Students To Register Friday For School

All School Employees Listed

Thursday, Aug. 29th, the O'Donnell School faculty will meet at 7:30 a. m. in the Homemaking Cottage for a breakfast and the initial meeting of the 1957-58 school term. Following the breakfast there will be a general faculty meeting at 8:30 and a building faculty meeting at 9:30. At 1 p. m. Thursday the teachers will report to their respective buildings to prepare for registration of students on Friday.

Students in ALL grades are to register on Friday, Aug. 31st from 9 to 11 a. m. and 2 to 4 p. m.

First eight grades — room assignments will be made, books issued, lunch tickets purchased, student insurance paid, workbook deposits made, etc.

High school students will register between 9 and 11 a. m. or 2 to 4 p. m.

There will be no formal classes Friday. Students are urged to register Friday and avoid confusion on Monday.

Classes Start Monday

Monday, Sept. 2nd, school will begin. Buses will run their regular schedule on this date and the lunch room will be open. High school classes start at 8:30 a. m. and elementary classes at 9 a. m. Parents are urged to keep their children at home until near the starting time for classes. Children arriving early make a problem for the teachers who need this time to prepare for the school day. Children do not receive supervision on the playground before school starts in the morning. The possibility of playground accidents are thus higher.

New S. S. Ruling Given

Monthly insurance payments can now be paid to the handicapped son or daughter of a retired or a deceased worker, according to John G. Hutton, District Manager of the Lubbock office of the Social Security Administration.

"This is the first year that payments can be made to a dependent child who is incapable of self-support due to a physical or mental disability."

"Payments can begin for January of this year to a person of any age who was disabled before he reached age 18." Mr. Hutton says. Such payments are made on the social security account of a parent of the disabled person. The parent must be an insured worker who has retired or died.

"Before this new provision went into effect, no family insurance could be paid for a child after he became 18 years of age. Now there is no age limit for a disabled child," he added.

Applications for these payments should be filed with the Social Security Administration, 2878-34th Street, Lubbock, Texas.

Worms Hit Cotton

Farmers are currently spraying and dusting for a moderately to some instances, severe cases of cotton leaf worm infestation. Generally cotton is beautiful and grain is also progressing. Some dry land fields of cotton are being lost.

Estimated Cost Club House Is Given

Probably the first question that comes to mind when the building of our Community Club House is discussed is what will be the cost? This, of course, allows many variations depending on size and type of construction. Tentative plans call for the building to be 160 by 30 feet with simple lines and the only projection being that of a small concrete porch, the main entrance. A stage is proposed in one end of the building with dressing rooms on either side while the other end will be given to kitchen space, lounges and storage room. The center of the hall will be the area set aside for general gatherings.

When completed our Community House should easily accommodate any group within our community that should ever care to use it.

To lend a cheery atmosphere for cold, gray winter days, a large fireplace is planned.

Should the above dimensions be used with brick siding and hardwood floors, the cost would be \$15,719.40 as calculated by a local firm which figured a 10 percent discount as a donation to the effort along with a donation of gravel and rock by C. A. Lacy.

Should concrete floors be used the overall cost would be \$14,931.69. Still another reduction in total cost would be possible thru the use of concrete blocks with oak floors.

A low figure of \$12,019.56 could be attained if masonry was used in its entirety, namely, that of concrete blocks and concrete floor.

In any case the total cost is less than many homes in this community have cost. It is not too much to expect that a community such as ours, so well known for their all-together efforts, should build such a place that will not only add prestige to our town, but give us something so badly needed.

No matter how good it is, a new product is rarely accepted readily by the public.

None of us rush out to buy a new mousetrap just because a better one has been invented. We buy after advertising convinces us that the new mousetrap is superior to the old model.

Many of us can remember when housewives claimed that automatic washers could not get laundry really clean. Advertising changed that notion and relieved the homemaker of hours of drudgery each week.

The television manufacturers could not sell TV sets until newspapers advertising sold the American public on the idea of listening to television.

Any woman—or man, for that matter—who has washed a stack greasy dishes is familiar with the virtues of modern detergents. Yet, remember, it took several years of consistent advertising after World War II to convince women that detergents would work.

The early communist government in Russia considered advertising to be an economic waste. However, the Russians found that people accustomed to doing without would not buy even necessities once they became available without advertising.

Today, consumer advertising is common in Russia.

Advertising truly has a place in the creation of wealth. For the products which add to our wealth are not bought and used until they have been advertised. Even the Salk polio vaccine had to be widely advertised before it was consumed.

Indeed, it would be difficult to name a major step in human progress that did not require selling through advertising.

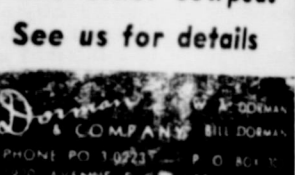

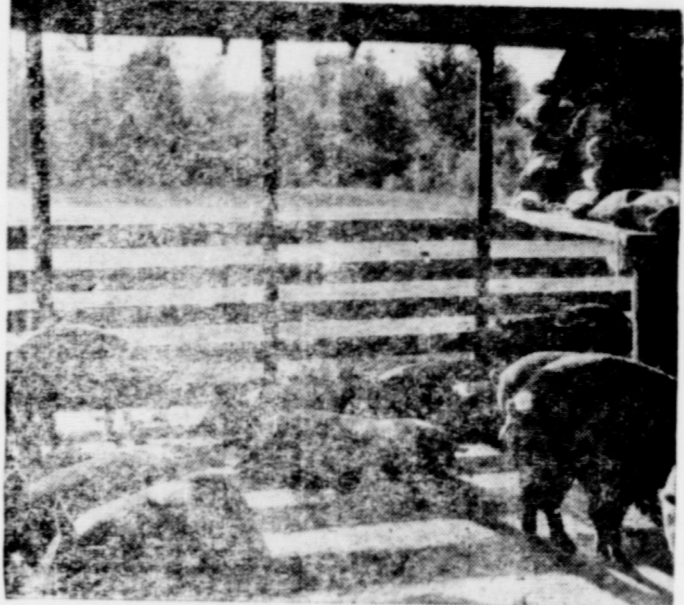
