Vote for Water Bonds At City Election to Be Held Tuesday

Work Started on School Building

The school board received a telegram last week from the bond company stating that above \$70,000 was now available for the construction of the proposed high school building and on Tuesday the contractors were placing material on the ground.

The board was busy Friday and Saturday of last week selecting and making purchases of furniture and laboratory equipment for the building. C. E. Griggs, representing the Chambers Company of Waco, secured the contract for the seats, stage fittings for the auditorium and teachers' desks, the contract price being \$5,000. The auditorium will contain 700 opera chairs. Two inflammable curtains were purchased for the stage. W. B. Curtis, representing W. C. Hixon of Dallas, secured the contract for furnishing the laboratory.

The contract calls for the completion of the building by the 1st of September.

J. R. Sanders and Quincy Haney returned from Dallas first of the week where they had been to purchase a complete equipment for a moving picture show which they will open in White Deer. The building for the new theatre is now under construction and it is planned by the proprietors to have it opened within thirty days.

Deceased was a former resident of the Newmore community and was quite active in all social and church work. The family moved back to Snyder, the old home, last fall. Mrs. Hicks was 66 years of age and besides a husband, she leaves two daughters, Misses Avon Clarie and Florence, and three sons, Ralph, Earl and Claude, the latter living in New Mexico. She was interred in the Snyder cemetery.

Sky Juice Again Covers Country

With a mild winter and just enough moisture falling to keep the ground in good condition for breaking and rain at the right time for planting, a 100 per cent crop is in sight at this time.

Just when the farmers were ready for more rain, it began to fall in showers the first of last week, reaching a climax Saturday night when the whole South Plains country was deluged. The precipitation for the week ranging from two to four inches. The ground is thoroughly soaked, the lakes and water holes full and with the warm weather of the past few days, crops are making a rapid growth.

A few spots have been hit by hail, but with the ground full of moisture no time was lost in replanting. There is time a plenty for crops planted in the next ten days to mature before frost.

In all, the South Plains was never in better condition and never had prospects for a better crop.

Thursday night the country was again drenched with good old sky juice, the precipitation amounting to about one and a half inches in town, being heavier to the west and north. As we go to press early Friday morning rain is again falling, and it looks like we are in for a wet spell.

The Future of O'Donnell Depends Upon An Adequate Water Supply

On next Tuesday the qualified voters of the City of O'Donnell will have the opportunity of expressing their desires as to whether we shall have water works or not. There has been no intensive campaign made by those who favor the issue nor has there been any agitation of the subject on the part of those who oppose it.

Those who oppose it, first claimed that we did not have a water source of sufficient strength to supply the demands that would be made on a water system. This argument was all knocked out when by actual demonstration it was shown that we had water in abundance. The argument that is now being put up is that O'Donnell is too small a town to support a water system; that it would make our taxes too high; that it would be a good thing if the residential section should burn up as enough insurance was carried to rebuild better homes; that the town has gotten along during the past without water and she can continue to do without it; that our children won't have any money to spend for automobiles and gasoline if we should place this tax upon them. But all agree that it would be a fine thing to have waterworks if the system did not cost anything.

O'Donnell's greatest need today is

water dispensed throughout the city in mains.

O'Donnell needs a water system for protection against fires.

O'Donnell needs a water system for sanitary reasons.

O'Donnell needs a water system to grow trees, shrubs, flowers and lawns for making the city more attractive.

O'Donnell needs water in every home, business house and place where people are employed.

There is no sane argument worth while against O'Donnell having water except in the minds of those who are endeavoring to fool themselves into the belief that the town does not need it.

The issue calls for only \$65,000 to be paid during forty years time. Had there been a strong south wind Tuesday night, when the Pfrimmer home burned, it is possible that damage to this amount would have been done, besides, hundreds of people rendered homeless.

The expenditure of this bond issue at this time would strengthen business locally, provide work for the unemployed and bring more people to the town.

Eventually we will have waterworks. Let's vote for the bonds and construct a system new.

Pfrimmer Home Destroyed by Fire

The home of Sam Pfrimmer on Ninth street was destroyed by fire at about 2:30 Tuesday night. Mr. and Mrs. Pfrimmer are visiting in Abilene and the house being unoccupied, the fire was not discovered until it had gained such headway that nothing could be saved. It is not known how the fire originated.

Had a high wind been blowing it is quite probable that greater damage would have resulted, since the town is without protection against fires except in their incipency with the chemical tanks.

This fire should convince everyone that O'Donnell's crying need is a system of waterworks.

South Plains Fair Starts Years Work With Meeting of Directors Saturday

Lubbock, June 2.—The opening gun in the campaign to make a bigger and better Panhandle South Plains Fair this year was sounded Saturday when the board of directors met to transact routine business relative to the opening of work for the coming exposition.

The City Auditorium, frame structure, which was donated to the fair association by the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce recently was formally accepted and work will start immediately in tearing the building down and moving it to the fair grounds where it will be used.

The catalog and premiums list will go to the printer in the next few days and will be off the press and ready for distribution to exhibitors about the first of July.

"We're counting on a larger number of community and county exhibits this year, together with more interest in the live stock and poultry departments of the fair," Geo. Benson, retiring president stated Saturday. "All over the Panhandle and South Plains agricultural exhibitions are the best they have been in years, and farmers are raising more live stock and poultry. This is strictly an agricultural fair and we are going after this type of exhibits and expect to have the best exposition in this respect to be found among the regional fairs of Texas."

A nominating committee was appointed by the board to fill the places of three retiring members of the Board. Those leaving are: Geo. E. Stevens, retiring, and Chris. Harwell, deceased. Members of the board who are carried over till next year are: Walter Myrick, Jr., E. L. Robertson, Norton Baker, W. H. Stanton, R. W. Blair, and S. E. Cone. "The fair is strictly a Panhandle South Plains exposition, known over the entire Southwest as the "Show Window of the Plains" Benson stated Saturday, "and the board of directors are exceedingly proud of the entire section to make the exposition a true representation of the Plains".

O'Donnell Cemetery Being Improved

The O'Donnell Cemetery has been undergoing considerable improvements the past few days, the association in charge of the burial ground being responsible for the work. A well of water has been brought in and a pump installed which will prove of great benefit for those who desire to grow flowers and shrubbery. The grounds have been cleared of rubbish and the weeds cut.

It is planned to erect a windmill and storage tank and pipe the water over the grounds as soon as funds are available.

Thereupon the following election order was adopted.

It appearing that the city is in need of Waterworks and that the City Council deems it advisable to issue the Bonds of said City for said purpose in the amount hereinafter set out;

And it further appearing that the City of O'Donnell has outstanding and unpaid warrant indebtedness, consisting of valid and legally binding obligations against said city in the amounts and of the description hereinafter more fully set out:

\$10,000.00 City of O'Donnell Funding Warrants, dated September 10, 1925, bearing 6 per cent interest per annum, numbered 1 to 20 inclusive, in denomination of \$500.00 each, aggregating \$10,000.00, and maturing serially.

Therefore, be it ordered by the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, that an election be held on the 8th day of June, 1926, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident, qualified property tax paying voters of said city for their action thereupon:

Proposition Number 1
Shall the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas be authorized to issue the Bonds of said City of O'Donnell, Texas, in the amount of \$65,000.00, maturing serially within 40 years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of 5 1/2 per cent per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund with which to pay the principal at maturity, for the purpose of construction of Waterworks for said City, as authorized by the

Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, including Chapter 1 and 7 of Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925.

Said election shall be held at the City Hall Building in said City of O'Donnell, and the following named persons are hereby appointed judges and clerks respectively of said election:

and J. Y. Everett, Clerk.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1 and 7, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, and the manner of holding the same shall be governed by the laws regulating general elections, so far as applicable, and only qualified voters who are property tax payers in the said city shall be entitled to vote at said election.

All voters who favor the foregoing proposition Number 1, to issue the Bonds for Waterworks, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "For the issuance of Bonds for the purpose of Waterworks", and those opposed thereto shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the issuance of Bonds for the purpose of Waterworks."

All voters who favor the foregoing proposition Number 2, to issue the Bonds for funding the Warrant indebtedness, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For the issuance of Bonds for the purpose of Funding Existing Warrant Indebtedness", and those opposed thereto shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the issuance of Bonds for the Purpose of Funding Existing Warrant Indebtedness".

A copy of this order signed by the Mayor and City Secretary of the City of O'Donnell shall serve as a proper notice of said election; and the Mayor and City Secretary are hereby authorized and directed to cause such notice of election to be

posted at the hereinbefore named polling place in said city of O'Donnell for thirty full days prior to the date of such election, and also to cause such notice to be published in some newspaper of general circulation which has been regularly published in said city for at least one year before this date, which notice shall be published once each week for thirty full days before the date of said election, the date of the first publication thereof to be not less than thirty full days prior to the date of such election.

Chevrolet Being Used for Library

A Chevrolet chassis, fitted with a special 'library' body accommodating hundreds of books neatly arranged on shelves, is entering its sixth year of service with the Evanston, Ill., public library, bringing literature to suburbs during the summer months when school branch libraries are closed.

The visits of the 'circulating branch' are eagerly awaited by hundreds of children and adults in scores of communities near Evanston, according to Miss Ida F. Wright, librarian of Evanston, and is one of the most popular extension services ever inaugurated by the institution. Patrons wait on the streets for the arrival of the car, forming in orderly queues, to make their selection of books from the open shelves of the car. Withdrawal cards are stamped by one of the young men assigned to drive the car and act as librarians en route, and the library then proceeds to its next destination.

For ten weeks during the summer months the Chevrolet is used in this suburban distribution until the school branches open for the winter. It is then returned to headquarters to serve as a utility car for the main library. Evanston is the home of Vice-President Dawes and the location of Northwestern University.

The Chevrolet has given exceptional mechanical service, library officials say, and it has never been found necessary to supplement it with an extra car. Other communities are reported to be considering adoption of similar moving libraries.

Some time ago he purchased a thoroughbred Toggenburg female and it did not require but a few juicings of the nannie to prove to him the possibilities of milk goat ranching. Monday he received Freda, a Nubian Kid, from the herd of Dr. C. A. Smith of Slaton. The youngster is a beauty and is from a family of goats that give around a gallon of milk a day.

Dr. Kibbe has ordered a registered Toggenburg from one of the famous herds of California and the animal is due to arrive any day. He plans to raise only registered goats of the best milk-producing strains. He says that goat milk is the most easily digested of all foods known to man, infants thriving on it as on no other food. Since the cost of keeping a goat that will produce a gallon of milk a day is so small, he believes that the day is not far distant when every family in the cities where a backyard is available, will have a goat.

At milking time, he calls the goat to a shed and Miss Nannie heps up on a platform and while munching bran from a box, seems to enjoy the process of juice extraction.
