Measured water in the bottom, driven red coffee in the top, once started, the responsibility of coffee is on one cup of water.

Heat, generates pressure that causes water to flow upward. The hot water heats the coffee in the extraction.

Coffee is brewed in upper globe where correct temperature is controlled. When upward flow stops, coffee should be turned off.

Removing from heat cuts coffee in lower globe which "pulls down" stored coffee in a jiffy.

Remove upper glass and serve. The coffee will stay hot upwards of thirty minutes in the de-casser.
