The business office is in the front of the attractive building which is located just south of the Assembly of God Church. Over all investment is about \$225,000 and the exchange has over 400 subscribers.

Jack Burton, a veteran of over 20 years experience in the telephone industry, is the resident technician. The dial system has been perfected for about 15 years but only in the last ten to fifteen years has it been used in rural exchanges. Jack showed the index man thru the plant and it will be worth the time of all to see the "workings" of the plant. The local plant is said to be as modern as any in the nation.

PROPOSED POSTAL HIKES SET TO BEGIN IN JULY

Proposed increases in money order and special delivery fees starting July 1st have been announced by Postmaster Gen. J. E. Day.

No changes in special delivery fees for first class mail are planned. Special delivery fees for second, third and fourth class matter will be increased by 10 cents in each of the fee brackets. The increases for this service are expected to yield about \$2.5 million in additional postal revenue. On the money order plan some 15 million in new revenues is expected.

Money orders up to \$10 will be 20c, up to \$50, money orders to \$50 will be 30c, up to \$100, orders to \$100 will be 35c, up to \$500.

Are you among the many persons past retirement age who have not applied for social security benefits because you are still working?

Because of a change in the law you may now be eligible for some payments during the year even though you are still employed or self employed and earn well over \$1,200 a year.

Beginning this year, most people can earn more money and still get social security checks for some months in the year. In fact under the new law, a person always has a larger gross income from earnings and benefits when he does not limit earnings to \$1,200 a year.

As in the old law, you can earn up to \$1,200 and get benefits for all months of the year. No matter how much you earn in a year, you are still considered "retired" in any month you do not earn over \$100 as an employee or aren't active in your own business. Also for all months in which you are at least 72 years of age, you will be considered retired, regardless of how much you earn.

Beginning with 1961, retirement insurance benefits payable to you (or your family) are withheld at the rate of only \$1 in benefits for each \$2 you earn between \$1,200 and \$1,500. On earnings over \$1,500, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$1 earned.

If you have passed your 65th birthday but have delayed filing application for social security benefits because you are still working, it might pay you to visit your nearest social security office. The Lubbock office is located at 1616 19th St. and is open Monday thru Friday (except national holidays) from 8:30 a. m. to 4:30 p. m.

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security office will be in O'Donnell on Wed. May 24th in the Elementary School at 2 p. m. and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to social security.

TO TAKE LIVESTOCK COUNT

Acting Postmaster Jeane Singleton reminds rural patrons of the O'Donnell Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mrs. Singleton explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way USDA gets a true sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are: C. E. Sumner, Rt. 1, Hal Singleton, 3rd, Rt. 2 and J. M. Noble, Jr., Rt. 3. Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions," Mrs. Singleton said.

A. G. Nance is doing well after major surgery. He has returned home.

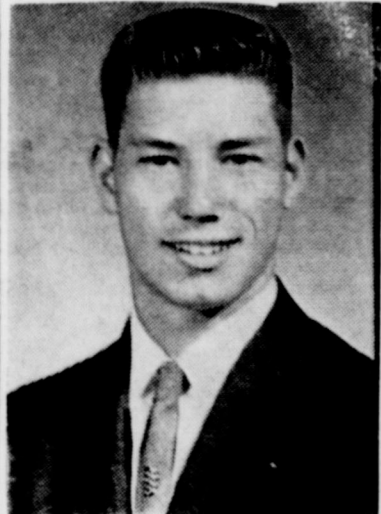

Daniel's answer to House Bill 727, the retail sales tax measure, is a new tax proposal to raise \$166,500,000 a year.

The Governor's measure offered the Legislature an opportunity to delete the books and go home and provide a cushion of \$20 million more than what the governor said was needed to erase the general fund deficit. The plan would pay for a new year appropriation bill and give school teachers a maximum \$800 a year pay raise.

His conclusion about the sales tax bill was "If I let this bill pass without my signature you would be begging me by Christmas to call a special session to straighten it out."

He said flatly that he would veto HB 727 even if it were presented to him with substantial changes.

The Governor's bill proposes to raise the money thru eight ways:

1. A natural gas pipeline tax, 2 percent gross receipts in intrastate and percentage allocation of interstate receipts, an increase from 1-4 of 1 percent to \$12,200,000 a year
2. A 2 percent excise tax on motor and power driven objects and parts, including all types of vehicles, boats, appliances, etc. \$32,100,000
3. A 2 percent excise tax on jewelry and watches, revising the present law to coincide with federal definition. \$3,400,000
4. A 2 percent excise tax on construction materials with exemptions on component ingredients used in manufacturing. \$31,500,000
5. A 2 percent consumer tax on utility bills. \$31,500,000
6. A stock transfer tax of 1 percent of value with division of definition. \$8,000,000
7. A tax of 1 cent per bottle of soft drinks, 1 cent per bottle on liquor, graduated tax rates on liquor and wine, a total source of new revenue of \$38,800,000.
8. A 2 percent tax on restaurant meals above \$1 for a new tax income of \$9,000,000 a year.

IT'S THE CUTE NAME OF — GRANTHODOROS TURICATA

Austin — A pesky little insect, capable of going for months without food, is a sour note in the otherwise sweet symphony of a Texas spring. It is a soft shelled tick, transmitter of relapsing fever. This time of year they will be out in force over most of Texas — at the very season when the natural human inclination is toward picnics and exploratory sojourns into the Great Outdoors.

State Health Department entomologists say the pernicious, fever laden parasites can bite, feed, release their hold and drop to the ground without their human victims ever knowing they have provided them with a blood meal. Many cases of relapsing fever undoubtedly occur in Texas without ever coming to official attention. Ticks pick up the germ while feeding on infected wild rodents, become infected themselves and then pass it on to humans during a feeding process. Soft shelled ticks are close relatives of the hard shelled ticks which spread spotted fever, typhus, a type of encephalitis and other miseries.

Once successfully diagnosed, relapsing fever readily responds to modern treatment by a private physician.

WHISTLE UP A RAIN —

A fast moving thunder storm with some hail last Thursday afternoon gave up varying amounts of moisture over the area. The fall ranged from one fourth to one half inch. In most cases the rain was not sufficient to make the good subsoil moisture meet. About half the area cotton remains unplanted and cotton that is up is spotty in stands and not growing off. Crop prospects are currently poor. April and May have been unusually dry and cold.

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 8th day of June, 1961, in Lynn County, Texas, in obedience to an ELECTION ORDER entered by the Commissioners' Court of Lynn County, Texas, on the 8th day of May, 1961, and which order is as follows, to-wit:

ORDER FOR BOND ELECTION
The State of Texas,
County of Lynn:

ON THIS, the 8th day of May, 1961, the Commissioners' Court of Lynn County, Texas, convened in regular session at the regular place in the Courthouse in Lynn County, Texas, the following members of the Court, to-wit: Curtis Morgan, Commissioner, Precinct No. 1; Woodrow Brewer, Commissioner, Precinct No. 2; Mrs. Beatrice McLaurin, Commissioner, Precinct No. 3; L. K. Nelson, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4, being present, and among other proceedings had by said Court, were the following:

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court of Lynn County, Texas, deems it advisable to submit to the resident qualified property taxpaying voters of said County, the following proposition for the issuance of bonds of said County in the amount and for the purpose hereinafter set forth:

THEREFORE, be it ordered by the Commissioners' Court of

Lynn County, Texas: That an election be held in said County on the 8th day of June, 1961, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election there shall be submitted to the qualified electors who own taxable property in said County, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the following proposition for the issuance of bonds, to-wit:

"SHALL the Commissioners' Court of Lynn County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said County in the principal sum of THIRTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$35,000) to mature serially at such time as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court of said County, not later than twenty (20) years from the date thereof, to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FOUR AND ONE-HALF PER CENTUM (4½%) per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity, to purchase, build or construct buildings and other permanent improvements to be used for annual exhibits or horticultural and agricultural products and/or livestock and mineral products of the County, pursuant to authority conferred by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution, and Article 2372d-2, Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes, as amended?"

That said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly Chapter 1, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, and all persons who are legal voters of Lynn County, Texas, and who are resident property taxpayers of said County, and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. C. S. Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"For the issuance of \$35,000 Exhibition Building bonds and the Levy of Taxes in Payment Thereof."

WHEREAS, on the 8th day of May, 1961, a petition signed by more than two hundred (200) qualified, property taxpaying voters of Lynn County, Texas, was presented to the Commissioners' Court of Lynn County in regular session, and which petition is in the following words, to-wit:

To the Honorable County Judge and Commissioners' Court of Lynn County, Texas:

WE, THE UNDERSIGNED, qualified, property taxpaying voters of Lynn County, Texas, each of whom pays a property tax in the county and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, DO HEREBY PETITION AND REQUEST your Honorable Court to order an election to be held in and throughout Lynn County, Texas, not less than twenty (20) nor more than ninety (90) days from the date of making the order therefor, to determine whether said Court shall be authorized and shall have the power to levy and collect annually a special road tax upon all the taxable property in Lynn County, Texas, not to exceed FIFTEEN CENTS (15c) on the one hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of the taxable property in such County, for the further maintenance of the public roads within said County.

THIS PETITION is presented under the provisions of Article 8, Section 9 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, and is in accordance with the requirements of Article 6790, Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes, as amended.

AND, WHEREAS, on the 8th day of May, 1961, the said Commissioners' Court of Lynn County, Texas, on considering such petition, entered the following order, to-wit:

ORDER FOR COUNTY ROAD TAX ELECTION
The State of Texas,
County of Lynn:

On this, the 8th day of May, 1961, the Commissioners' Court of Lynn County, Texas, duly convened in regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Courthouse at Tahoka, Texas, the following members of the Court, to-wit:

W. M. Mathis, County Judge, Presiding; and Curtis Morgan, Commissioner, Precinct No. 1; Woodrow Brewer, Commissioner, Precinct No. 2; Mrs. Beatrice McLaurin, Commissioner, Precinct No. 3; L. K. Nelson, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4, being present, and among other proceedings had by said Court, were the following:

There came on to be considered the petition of L. C. Unfred and 206 other persons, praying that this Court order an election to be held in Lynn County, Texas, to determine whether said Court shall levy on the property within Lynn County, Texas, a Road Tax not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15c) on the one hundred dollars valuation of property, under the State of Texas; and

IT APPEARING TO THE COURT that said petition is signed by more than two hundred (200) qualified voters and property taxpayers of the County of Lynn, Texas, and is in accordance with and

meets the requirements of Article 6790, Vernon's Annotated Texas Civil Statutes, as amended; and IT FURTHER APPEARING TO THE COURT that no election to determine said question has been held in said County within twelve months prior to the filing of such petition, and that such petition should be granted;

IT IS, THEREFORE, ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF LYNN COUNTY TEXAS:

That an election be held in Lynn County, Texas, on the 8th day of June, 1961, which is not less than twenty (20) nor more than ninety (90) days from the date of making this election order, to determine whether this Court shall levy upon the property within said County a Road Tax of and at the rate of Fifteen Cents (15c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of property, under the provisions of Article VIII, Section 9 of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Only qualified voters who pay a property tax in the County, and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at such election.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. C. S. Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

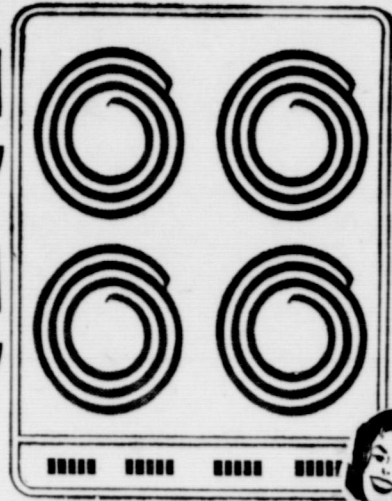

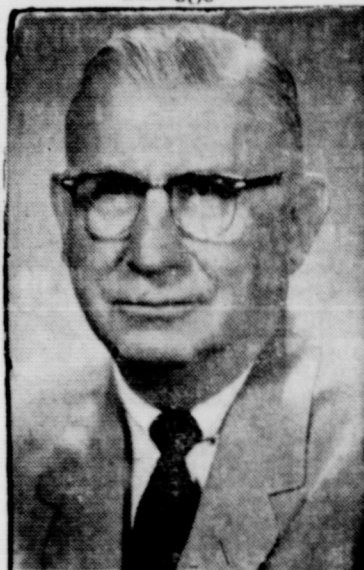
