HOME SANITATION URGED FOR SUMMER

With the approach of warm summer days emphasis on home sanitation becomes increasingly important, stated Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

At this season of the year your State Health Department puts special emphasis on a clean-up designed primarily for the two fold purpose of elimination of flies and rats. These two health hazards can be controlled only through sanitary practices. Places where they feed and breed and nest must be destroyed.

The common housefly has demonstrated that it can spread more than 20 human disease. Some of the more serious are typhoid fever, diphtheria and dysentery. They have also been implicated in the spread of polio. Rats and mice have been accused in the spreading of 20 to 30 diseases.

"It is plain to see," says Dr. Cox "that your health and that of your family and community depends in a good measure upon your maintenance of clean, fly and rat free premises."

Spraying to kill flies and poisoning of rats are valuable supplements to the sanitation program, but will not do the elimination job by themselves.

Know Your Law

...Texans are generally aware that we have what is known as the "community property" system in the state, but many do not understand the significances and implications of the fact. ...Most of the property acquired by a husband and wife, or either of them, during their marriage belongs to them jointly and is referred to as "community property." In fact, the law presumes that all property acquired during the marriage is community property unless the contrary is clearly proved. ...Not including in this category is property owned either husband and wife before marriage, and that which is acquired by either of them after marriage by gift or inheritance. Such items are regarded rather as the separate property of the individual spouse. ...May the husband and wife divide their community property so that each will thereafter own one-half of it as his or her own separate property? Until the passage of a recent constitutional amendment, such action was not permitted by our laws. Now existing community property may be so divided under certain circumstances. However, an agreement by the husband and wife that future earnings or income will be separate property is invalid. ...In constant, it has always been possible to convert separate property. This is usually done unintentionally when separate property is sold or exchanged, and the parties fail to indicate clearly that the purchase money or the separate property is to be the separate property of the husband or wife. ...Very often the money received from a sale of separate property is deposited in the joint bank account of the husband and wife, mixed or "co-mingled" such separate funds with the community funds. This ordinarily resulted in the entire amount becoming community property through the inability of husband or wife to trace the separate funds at a later date. ...The distinction between separate and community property is important for many reasons, and married persons owning separate property should normally exercise care to prevent its being co-mingled with the community estate. Lawyers say that separate bank accounts and proper records will help keep matters straight. ...Failure to use proper safeguards can result in an alteration of the legal order of descent at the death of a person leaving no will since community property passes in one way and separate property in another. Or, one of the parties may lose his right to will what was once separate property to whomever he chooses. ...Other consequences include the possibility that the separate property of one spouse may become subject to the debts of the community or of the other spouse. Or, if a divorce should occur, one of the parties may lose part of his separate estate during division of the couple's various properties.

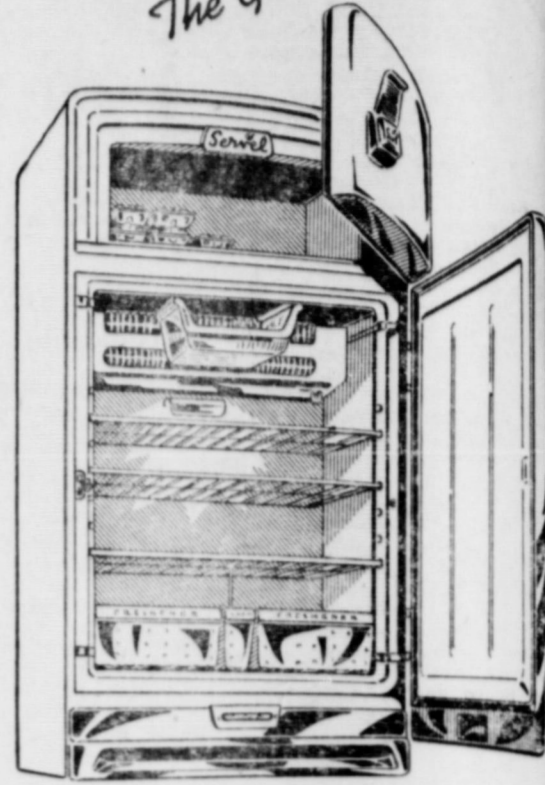

High Production Goals Set For Farmers

Can farmers meet the high production goals set for 1952? That's a question that is causing a lot of concern not only among government officials but farmers themselves. According to C. H. Bates, farm management specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, agricultural producers have demonstrated many times their ability to get and maintain continued high production from their operations. Last year, he says, the output of the nation's farms and ranches was almost 40 per cent above the average for the 1935-39 period. But despite the high production of recent years, U. S. reserves of cotton and feed grains are now at five year lows. The picture could be even darker after the 1952 harvest, adds Bates.

According to the specialist, at least two important production factors besides the weather are getting serious consideration from producers. These are the relation of farm prices to production costs and the supply of labor available for handling essential operations.

The price cost ratio is less favorable to farmers now than it was a year ago and is resulting in declining farm profits. Defense industries are taking healthy chunks out of the farm labor supply despite the fact that wages are about 11 per cent higher than for this same period last year.

Clippings made from fertilized plots on a Johnsongrass pasture in DeWitt County showed that the application of one sack of ammonium nitrate per acre increased the yield of hay from 600 pounds to 2,100 pounds per acre.

Frozen berries have more food value than those preserved in other ways. The berry producing season is short but by freezing a supply this season can be greatly extended.

S. S. Pays Large Sum In Area

Checks for insurance payments under Federal social security went to 3326 aged persons, children and their widowed mothers in Lubbock Field Office area, which includes Lynn county, for December, 1951.

In releasing these figures today John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security office, also said that these monthly payments under the old age and survivors insurance program amounted to \$86,941 in this area. "Without the payments earned by workers under this contributory system, the ability of many people to pay for necessities would have been drastically curtailed or entirely ended," he said.

More than one third of all people over 65 in the United States who could not count on income from work for support, were getting social security insurance benefits. About 1900 persons over age 65 in Lubbock area were receiving these payments.

Hutton pointed out that this Federal program is affording substantial survivor insurance protection. Three out of every four mothers and young children in the Nation are now assured of monthly payments if the insured breadwinner of the family dies.

In this connection, he cited monthly payments totaling \$32,640 to 1106 children, and 225 widowed mothers in the Lubbock area. These monthly payments are going to families deprived of earned income by the untimely death of the wage earner. They are making it possible to keep families together, and keep children in school, and, at the same time, lessening the drain on both public and private welfare funds he declared.
