Chevrolet Presents Service Mogul

Described by veteran circus men s "the most novel advance car ever sent out by a traveling show," a replica of a railroad locomotive on a one-ton Chevrolet truck chassis, hauling a miniature railroad coach is en a tour of 12 states with the Morris and Castle circus.

The passenger coach also serves as a ticket and band wagon and is a feature of the parades in every town where the circus exhibits.

Traversing country roads and city streets, the strange looking trackless train has been the center of curious crowds of spectators wherever it has appeared .

Plans supplied by the Kansas City Southern railroad enabled Brownlee Wells Motors, Inc., Chevrolet dealers in Shrevesport, La., headquarters of the circus, to build the locomotive over the Chevrolet truck chasis. It is an exact duplicate of one of the big road's 'Moguls' and is strikingly realistic. The locomotive was christened "Shrevesport" by the request of the Shrevesport Chamber of Commerce.

The advance man of the show, press representative, contract man and a band of sixteen men find accommodations in the passenger coach during their travels. Ample room, assuring riding comfort on the long tour, has been provided. After leading the parade preceding exhibitions, the train is set up as the of-

ficial ticket office at the circus grounds.

Members of the party assert no circus ever sent out a more economical 'railroad' car. They have found their tour can be arranged with more convenience, as their schedules can be altered to suit varying conditions, and no delays result from awaiting train orders.

Due to the weight of 12 tons carried and drawn by the one-ton truck. careful tests were made previous to the start of the trip. It was found the truck had ample power to handle the load efficiently. Economy of operation was the determining factor in selecting the Chevrolet as the power unit. Chevrolet service stations act as 'round houses' for the locomotive in each city visited.

Equipment Being Installed for New Industry

Sweetwater, Texas, June 10 .-Equipment for a new Texas industry -the manufacture of a fire-proof rock lath-now is being installed at are requested to be present. the mill of the United States Gypsum Company here. According to present plans the new unit will be in production June 14.

Not only will this new factory give employment to more men, but this summer. it will increase the number of miners and the number of workers in the calcining plant where the gypsum is prepared for manufacture into the lath. Additional warehouse facilities also are being added to the property.

Construction is such that the daily capacity of the new unit can be increased as consumption of the product in the Southwestern states demand. The product consists of large panels of processed rock, encased in a heavy fibre binder, which are nailed to the inside framework of a building of any type, to be surfaced with plaster.

gypsum is incombustible and a low conductor of heat. And these advantages may be had at a slight cost for the new product will sell for only a small percentage more than the cost of ordinary inflamable wood





"Milk helps repair the wear and tear of the body. It is as good as meat for building muscle. Moreover, it is cheaper. A quart of milk will much protein as seven ounces of sirioin steak or four large Milk, particularly evaporated milk, which has twice the mineral content of market milk, is one of the best and cheapest sources of lime, which is a form of calcium. Infants and Infants and growing children need lime to build bones and teeth. It is just as necessary for adults to keep their bones in good condition. One quart of milk, or one pint of evaporated milk, furnishes as much calcium as ten large oranges, thirty-two eggs or twenty pounds of Milk also is a valuable source of phosphorus and supplies a certain amount of iron.

"By some authorities milk is said to be an aid in longevity. Dr. Herman Bundesen, health commissioner for Chicago, gives his prescription fer long life as follows: Drink one quart of milk a day and mix with one hour of sunshine. Repeat ad infinitum. "Due to the efforts of health officials
