### Cotton Harvest Is Rapid

Ideal harvesting weather this fall has seen cotton estimates made earlier this season, jump by a wide margin. Revised estimates for this area give 40,000 bales to approach a year even better than '44. Open weather, sunny and cool at nite, has seen all the green fruit maturing without frost damage. Fields are a white blanket of unharvested cotton. The acute labor shortage endangers the fiber crop from lashing winter rains and winds.

The hospital will be open to the  
of all qualified physicians pro-  
vided these doctors are approved  
by the Board of Directors. Over-  
sight by doctors will terminate  
Open Hospital rights. Members  
the privilege of using the doc-  
tor of their choice. They must pay  
for hospitalization.

Hospitalization fees paid into the  
hospital provide funds for the op-  
eration and maintenance of the  
hospital. With a dues paying sys-  
tem the Board of Directors will  
know how to plan the budget of op-  
eration, how to set salaries of em-  
ployees and have a knowledge of  
how much money the hospital is go-  
ing to make. This is a system  
which will provide funds that will in-  
crease the modern and efficient operat-  
ion of the hospital.

Profit made in the hospital  
will be used to expand the faciliti-  
es and provide additional services  
for the members, or the hospitali-  
zation fees will be reduced.

Benefits and rates apply to  
all members. The family consists  
of father, mother, and all unmar-  
ried children living at home pro-  
vided that any other dependent living  
with them and dependent upon them  
for food, clothing and shelter, they  
are eligible for benefits as provided  
by the annual fee.

A medical examination is nec-  
essary to become a member or to  
renew membership, except in cases where  
member does not pay the annual  
hospitalization fees at beginning  
membership and later decides to  
renew himself of said benefits. In  
such cases he must make applicat-  
ion to the Board of Directors of  
the hospital.

**QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**

How is the Hospital to be  
financed and who will own it?  
It is to be built and equipped  
by the \$100 that each member  
pays and the one third of cost  
is to be furnished by the Fed-  
eral Government under the Hill-  
man Bill. The members will  
own the hospital and operate it  
through its Board of Directors elect-  
ed by the members annually.

What is the purpose of the  
Memorial Hospital?  
The purpose is to make possi-  
ble hospitalization for its mem-  
bers of this 3-county area at  
least. It will provide hospitali-  
zation for the 9,250 residents of  
this area and the towns of  
nearby area if space is available.

Who manages the affairs of  
the hospital?  
A Board of Directors of seven  
members which meets from time  
to time as the need requires.

Who hires the manager and oth-  
er employees?  
The Board of Directors hires  
the business manager. The busi-  
ness manager hires the employees  
subject to confirmation of the  
Board.

What becomes of any profits  
made by paying the expenses of  
the hospital?  
It is the purpose of the Board  
of Directors and the members to  
defray the necessary expenses  
and not make profit. Profits  
belonging to the Association belong to  
the Association owning the  
hospital. Such funds may be used  
to provide for service or to buy  
equipment.

Who chooses a physi-  
cian?  
A Member chooses a physi-  
cian. The physician will have off-

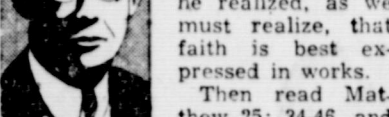

## Religion in Practice

Lesson for October 26, 1947

SUNDAY'S lesson takes us to one of the practical Christian preachers of the New Testament. Please open your Bible to the Epistle of James, and read especially the first two chapters.



Dr. Newton

James was a man of great faith, but he realized, as we must realize, that faith is best expressed in works.

Then read Matthew 25: 34-46, and for the devotional lesson, read Matthew 7: 15-27.

When you shall have read these passages, you will then be ready for the consideration of religion in everyday life.

**A Cup of Cold Water**  
 WHAT someone will be asking, can I do to show my desire to be of actual service, in the name of Jesus. Jesus tells us. He says that whosoever shall give a cup of cold water in His name is doing the will of God.

We live in a world that poignantly waits for a cup of cold water. I have just returned from another trip through Europe. I was there in 1946, and I felt that that life in Europe had reached the last possible expression of need. But this past summer I was startled to witness a still greater need.

The question that immediately came to mind as I observed conditions in Germany and England and other countries this past summer was this: What can we do to meet such need? And the answer was ready at hand—give them what you have, in the name of Jesus.

**Doers of the Word**  
 JAMES makes much of practical religion in everyday life. He tells us that we are to be doers of the word, and not mere sayers of the word, or hearers of the word. And here he means the Word of God—the will of God.

Is there a misunderstood boy in your class? Is there a girl in your class at school who suffers from some bitter criticism? This lesson would suggest to every Christian boy and girl to go in sympathetic understanding to such neighbors and help them to overcome these handicaps. Thus we become doers of the will of God.

**Living Our Religion**  
 WHAT we are determines what people think of our religion, not what we say about our religious life. James tells us in Sunday's lesson that faith without works is dead. It is that very truth that our generation so much needs to get hold upon.

We have many perplexing situations in our world. Racial differences, differences regarding capital and labor, and so forth and so on.

How are these problems to be solved? By resolutions? We know that many very pious resolutions have been adopted concerning these problems, but still the problems remain.

One Christian in any given community who applies the teaching of James to everyday life will start a train of events that will add up to the solution of any problem, social, economic or what not. We must translate our beliefs into action.

**The More Excellent Way**  
 JAMES goes on to assure us that when we undertake faithfully to live our religion, we may confidently claim the promise of God that if any man lack wisdom, let him ask of God who giveth liberally unto all men, and upbraideth not.

The conclusion of the whole matter, therefore, is to face life as we find it, taking into account the actual facts, and boldly and confidently tackling the job in the assurance that the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ is always sufficient for any and every situation.

The more excellent way of the Golden Rule is the answer to the whole matter. But the Golden Rule is impotent until it is translated into action.

And the best of it all is that it actually works. When someone asked Morrison what Christianity was doing for China, he replied: "Christianity is changing China into a community of God." That is precisely what this lesson will do for your community, if you apply its teachings to life as you find it.

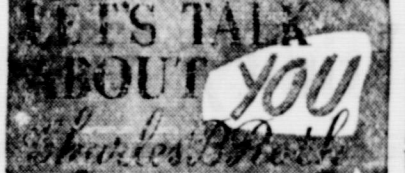
Stepping out to discuss the problem with a friend, thought Stella, or

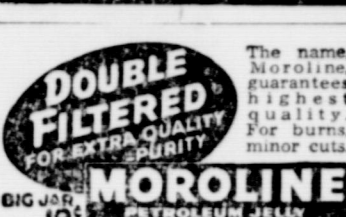

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### Farm Hints That Pay In Better Products

The Cornell results are in line with earlier tests of vitamins in calf scours in Michigan and Ohio. Even though the use of vitamins lacks encouragement, there is promise in another direction—the sulfadiazine. Sulfadiazine has been found helpful. Sulfathiazole, one of the faster acting sulfas, which has been used against dysentery in humans, also has been used successfully in calf scours treatment. Tests, a combination of sulfathiazole with kaolin and pectin was more effective than either sulfathiazole or sulfadiazine alone.

Don't use binder twine for bales. Use paper twine instead. When binder twine is used pieces of the fiber break off and get in the wool. These fail to take color when dyed. Who loses? The sheepman.

### Scientists Develop New Slow Fertilizer

A new, slow-acting nitrogen fertilizer which feeds crops over a long growing period has been developed by USDA soil scientists. The product, a series of combinations of urea and formaldehyde, is called "unafarm." Since both principle components are in short supply, commercial production will be small for a short time. Early reports from field and greenhouse have been very satisfactory.



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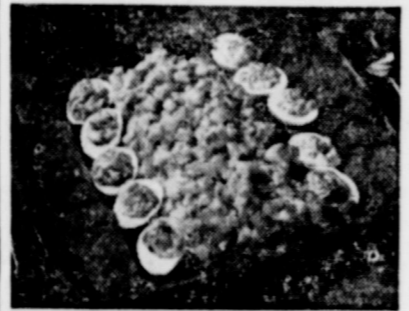

1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 c. onions, chopped  
1/2 c. celery, diced  
1 tsp. celery salt

Cook potatoes in their jackets until tender. When cold, skin and dice. For dressing combine sugar, mustard, milk, vinegar and salt; beat thoroughly. Toss together lightly potatoes, onion, celery, celery salt and salad dressing to moisten. Chill before serving. Add hard-cooked egg if desired. Serves 6.

### How to Defrost and Clean Your Home Freezer

HOME freezers can be easily defrosted and cleaned if a few simple rules are followed, points out the Country Home editor of Capper's Farmer, one of the best known farm magazines.

Here are some of her suggestions:

For a complete cleaning, remove foods and place them in a cardboard container, or wrap them in newspapers. Scrape the frost from strips and liner walls with a spatula or piece of hard wood. Do not use an ice pick or any other pointed sharp instrument.

Clean the exterior regularly with a mild soap and water or a liquid wax which adds luster and protects the surface. Once a year—perhaps in the late spring—clean the surface of the condenser with a stiff brush or vacuum cleaner attachment.

To shut down a home freezer, turn it off. Remove the contents. Defrost and clean the interior, mopping water from the bottom. Leave the lid open so air circulates inside.

### Tempting Breads

There is no aroma more appetizing-provoking than that tantalizing one which comes from the oven in which bread is baking. And what is more of a treat than eating the bread itself?

Piping hot muffins add interest to the simplest supper; hot coffee cake is a delight to both early and late risers, while thick and thin slices alike—as long as they are of homemade bread—make superb sandwiches for school lunches or late snacks.

Many homemakers don't bother to make homemade bread because they think it is a time-consuming procedure. Actually, it's far simpler than mixing a cake or even cooking a vegetable, and the pleasure of it is so great, it's more than worth the little effort.

Orange Oatmeal bread is good when sliced thin for sandwiches. Moist and tender, it keeps its flavor easily and slices readily. The flavor actually improves when the bread is kept for a day before being cut.

#### Orange Oatmeal Loaf.

(Makes 4-by-7-inch loaf)

- 2 1/2 cup evaporated milk
- 1 cup orange juice
- 1 teaspoon grated orange peel
- 1 cup quick-cooking oats
- 1 cup sifted flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- 1 egg
- 1/2 cup molasses
- 2 tablespoons shortening, melted

Mix milk, orange juice and grated peel and add to oats. Let this mixture stand for an hour. Sift flour, salt, baking powder, soda and sugar. Add chopped nuts. Beat egg into oatmeal mixture. Add molasses and beat thoroughly. Stir in melted shortening. Add flour mixture and stir just to blend. Pour into a greased loaf pan and bake in a moderate (350-degree) oven for about 50 minutes, or until done.

#### Pecan Wheat Muffins.

(Makes 12 to 16 muffins)

- 1 cup sifted whole wheat flour
- 3/4 cup sifted white flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup evaporated milk
- 1/2 cup water
- 3 tablespoons melted shortening
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans

Sift first four ingredients twice, returning bran in sifter to sifted mixture. Beat egg, add brown sugar, milk and water. Stir until mixture is dissolved, then add shortening. Stir liquid quickly into dry ingredients. With the last few stirs, add chopped nuts. Pour batter immediately into greased muffin tins. Bake in a hot (400-degree) oven about 20 minutes.

#### Swedish Pancakes With Berry Sauce.

(Serves 4)

- 1 cup sifted enriched flour
- 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 cup milk
- 1 tablespoon melted shortening
- Sweetened berries or jam

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Combine egg, milk and melted shortening. Mix well. Add to flour mixture. Mix smooth. Using 2 tablespoons of batter for each cake, bake on hot griddle or skillet. Spread each cake with butter, then with berries or jam.

#### Raised Luncheon Muffins.

(Makes 1 dozen 3-inch muffins)

- 1 package yeast, compressed
- 1/4 cup lukewarm water
- 1/4 cup milk
- 2 eggs
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup melted shortening
- 1 teaspoon grated orange rind
- 2 1/4 cups flour, sifted

Crumble yeast into lukewarm water to soften. Scald milk. Cool. Beat eggs in mixing bowl. Add sugar, salt, shortening and orange rind. Mix well. Add cooled milk and 1 cup flour. Beat smooth. Add softened yeast. Mix well. Add remaining flour. Beat 2 minutes. Fill greased muffin pans half full. Let rise in warm place until doubled (about 45 minutes). Bake in a moderate (375-degree) oven for 18 to 20 minutes. Date and Pecan Ring is an attractive as well as novel bread.

#### Date and Pecan Ring.

- Dates, halved
- Pecans, halved
- Honey
- 1 cup sifted white flour
- 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup unsifted whole wheat flour
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup pitted dates, chopped
- 1/2 cup pecans, coarsely chopped
- 1 1/2 cups rich milk
- 2 tablespoons vinegar
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 2 tablespoons shortening, melted

Grease an 8-inch ring mold thoroughly. To prepare decorative topping, alternate halves of dates and pecans on bottom of mold and drizzle with honey. In a mixing bowl, sift flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Add whole wheat flour, brown sugar, dates, nuts and mix thoroughly. Combine milk and vinegar. Add shortening, then add beaten eggs. Stir in dry ingredients. Mix just until flour disappears. Pour into prepared ring mold and bake in a hot (425-degree) oven for 15 minutes, then reduce heat to moderate (350-degree) and continue baking for 20 to 25 minutes.

### Erosion Prevented by Sound Practice Growing Crops Help in Saving the Soil

By W. J. DRYDEN  
The late spring floods and heavy rains made many farmers realize that losses from water erosion can be serious. Michigan State col-



Soil specialists list four rules to reduce water erosion on farm land. Never leave the ground bare longer than necessary. Vegetation is important over the winter. As the slope of the land increases, use more crops of grass and small grains and fewer cultivated crops. If medium sloping land is cultivated, practice strip cropping, slope seeding and tilling, and sod waterways and terraces. Keep the soil in as high a state of fertility as possible. Add lime where necessary, use commercial fertilizers and add humus through animal manures, green manures or crop residues.

Grass planted in October, make a green lawn that lasts winter and dies down when summer grass revives in the spring.

Total farm real estate in the United States on January 1, 1947 had an estimated value of 58.6 billion dollars.

The value of livestock on United States farms January 1, 1947 is estimated at \$11,978,850,000

On January 1, 1947 the value of hogs on United States farms was 40 per cent greater than in January 1946 although the number of hogs on farms decreased by 4.4 million head.

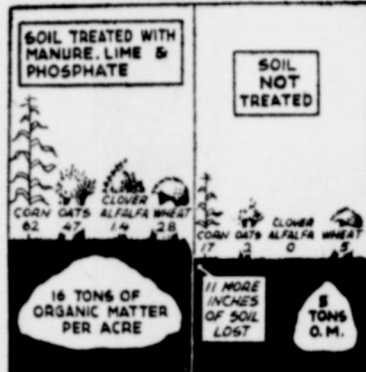

### Soil Building

The difference between soil building and soil mining is shown in the chart below. Soil building means increasing the soil's organic matter and plant food supply and maintaining high crop yields. It means feeding the soil and letting the soil feed the crops, rather than trying to feed each individual crop.

The comparative results shown here were obtained at the Ewing soil experiment field in Illinois. One plot has had no soil treatment since the field was established in 1910. The other plot has had large amounts of



lime, phosphate and potash to get heavy stands of deep-rooted legumes. Corn stalks have been returned to this plot. The rotation on both plots has been corn, oats, clover and wheat.

Crop yields covering a four-year rotation tell the story. Corn production on the fertilized plot was four times greater than on the untreated field; oats nearly four times and wheat about eight times greater. Clover yield on the fertilized plot was 1.9 tons per acre; the untreated plot is too acid to grow legumes.

Despite the greater amounts of nitrogen and organic matter used in producing the higher yields, the fertilized plot still contains 4 1/2 tons more organic matter and 460 pounds more nitrogen than the untreated field.

### Boy Helped Solve Problem Of Bridging Niagara Falls

When the first bridge over Niagara Falls was planned in 1848, the problem of getting a cable from the American to the Canadian side was solved by offering \$5 to the first person who could make a kite carry a string across the 800-foot chasm. 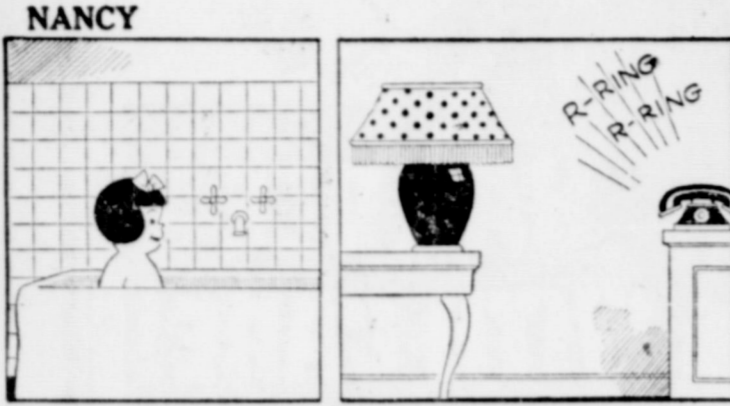

Let's Bake a Cake That's Feathery Light!  
(See recipes below.)

## Parade of Cakes

When the weather is cooler and we're spending less time outdoors, there's more call for mouth-watering cakes. A cake sometimes seems to top off evenings at the perfectly when the youngsters are at their school chums in for an evening or if guests drop in unexpectedly.

Week-ends, too, probably are full of entertaining if the week is a busy one, and it's time the old custom of baking a cake on Saturday afternoon were reinstated. Then, no matter who comes in that evening or for dinner or tea on Sunday, have a cook's treat to set before them.

There are loads of cakes to please every palate, from feathery-textured cakes to delectable combinations of banana and pineapple cake, as well as spiced dark devil's food or light-as-down, delicate whipped cream cake.

First, let's start off with a hot cake, easy on the budget and quick to mix. Top it with a broiled

**Hot Milk Cake.**  
2 eggs, well beaten  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup sifted cake flour  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon baking powder  
1/2 cup hot milk  
1 tablespoon butter  
Beat eggs until light and thick. Add sugar and continue beating until very light and thick. Sift baking powder and salt. Fold egg and sugar mixture all at once. Melt butter in hot milk and fold into cake. The addition of flour and milk should take no longer than one minute. Pour into well greased pan and bake in a preheated, moderate (350°F.) oven 30 minutes.

**Broiled Icing.**  
1/4 cup brown sugar  
1/2 cup butter, melted  
1/4 cup cream  
1 cup coconut  
Combine ingredients, blending thoroughly. Frost cake and return to hot oven or broiler just long enough to brown.

**Banana Cake.**  
1/2 cup butter  
1/2 cups sugar  
1 cup banana, mashed  
1/2 cup dates, chopped  
1/2 cup crushed pineapple, drained  
1/2 cups cake flour  
1/2 teaspoon soda  
1/2 teaspoon baking powder  
1/2 cup nutmeats  
1/2 cup sour milk  
Cream sugar and butter thoroughly. Add bananas, dates, pineapple, and blend thoroughly. Sift dry ingredients three times and mix with nutmeats; add sour milk alternately with creamed mixture. Bake in a moderate oven (350°F.) for 40 minutes. Frost with caramel icing.

**Whipped Cream Cake.**  
1 cup whipping cream  
2 eggs, well beaten  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 teaspoon lemon extract  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
1 1/2 cups flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
Whip cream until it holds shape, then fold in eggs and sugar, mixing lightly. Add lemon extract and vanilla. Add sifted dry ingredients. Bake in two buttered layers in a moderate (375°F.) oven for 25 to 30 minutes. Put together layers with additional whipped cream.

**Ham 'n Cornbread** go a long way toward making any meal a success. Add finely diced ham to cornbread batter before baking. Serve with salads, soups and souffles for a flavor-bright combination.

A never-to-be-forgotten rule when baking cakes, is to allow all the ingredients, especially the fat, eggs and liquid to come to room temperature before mixing. Their "compatibility" is increased tremendously and the texture of the cake improved.

boil with the milk, stirring gently. Boil without stirring until 232°F. or the soft ball stage. Add butter, remove from the heat and cool to lukewarm. Beat until thick and creamy and of a consistency to spread.

### Chocolate Potato Cake.

- 1/2 cup butter or substitute
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 egg yolks, beaten
- 2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon cloves
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup hot mashed potatoes
- 2 squares chocolate, grated
- 1 cup walnuts, chopped
- 4 egg whites
- Rind of 1 lemon, grated

Cream sugar and butter; add egg yolks. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk. Then add lukewarm potatoes to which the chocolate has been added and allowed to melt, and the walnuts. Fold in beaten egg white and lemon rind. Bake in layers or in a flat loaf tin in a moderate oven for 35 to 45 minutes.

### Spiced Devil's Food.

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 1 square chocolate, melted
- 1 1/2 cups cake flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 teaspoon cloves
- 1 cup milk

Cream butter and sugar thoroughly, add eggs and chocolate. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk. Bake in buttered pans in a moderate oven for 30 to 40 minutes. Frost with mocha icing:  
2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar  
1/4 cup butter or substitute  
4 tablespoons cold coffee  
1 square chocolate, melted  
Cream together butter and sugar; add melted chocolate and coffee. Beat until smooth and of a spreading consistency. Spread in between layers, on top and sides of cake. Sprinkle with chopped nuts.

### Whipped Cream Cake.

- 1 cup whipping cream
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
