

STYLES BY TELEPHONE

Texas textile mills and style pureyors may soon be able to obtain the latest Parisian ideas in colors by telephoto. The American Telephone and Telegraph Company, of which the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company is a subsidiary, has perfected an instrument for transmitting pictures in three or more colors across the continent, and is now prepared to supply this service on a com mercial basis.

The principle of such transmission is the same as that employed in sending black and white photographs by wire. The picture to be sent is usually provided in the form of a neg ative, generally on glass, and from this a positive is made on a celluoid film five by seven inches, which is placed in the cylindrical film-holding frame at the sending end. Simultaneously, an unexposed film is placed on a cylinder at the receiving end and the two cylinders are started at the same moment by a signal from one end.

The time of transmission for a black and white photograph is about seven minutes. The time required for transmitting colored pictures depends upon the number of colors, as separate transmission must be used for each color. Thus, in a threecolor print, three separate plates are The same method is employed in making these plates as in printing. The print is photographed through colored screens which filter out the colors not to be recorded on the photographic plate.

It is expected that the transmision of colored prints by telephone will be especially useful in forwarding textile and style pictures. In this way a buyer just arriving in New York from Paris with colored photographs of the newest fashions, will be able to distribute these photographs immediately to practically every section in the United States.
