## **Newmoore** to **Have New Gin**

A deal was consummated Tues day by and between Newman Lind & | evelopment Company and G. M Mason of Littlefield for the construction of a gin at Newmoore. The contract calls for work to start on the gin with i . thirty days and to be in readiness for operation by the time the season opens next fall.

The gin will be built on the Newmoore townsite where water is aiready developed and will consist of not less than four eighty saw stands and the machinery will be new and modern in every respect. Mr Mason estimates that there will be around 18000 acres of cotton planted this season tributary to me gin and it is possible that he will make the gin a double bat ery of 5 80 saws, it depending upon the crop outlook later in the season. He states that the g a will be equal to the best in Lynn county.

Mr. Mason knows the gin business from the sucker to the packer and will have only the best in his plant. He intends to make his home in O'Donnell and will move his family here soon.



#### Full Military Honors at Squaw Man's Burial

Sam Terry, beloved "Siksela" and squaw man of the Sloux, lies buried in the Rosebud Indian reservation in St. Francis, S. D. Full military honors were accorded the old United States cout and former Indian fighter by the American Legion as his body was lowred to its last resting place.

Samuel Mark Terry, nephew of General Terry of Civil war and Indian , war fame, was born in New York September 1, 1830. Sam joined the United States army in 1858 and a gunshot wound received in the Civil war caused him to wear a silver plate in his throat for the rest of his life.

Handleapped by the wound and undaunted by loss of his toes by freezing while he was engaged in army messenger and scout work for Uncle Sam around the army posts in the land of the Sloux Indians, Sam Terry continued in the government service until romance conquered him.

His detachment was about to attack an Indian village in 1867, with orders to kill every man. During the fighting figures were seen hiding in the tall grass. One of the soldiers was about to shoot when Sam ordered him to wait. Search of the grass revealed two Indian girls. After the attack, one of these persisted in pursuing Terry until he became a squaw man and s real lover of the Indians.

Old-timers declare Eam Terry was a noble character. He served his country for 23 years, and after his adoption by the Indians he helped bring about a mutual understanding between them and Washington,

Heralded Camera The camera obscura was a device invented by Battista Porta, an eminent Italian physicist, about 1560 A. D., and was the forerunner of the camera. It consisted of a rectangular box, with a lens whose focal length was equal to the length and depth of the box. On the side of the box opposite to the lens was placed a plane reflector at an angle of 45 degrees. By this means the image of any object toward which the lens was directed was thrown upon a piece of ground glass on the top of the box, in an upright position. By this instrument oblects could be viewed or sketched from, as in nature. Newton remodeled the camera obscura, and a new interest was taken in it when, by the invention of Daguerre in 1839, the pictures acame "fixed."--Kansas City Star.

The discarded hairpins covered : space fifty feet square and the pile was four feet deep. Evidently girls and women who bobbed their hair had thrown away their collection of hairpins and those who profit from sortable collection. Freedom from the thralldom of pins sticking into or pressing their heads is said to be one of the great advantages of women's shorn locks, though facetious men have complained that the loss of this household article means the deprivation of handy nutpicks and of a wire to hold damaged galluses. Yet their alleged consternation is nothing in comparison with the plight of halrpin manufacturers.

#### Spreading the Scriptures

If the present rate of distribution of the Bible is maintained the whole world may be supplied before the end of the century, says the New York Times. A high-water mark reached last year, according to recent reports, when 30,000,000 copies of the Scriptures found their way into parts of all lands.

Of last year's total about one-fourth was the output of the American Bible society, an organization that since its birth 108 years ago has issued almost 160,000,000 volumes of Scriptures, For the second time in its history the soclety last year exceeded the 7,000,000copy mark, an increase of 2,500,000 ever the previous year.
