness itself and a shorter convalescence.

The above is in line with the new idea of getting the patient up early after operation and also up early after other illnesses where the heart can stand it. The very fact that he is on his feet again arouses the fighting instinct within him.
