(Note: falls of less than 5-100ths not considered effect ive and not included. The area east of Harmony running into Borden County recorded less than 6 inches last. It is remarkable that the five local gins processed nearly 17,000 bales of cotton. Our guess for 1957 is about 12 to 13 inches — the winter is still warm as it has been during the drouth since 1950.
