PLENTY FLU VACCINE NOW

Austin — Asian influenza vaccine is now so plentiful that doctors and druggists can obtain it in almost any quantity, exactly as they obtain any other drug product. This means that you can now be vaccinated at your own discretion, regardless of your age, job or physical condition.

In the early days of the flu epidemic, vaccine was so scarce, even though six drug manufacturers were commissioned to produce it and worked 24 hour shifts at the task, that available supplies had to be distributed to states according to population, with populous states getting the lion's share.

Today, however, reports coming from state health departments and from manufacturers indicate that supplies are catching up with demand so that controls on allocations to states are no longer necessary.

Predicting that the Christmas mail this year will set an all-time record, even exceeding the record set in 1956, Postmaster Hal Singletin, 3rd announces his 1957 "Mail Early For Christmas" campaign today.

With Christmas less than a month away, the Postmaster reminds us, "It is later than you think." Most folks have a tendency to wait until December rolls around before they give their Christmas mailing a thought.

The Postmaster further suggests that right now is the time to take the following steps — check your Christmas card list very carefully, make sure that each address includes the full name, street and number, city, zone and state.

He said, also, that it is a good idea to stock up on heavy wrapping paper, sturdy corrugated cartons, strong cord, and paper adhesive tape for use in securely packing and wrapping your Christmas gifts. If you would like to include your Christmas card or letter inside your gift package, just add the appropriate First Class mail postage to the postage for the package itself, thus insuring simultaneous arrival of your gift and greeting.

They are the 1957 state winners in their special 4-H projects, and their award is an expense paid trip to the Congress. They will be among the 2,000 participants attending the five-day event.

Jane Williams, 17, of Lubbock county, demonstrated expert canning ability to win the state 4-H Canning award. Utilization of home grown foods was one of her achievements.

In 4-H for seven years, Jane canned nearly 1,300 jars of fruits, vegetables, soups and relishes. Jane completed successfully 12 other projects, and made over a hundred food exhibits and demonstrations. She became junior 4-H leader four years ago and is prominent in church, and school activities.

Jane will be the guest of Kerr Glass Mfg., donor of her trip. Safety is the byword of Albert Gunter, 17, of Lamar county. Carrying safe practices of living and working into his home and community won the Congress trip provided by General Motors for his exemplary efforts in the 4-H Safety program.

Albert has been safety-minded since he joined the 4-H'ers in 1949. He gained fame for his most recent safety program. With another 4-H'er, Albert stressed "Gun Safety" in many demonstrations before about 250 persons. "No one knows too much about the rules of safety," says Albert.

He was vice president and council delegate of his local 4-H Club, and junior leader of the county 4-H group.

Preparing and serving food in an especially attractive and appetizing way helped win the 4-H Food Preparation award for Cinda Jane Ellis, 18, of Dallas county. Her all-expense trip is provided by Betty Crocker of

General Mills. A 4-H'er for seven years, Cinda Jane prepared nearly 250 meals unassisted, helped prepare more than 1,200 others and was responsible for almost 600 additional dishes. She gave many demonstrations and talks on food preparation.

Cinda Jane served three times as president of her local club, and also was elected secretary of the district 4-H organization. Four times leader in foods awards, her work in 11 other 4-H projects also was outstanding.

Skill and safety in operating a tractor earned state-wide recognition for Elmer Freese Jr., 16, of Hale county. He won an expense-paid trip to the national Congress where he will be honored along with other tractor champions. His host is Humble Oil and Refining Co., donor of his award.

Free Speech Issue In Court Proceeding

LINCOLN, Ill.—Free speech was the issue here in a contempt of court case in which nearly 600 persons faced possible fines and jail sentences.

The defendants, many of them members of a reform group known as the "Good Government Council of Logan County," were cited for contempt for petitioning Circuit Judge Frank M. Bevan to replace a state's attorney in a case involving the prosecutor's friend.

Judge Bevan said the petition contained "odious, defamatory language concerning an official of this court." State's Attorney Edwin C. Mills.

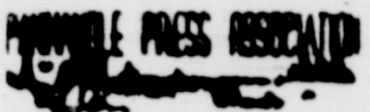
Members of the Good Government Council contended Judge Bevan could not hold them in contempt and said if the prosecutor felt he was defamed by the petition he could sue them in a civil court.

The case arose when, as a result of action taken by the Good Government Council, Justice of the Peace Vincent Jones was charged with illegal diversion of funds collected in overweight trucking fines. Mr. Jones was charged with perjury, embezzlement and malfeasance.

The council followed up the case with a petition asking that Mr. Jones, be replaced by a special or assistant prosecutor.

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Keys to the City Come in All Kinds Of Sizes, Meaning

NEW YORK CITY—First tenants in all new apartment houses New York will receive "keys" to the city, but they are not like those to unlock any doors.

The "keys" are on the letterheads of welcome distributed over the signature of the mayor and consist of a simple code, or key, to aid newcomers in finding their way around the city.

Presentation of some sort of key to a city is an ancient custom even if the keys will not unlock much as a street numbering system. Many cities engage in the practice when distinguished visitors arrive at city hall.

It was not always a happy occasion. In ancient times keys to the gates of a walled town were sometimes handed over to a conqueror by defeated citizens, and the ceremony was not one that called for rejoicing.

In the Middle Ages, however, the custom became more or less honorary. With the gates of European cities locked at night it was practical and convenient to give keys to particularly distinguished or wealthy and trusted visitors so that they could come and go as they pleased at any hour without challenge from the guard.

The custom of giving keys to the city has even been given reverse twist. In Washington, District of Columbia, commissioners greeted the visiting Mayor of Lima, Peru, with the traditional key and was surprised when the South American official returned the favor and presented him with a beautifully worked silver key to Lima.

Various cities give various kinds of keys. In Bismarck, Dakota, distinguished visitors receive a suitable inscribed silver key carved from the timber of the city flag pole where one of the flag's stars once flew. In a similar way, one of the keys given to the mayor of Portland, Oregon, is a key to the city's history.

Purple Heart Veteran Deported as Wetback

SAN ANTONIO—Immigration authorities sent a 21-year-old Purple Heart veteran of Korea back to Mexico as a "wetback" recently. The veteran, Cpl. Alberto Gonzalez of Monterrey, Mexico, was sent in an immigration bus to Laredo, Tex., to be put off in Mexico. Immigration Officer W. L. Meulhouse said he had entered the United States on a dead man's birth certificate before he joined the American army three years ago. Wetbacks—named for those who swim the Rio Grande—are illegal entrants.

The G.I. Forum, which works on the problems of Latins in San Antonio, assigned an attorney, Richard Casillas, to the case with instructions to "go all the way to the state department if necessary" to allow Mr. Gonzalez to live in the United States.

The immigration office said he was being allowed to leave the country "voluntarily" and predicted he could get a permanent visa from the American consul in Mexico that would allow him to come back in time for the wedding.

Mr. Gonzalez was discharged from the army at Fort Sam Houston.

He joined the Army Sept. 17, 1948, and enlisted for another three years on the same date last year. Vella Sanchez, 20, his fiancee, said he had spent a year in Korea, with headquarters of the Eighth army.

"He was wounded in the hip and got a broken ear drum," she said. "He has the Purple Heart, five campaign stars, the United Nations ribbon, the Korean service ribbon and a unit citation."

Spare Parts for Body Are Available to Man

NEW YORK—Spare parts for the human body still can't be ordered from a mail-order catalog. Nevertheless, the advance of medicine during the past few years has made available an imposing array of replacements for damaged or ineffective organs.

Following the development of the blood bank, first of the spare-part repositories, ingenious surgeons have found ways to maintain arteries for eyes, bone, cartilage, methods and veins. There are now methods for transplanting whole organs from one individual to another, and for constructing replacement organs from tissues taken from the patient's own body.

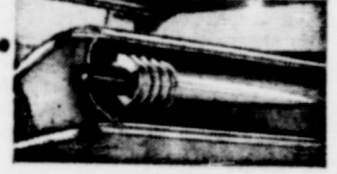
Some man-made spare parts, such as the artificial kidney, are already coming into clinical use, while others, among them the mechanical heart and plastic heart valves, are well along in the experimental stage.
