Tech Agriculture Head Is Young Farmer Speaker

Dr. W. F. Williams, head of Agriculture Economics Dept. at Texas Tech, was the guest speaker at the monthly meeting of the O'Donnell Young Farmers Thursday night.

Marketing Margins (the difference between farm prices and retail prices) for agriculture products, was the subject. Dr. Williams assured the group that the different phases of marketing—processing, distributing, storing and others are not receiving above normal returns. He explained the main reason for the increased margin is consumer demand for more services such as packaging, grading, nice store facilities, and uniformity, among other things, has caused higher retail prices.

Dr. Williams said today agriculture is in a treadmill because of the advanced technology taking place. New ideas and techniques are used to cut costs and increased production takes place causing over-production and hence lower prices. He feels the best way to help farm prices is for the farmers to band together to push research and promotion of agriculture products.

A business session followed the program with 25 members attending. Refreshments were served by the O'Donnell Young Homemakers.

First National Bank of Tahoka this Sept. 20 reported deposits totaling \$8,645,725.81, an increase of \$1,218,682.77 over the October call last year.

First National Bank of O'Donnell had deposits of \$1,636,458.87 this September, an increase of \$80,027.34 last October.

Wilson State Bank's deposits this September were \$3,357,916.02, which were \$228,267.67 above the report in October last year.

The number is needed Internal Revenue for identification purposes in connection program payments. Farmers have already 3435-A with the county their social security identification numbers for the information last fall to each producer who receives program payments. Producers who direct program payments have not yet filed the however, are asked to forward

ward the information to the county office by Oct. 1, 1966.

For 1966, ASCS must report to the Internal Revenue Service any sight draft payments of \$600 or more under direct payment programs. This includes the Agricultural Conservation Program; the feed grain, wheat, and cotton programs; the wool incentive payment program; and others.

And, beginning January 1, 1967, and each year thereafter, all such sight draft payments made to producers under these programs, will be reported to IRS without regard to the amount. Producers will be advised annually of the program payment reported to IRS, beginning with payments made in 1967.

Identifying numbers are already being used in payment-reports which banks and other paying agencies make to IRS, as required under the Internal Revenue Code.
