V. A. Quiz

Q—I plan to sell my house, let the buyer take over my loan, and get release of liability from VA. My wife also signed the note. Will she be released from liability to the Government, if I am?

A-Yes. You understand, of course, that to get a release from VA, the purchaser must agree in writing to purchase your property and assume your unpaid liability. He must al-so satisfy the VA he is a good credit risk.

Q-I gave up my VA pension a while ago and chose to receive compensation instead, in order not to have my social security disability payments reduced. My pension is larger than the compensation pay-mests, and I understand that now, by new law, I can collect both the pension and full social security dis-

ability benefis. Is this so? A — Yes. A veteran entitled to both compensation and VA pension, who waived pension and chose compensation to avoid deduction from social security disability payments, may now rescind that waiver. The new law you mention allows receipt of both full social security disabit-

ity payments and VA pension. Q—I am the widow of a World War 1 veteran, and I have a daughter in

college who is receiving death com-pensation payments from VA. She soon will reach her 21st birthday, but she will still be in school. Will it be possible for the VA payments to continue?

to continue?,
A—No. Under the law, compensation payments made to the child of a deceased veteran while she is in school may not be continued after she passes her 21st birthday.

Q—In the past, VA has been deducting my GI insurance premiums from my monthly disability compensation checks. Now my compensation has been reduced, and the amount I get each month is no lenger large each a deceased veteran while she is in

each month is no longer large e-nough to cover my premiums. Will VA continue deductions, and let me send in the balance? Or what should I do?

A Since your compensation has been reduced so that it no longer covers your premiums, the deduction plan will have to come to an end. You should pay the full insurance premiums yourself.

Lockjay Still Is Common

Tetanus, often called lockjaw, is still prevalent in the United States. Figures for 1958 show that there were 447 cases of the disease in the country from January 1 to Nov. 1. Twenty five of these cases occurred

The history of tetanus goes way back. This disease was clinically described by Hippocrates and Ara-

In 1885 Nicolaier produced the disease experimentally in animals. He did this by inoculating them with garden soil.

Four years later, Kitasato isolated the bacilli in pure culture. He went on to produce a tetanus toxin in 1890 and antitoxin a year later.

For the past five years the in-cilence of the disease has been holding its own in Texas, fluctuating only little. The disease is causes by the introduction of the tetanus ba-

cilli into the body through a wound. The bacilli in turn produce a toxin which reacts in much the same manner as a poison on certain bodily functions.

It is characterized by stiffness of the jaw and neck muscles. Before the development of antitoxin, about percent of all infected persons died

The disease was more prevalent then because of few paved roads and sidewalks, besides the abund-ance of horses and other animals before the coming of automobiles. Today, soils, street dust and animal excreta are still the principal reser-

Since 1941 the U. S. Armed Forces have protected their men with tetanus toxoid. During World War 11 there were only 12 cases of tetanus in the Army and Air Force. Six had not received the toxoid shots and two had received the toxoid shots are shown to the shot should be shown to the should be shown to the should be sho oid, but not an emergency booster. Out of 600,000 battle wounds, only

one developed tetanus. Meanwhile in the Navy there were two deaths from four cases. Only one had not been fully immunized. Compared to high tetanus rates of other warring nations, low incidence incidence among allied troops proves the benefits of tetanus tox-

In contrast to antitoxin the toxoid does not contain horse serum. decided advantage for allergic Active protection can be obtained

from inoculations of the tetanus toxoid with a booster shot at reg-ular intervals as suggested by your physician. Anyone who is subject to incur an open injury such as con-struction workers and farmers should protect themselves. And certainly little children running around barefoot need the protection of tetanus toxid.

One of the world's largest testing tanks is located at the Naval Ordnance Laboratory, Silver Springs, Md. The huge vertical pipe holds a million and one-half gallons.

Home Lighting Is Important

Every home needs well lighted, cheerful places to study and read. A good desk lamp properly placed goes far in preventing eye strain and reducing fatigue, according to extension home furnishings specialists.

A table lamp, wall model, or even a pair of wall lamps can do the job. The important thing is to be sure the lamp is equipped with a glass or plastic reflector bowl under the shade, or with a wide harp to ac-commodate an indirect type bulb. Both these types of under-shade construction give a combination of upward and downward light that reduces the eye-irritating difference in brightness between the desk top and the rest of the room.

Height of the lamp from the desk is very important, too. A lamp that is too short gives such a small spread of light that part of the desk virtually dark. A lamp that is too tall places the bottom of the shade above eye level with a resulting brightness that is uncomfortable. Most people finr that a height of 15 inches between desk top and bottom of the lamp shade is most sat-

Third important factor is placement of the lamp on the desk. It should be placed on the side of the desk opposite the writing hand. If twin lamps are used, such as two wall lamps, mount them with the center of the shades about 30 in-

As for the amount of light-150 watts is the minimum recommended for a wall or table lamp while a pair of wall lamps should have a minimum of 100 watts each.

Lastly, a light-colored desk with dull finish is the most comfortable when working under a lamp. If such a surface is not available, a light-colored desk blotter will help in eliminating reflections
