At a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of O'Donnoll the same being held on the 7th day of July, 1925, there being a quorum present consisting of Mayor D. H, McDaniel, G. A. Haney, T. B. Bailey, C. I. Kuykendall and E. S. Scrimshire, aldermer, the following Ordinance was adopted and passed: Be it ordainod by the Cit Council of the City of O'Donnell Texas, that.

1. Curbs or sidewalks on all streets of 80 feet in width in the

from property line, 2 Curbs on all streets of 60 feet in width must extend to and not exceed 8 feot from property
2. The violator or violators of this ordinance will each be fined in a sum of not less than 85 or more than $\$ 25$ for each offense and the same amount for each day such ordinances shall be vio lated.
3. Since an emergency exists, this ordinances shall take effect immediately upon its publication as required by law.
