POLIO CLINIC RE-SCHEDULED FOR SUNDAY NOVEMBER 10

The oral polio vaccine clinics in Baird and Clyde will be open from 12 noon until 5 p. m. Sunday, Nov. 10th, for you and your family to receive polio immunization.

The oral polio vaccine is for all ages, but immediate immunization of all persons up to 21 years of age, especially infants and young children, is recommended and urged, according to State Health officials.

In Callahan County, a polio booster is recommended for those who have completed the primary oral vaccine series, and those who received a booster in 1964, the last county-wide program.

Booster doses are recommended every 4 to 5 years, and especially 5 and 6 year olds and all first grade students.

The individuals who have not started or completed their series, may receive their first dose at one of the clinics Sunday.

The Baird clinic will be held at the Baird School Cafeteria from 12 noon until 5 p. m.

Clyde clinic will begin and end at the same hours, and will be held at the Clyde Community Center.

Putnam resident, if at all possible are urged to come to Baird for their immunization.

Bears-Lions, 0-3 in District Play, Meet in Bears Den Friday Night

The Baird Bears took on the top-rated Ranger Bulldogs on a rain-soaked field in Ranger Saturday night, Nov. 2, and made the Bulldogs work hard for their 28-0 victory.

The steadily improving Bears held Ranger's top rusher, tailback Tom Fox to 40 yards gained on 21 tries, but suffered from the loss of four fumbles and two blocked punts, one on their own 12 yard line.

Ranger opened scoring with a 56-yard drive in the opening minutes of the game, and Fox took a 12-yard pass from quarterback Bill Watkins for the touchdown, but was stopped on the run for extra points. Later in the first period, Fox went 9 yards for their second score, then carried through the left side of the Bear line for the extra points.

The remainder of the Bulldog scores was gained in the third period when Fox ran 14 yards for a touchdown, and was again stopped on the try for extra points, and Brady White went in from the 2-yard line and also scored the extra points.

Playing an outstanding defensive game for Ranger were Richard Williams, Brady White and linebacker Floyd Parks, with Chris West, Roy McAdams, Sonny and Billy Collins leading Baird's defensive efforts.

well supported by the whole Baird team. Franklyn Alexander was the Bear's top gainer with 39 yards.

The Bears play the Dublin Lions Friday night in a home game, at 7:30 p. m., and will be looking for a victory over the Lions, who also stand 0-3 in District play.

Plagued by injuries most of the season, the Bears are looking forward to the possibility of Jerry Barron's return to the lineup. Sidelined for seven weeks with a broken arm, the 195-pound tackle will not know until shortly before game time if he will be able to play in the Dublin game.

Quarterback Billy Collins, injured in the Ranger game, will also be back in the lineup Friday night.

The Bears will face Dublin with a long line of reserves, as boys previously playing in the B team games return to the squad. These 35 boys will continue to heartily welcome the total support of all Baird Bear fans.

Cubs Defeat Catholic 14-6

A long pass play from Jay Reeves to Wayne Fielder, with about a minute to play, broke a 6-6 tie, to give the Jr. High Cubs a 14-6 win over the Central Catholic Jr. High team, in the Bears Den Tuesday night. Danny Vestal carried over for the two extra points.

The Cubs opened scoring in the 1st period on a pass play from Reeves to Bill Windham for six points, but the try for extra points failed. The Central Catholic team scored on an interception early in the 4th period also failing in their conversion attempt.

The Cubs face the Central Catholic team, from Abilene, again next Tuesday, Nov. 12 here on their home field at 6:30 p. m.

Total votes cast in the County voting boxes were: Clyde, 1,058; Baird, 693; Cross Plains, 691; Eula, 181; Putnam, 152; Denton Valley, 104; Oplin, 91; Absentee, 146; Total 3,116.

Preston Smith, in the race for Governor of Texas, won by a large margin in Callahan County over Republican Paul Eggers. Smith received 2,148 to Eggers 807. Smith, along with other Democratic candidates running for various offices, took all the victories in collecting large numbers of votes over their Republican opponents.

A. E. Dyer, Jr., received 2341 votes for Callahan County Judge to fill the unexpired term of the late Judge Roy Gilbreath. Dyer, a Democratic candidate, did not have an opponent.

The proposed Constitutional Amendments, most confusing to the voters, resulted in six of the fourteen passing. Nos. 1, 3, 6, 7, 9 and 14 carried and voters chose to vote against eight of the amendments: Nos. 2, 4, 5, 8, 10, 11, 12 and 13.

Continued List of Rules At Shady Oaks Golf Course

Following is a continuation of the rules and courtesies of the Shady Oaks Golf Course and are to be added to the list published in the November 1 issue.

21. Never cut in on others, especially on No. 7. Get permission first.

22. All carts (pull and electric) and clubs shall be kept off of the Tee Boxes, as well as greens. Remember, please, we want our Tee Boxes to receive the same care as our greens.

23. No more than 4 (four) players to a group at anytime without permission of the Pro. No fivesomes or sixsomes will be allowed at any time on weekends and holidays.

24. All carts (pull and electric) and clubs shall be left at least 50 feet from greens.

25. No drink bottles or cans beyond the first Tee.

26. Young children on the golf course should be accompanied by adults and shall not be allowed to stray away from their group.

27. When lightning is in direct vicinity, all players must clear the course. This is a rule, not a request.

28. Children should not be left at the clubhouse unattended while parents are on course or driving range.

29. Any golf club found on course or practice tee should be turned in to the Pro.

30. All range balls with red stripes should be returned to Pro. Please do not take them home.

31. In order to rent golf carts, children must be licensed drivers, if they are going to be driving.

32. During tournaments, tournament players will have priority.

33. Monday is maintenance day. Men will be mowing, watering, etc. Please extend the same courtesy to them that they extend to you.

34. When you suspect that your ball is out of bounds or lost, please hit a provisional ball from the same spot. If the ball is found to be playable, then the provisional ball shall be picked up.

35. If it appears your ball

might be going to strike another player, please immediately shout, "Fore." This is a warning and/or means attention or means "quiet please."

36. Please do your socializing when approaching, not during a shot. This means particularly when someone else is hitting a shot.

37. Please help your playing partners watch their ball. If your fellow player loses a ball, please help him or her find it. He or she will appreciate it and this speeds up play.

Bonds Total \$19,235 For Sept.

Howard E. Farmer, Chairman of the Callahan County Savings Bonds Committee, reports today that sales of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Callahan County totaled \$19,235.00 during September. Sales during the first nine months totaled \$130,896.00 and this is 93 per cent of the 1968 sales goal.

September sales in Texas totaled \$13,508,678 and the January-September sales were \$134,729,099 -- an increase of 8.3 per cent over sales during the same period of 1967.

Nationally, the cash sales of E and H Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares totaled \$361 million for September and topping September sales for 10 of the previous 11 years, Holdings of Savings Bonds/Freedom Shares as of September 30 total \$51,964 million.

Mr. Farmer reports that recent legislation permits the redemption of Savings Note (Freedom Shares) in the same manner as Series E Bonds.

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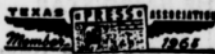

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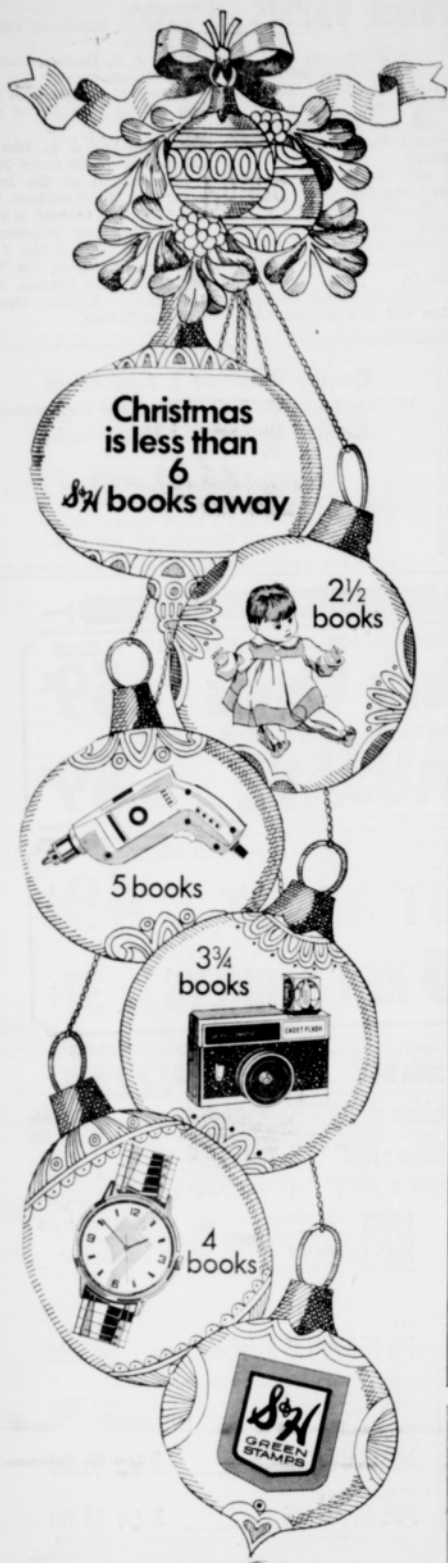
