VA Quiz

Q -- Previously VA had been deducting my GI insurance premium payments from my monthly disability compensation. My compensation has just been reduced to the point where it no longer is large enough to cover my premiums What happens now?

A -- Since you comppensation payments no longer are large enough to cover your GI insurance premiums, the automatic deduction plan will stop. You will have to start paying premiums yourself.

Q -- I am drawing a VA pension. My wiffe has just gone to work part-time to supplement our income. Am I supposed to count her salary in figuring whether my annual income falls below the legal "ceiling"?

A -- No. In computing your annual income, you need not include the separate income of your wife.

Q -- I applied for disability compensation at VA a year and a half ago, and was turned doown. I had planned to oappeal, but kept putting it off. Is it too late now?

A -- Yes. Any decision of a VA rating board unappealed within one year is final. But you may submit a new claim for compensation and include any additional information that you may have.

Q -- I am taking a trade school course under the GI Bill. It will last for two years. I know that I get 30 days of authorized absences a year. If I'm not absent the first year, can I carry those 30 days over to the second year?

A -- No. Carry-overs of unused absences from one year to the next are not allowed.

Know Your Law

John Brown and Bill Smith desire to operate a business together Should this be done as partners or as a corporation? The answer to this problem involves many legal questions.

Perhaps the most important factor is that the business or personal acts of either John or Bill may be binding upon the partnership. The corporation, however, can act only through its officers and agents, and then only within the limitations granted by the articles of incorporation.

As members of a partnership both John and Bill are liable for all of the debts of the business. In case they have business losses, the creditors of the partnership could take all of the assets of the partnership, an all of the personal assets of either John or Bill or both (except a few exempt by law), in order to satisfy the partnership debts.

On the other hand, if they form

On the other hand, if they form a corporation the creditors may go only against the assets of the corporation so that the most that either John or Bill can lose is the amount they have invested in the business. The creditors could not touch th personal property of either John or Bill.

either John or Bill.

Upon the death of John or Bill, it is necessary to liquidate the partnership, but in case of a corporation the operation of the business is not effecteed by the death of either. The firm continues as the business with the heirs of the one who dies substituted as the owner of the stock.

Alcan Highway Travel Called Heaviest Yet

FAIRBANKS—Still another wilderness is falling before the modern motor vehicle. The Canadian government reports that traffic over the 1.520-mile Alaska highway is at least double that for 1951. The tourist is beginning to crowd the welf and ptarmigan for room.

A lasting monument to the genius of the American army engineers who built it in record time, the "Alcan," as they called it then, winds through some of the finest fish and game country in North America. It traverses the Peace River farming plains, skirts blue lakes and majestic mountain ranges, visits picturesque Indian villages and crosses swift streams of purest water.

Part Gravel, Part Macadam

The Canadian terminus of the part gravel, part macadam, 26-foot-wide roadway is at Dawson Creek, the American at Fairbanks, Alaska. Best way to reach the Dawson Creek jumping-off-place by car is from Prince George, B.C., over a new highway. The old trail was a substandard road from Edmondton. Alberta.

The United States maintained the entire highway until 1946, when Canada took over administration of its 1,220-mile share. Until 1948, the Canadians wisely refrained from issuing travel permits indiscriminately, fearful lest some come to grief miles from help.

Now wooden fills over quaking muskeg have been replaced with steel and concrete. New bridges are constantly being built. Filling stations and hostelries plentifully dot the route. Highway patrols prowl constantly.

No longer is a travel permit required, and a motor trip to Alaska is a safe, simple possibility for anyone with a good car and a respectable vacation budget.

Home of Indians, Aleuts Before the Gold Rush of 1896,

Before the Gold Rush of 1806, Alaska was populated largely by Indians and Aleuts. Visitors from the outside were fur trappers, hunters and fishermen. When Secretary of State Wiliam H. Seward bought the territory from Russia in 1867 for \$7,200,000, many Americans thought the price too high and called the new possession "Seward's Folly," or "590,000 square miles of icebergs and polar bears."

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Of primary interest to John and Bill is the amount of income taxes they have to pay. 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
