Ranchmen in western Texas are advised to be on the alert for a range invading plant that spreads rapidly. It is an evergreen plant and is known as threedeaf groundsel and is a member of the senecio family. It is especially toxic to cattle. G. O. Hoffman, extension range specialist, says it is now too late to control the plant with chemicals because the seed are maturing. The best control method at this time of the year is to grub the plants, remove them from the pasture and pile and burn them.

COTTON BURS INCREASE CROP YIELDS

Every year more and more Texas cotton is machine harvested resulting in a larger supply of cotton burs at the gin. To dispose of these burs, most ginners burn them, thereby increasing the fire hazard. Research by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has proven, however that there is a better use for this gin waste. These burs, when applied to the land, will increase cotton yields. In a 4-year study at Lubbock, the use of cotton burs under nonirrigated conditions increased lint yields by an average of 27 pounds per acre and the residual effect increased yields by 23 pounds per acre for five years.

Liberal application of burs results in a better soil-water relationship, thus letting crops use the available moisture more effectively. Soils to which cotton burs have been added are also more resistant to wind and water erosion and they may have a better infiltration rate.

Angular leaf spot, verticillium wilt or cotton seedling diseases have not shown any increase in land receiving six annual applications of burs at Lubbock. In years favorable to angular leaf spot infection, it was more serious where no burs or fertilizers were applied. Cotton insects which reduce yields and lower grades have not built up to a point in the bur-treated soil that they nullify the advantage of using burs. In 1951 cotton burs were released by the State Department of Agriculture and the Department of Plant Quarantine for use on the land, provided certain standards in methods of handling were met by ginners in order to destroy pink bollworms present.

CROP MEASURING IN PROGRESS OVER AREA

The largest group of reporters hired in the Tahoka ASC office in several years began measuring cotton, grain sorghum, and soil bank acreage in Lynn County last week.

According to information from Charles Bragg, ASC Office manager, about 30 reporters and four supervisory assistants have been assigned the task of measuring the 1465 farming units in the county. Ten young ladies have been hired to serve as planimeter operators, the machines which compute the acreage from aerial photographs and to prepare and mail notices of acreage to the farmers concerned.

As a result of the enactment of the new Feed Grain Program this spring, Mr. Bragg says the job of measuring crops in the county has more than doubled in size and difficulty. In addition to the 204,962 acres of cotton allotment, the ASC office must account for 56,825 idles acres diverted from the production of crops under the Feed Grain program and approximately 92,106 acres of grain sorghum on the 993 farm units taking part in that program.

Research studies by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock have established the value of using cotton burs for soil improvement. John Box, extension agronomist, advises cotton producers to make arrangements with their ginners now for burs for use this fall. Local county agents have a new extension publication available on the subject.

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council calls attention to several recent accidents involving farm tractors. Fatalities have occurred in the state. The Council urges tractor operators never to go to the field with the safety shields removed from the tractor nor forget the power machine can quickly become a killer if handled carelessly.

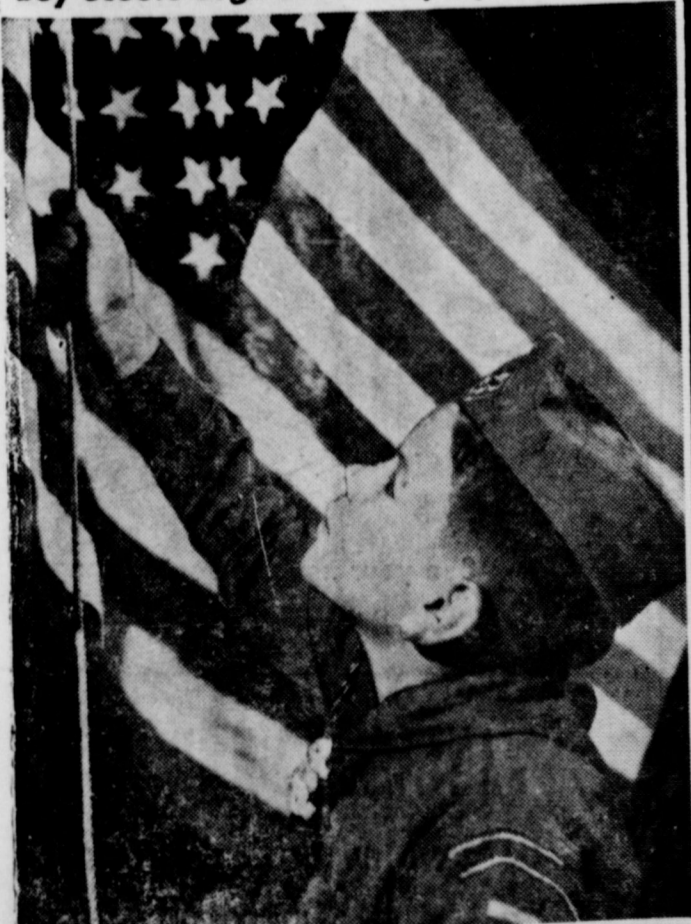
FATHER OF REV. MARCOM DIES

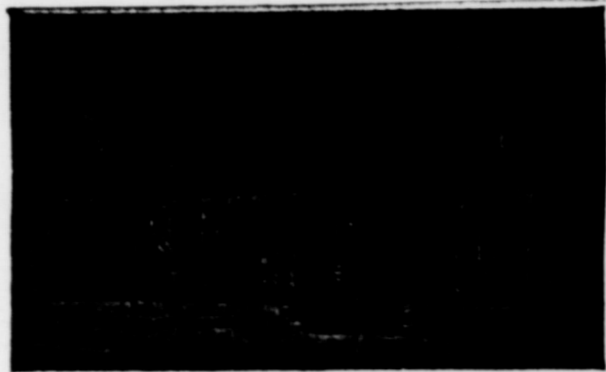

Most taxpayers never hear from the Internal Revenue Service folks except to receive a tax form in the mail. In spite of the success of voluntary compliance, the highly skilled tax men continue to work on enforcement to keep our tax system fair and just.

The arrest of Ralph L. Kirkpatrick of Sherman on June 6th, 1961 ran the total number of Dallas District taxpayers arrested for income tax evasion to eleven for 1961. Kirkpatrick was indicted on three counts covering the years 1954, 1955 and 1956. He is charged with having evaded \$6,255.09 taxes for the three year period.

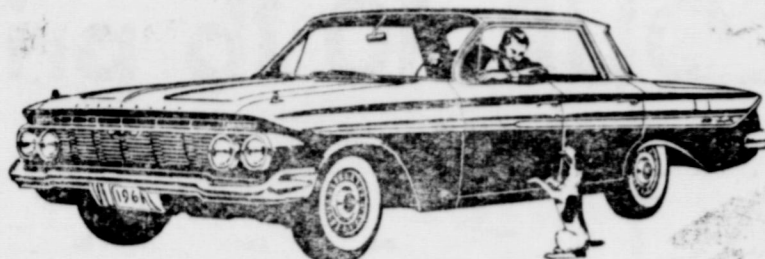

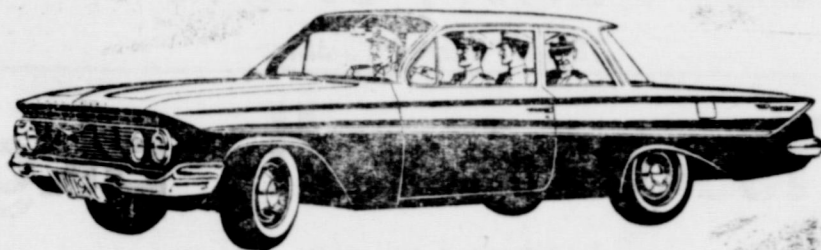

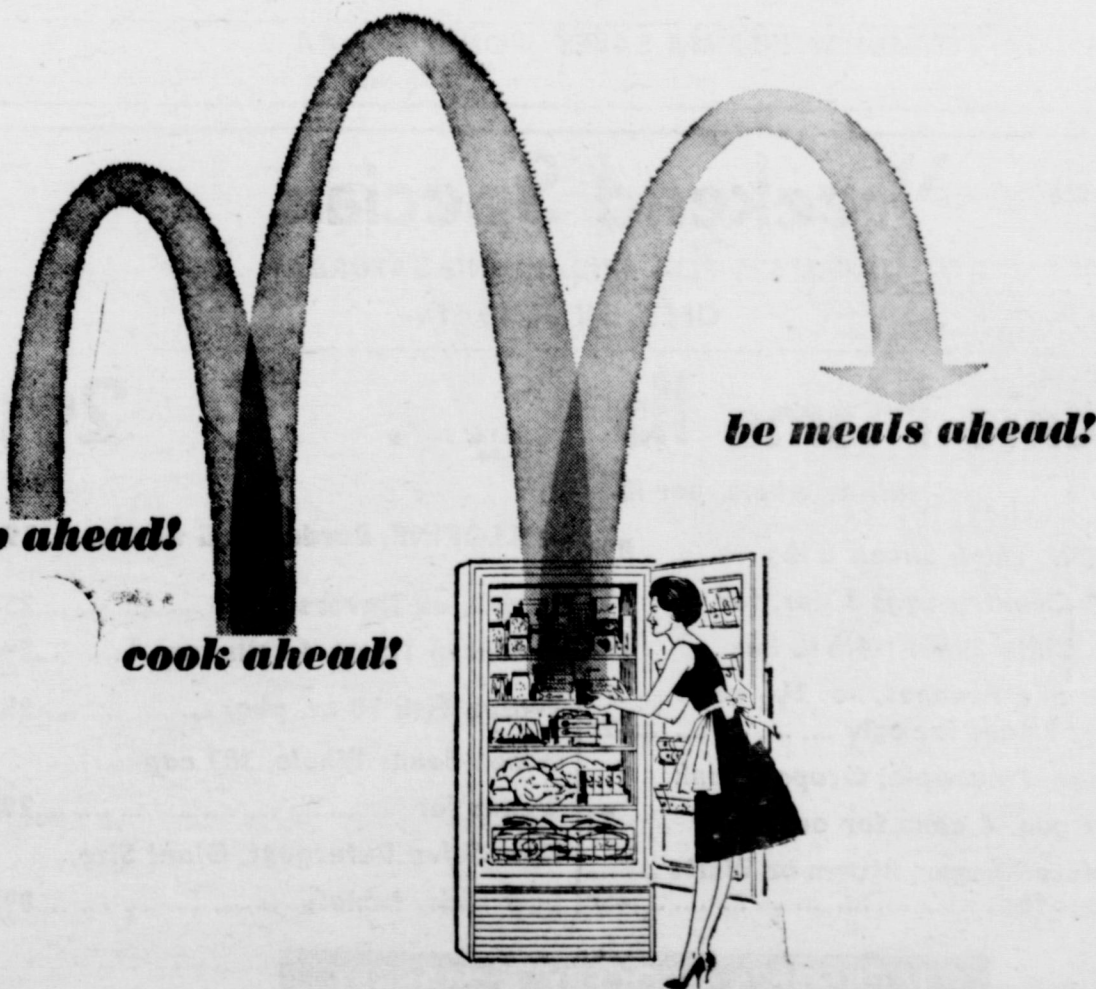
