### Local Rancher Dies In Plane Crash Monday

Funeral services were to be held today at 10 a. m. at First Presbyterian Church of Lamesa for Joe Clayton, 47, a widely known rancher of near Mesquite in Borden County. Mr. Clayton died at 11:15 a. m. Monday when his light plane crashed near his ranch home. He was killed instantly. He had just returned home from visiting his wife, a patient in Lamesa Medical Arts Hospital and the plane crashed in landing. He was alone.

He was a son of Mr and Mrs. A. M. Clayton of Lamesa. Other survivors are two children, Jan and Scott and a brother, Mardes of Borden County. Mr. Clayton did much of his business here and was well known locally.

### City Calls Bond Election

On this page the reader will find official notice of a bond election to be held here March 25th. The proposal calls for issuing \$171,000 in new money and to refund (refinance) \$59,000 in old bonds. The new money would be used to bring in water from a water field on Arol Moore farm, repair and pave streets buy a fire truck and make other improvements in water and sewer system \$111,000 of the \$171,000 would be revenue bonds and the remaining \$60,000 would be tax secured bonds. Savings in insurance rates are estimated to pay the \$20,000 proposed for fire equipment.

By speedy action water may be in town by July 1st. The issue of March 21st of Index will carry a series of questions and answers to better enable the vote to understand the proposal. If Big O is to live and grow, WATER is a MUST.

### THE RESOLUTION AND ORDER

is as follows: WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purposes herein after mentioned; therefore,

IT IS RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 25th day of March, 1961, which date is no less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of the resolution and order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

### PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

### THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN

Our state has followed the rule of keeping filing fees in all legislative races, state and national, far below the fees in other races.

The effect of these low fees is shown in the April 4 list of almost 40 candidates for the office of U. S. Senator.

How does this affect Texas participation in this election?

The former choice of checking the name for which one wants to vote has changed, and now all candidates a voter does not want need to be scratched out. This means a long and tedious voting chore with the longest ballot in Texas history facing the voter April 4.

To help pay the cost of the election, the candidates in the U. S. Senate race will produce something like \$1,500 in filing fees, only about one cent of very dollar needed to hold the election. And the more candidates, the more time and cost is involved.

Observers say the filing fees should be much higher, to control the number of entrants in such a race, and to help more to pay the costs of the elections.

In tests conducted by Texas Agri-

Despite unfavorable weather  
conditions at different times during  
the past year, Texas cotton produc-  
ers came up with the third highest  
yield per harvested acre on re-  
cord — 329 pounds. Since 1946 the  
yield figure has gone from 134  
pounds to the present near record.  
Fred C. Elliott and Glenn Black,  
extension cotton specialists, in their  
1960 annual report also said that  
producers saved about \$91 million  
in labor costs by harvesting over  
50 percent of their crop with machi-  
nes and by using mechanical and  
chemical sprays and weed control.  
Their work is carried on as a part  
of the 7-Step Cotton program.

Fourteen years ago the average  
grocery bill for a year was \$767. Of  
this amount the farmer got less than  
\$400. Today the grocery bill has  
been estimated to exceed \$1,100  
and the farmer is still getting  
about \$400 for his part.

American farmers fed us and our  
allies during two world wars with-  
out drawing on the manpower need-  
ed by the armed forces or by in-  
dustries producing war materials.

Interest in the Texas Community  
Improvement continues to grow,  
says Reagan Brown, extension soci-  
ologist. Currently 241 communities  
have filed entries in the program  
sponsored by the electric utilities

the Agricultural Extension Service.

Diseases took an estimated \$156  
million bite out of the 1960 Texas  
cotton crop, according to reports  
from 15 cotton specialists located  
throughout the State. An estimated  
1,116,000 bales never got to market  
because of diseases, said Harlan  
Smith, extension plant pathologist,  
who compiled the report. Major losses  
were credited to bacterial blight  
root rot, seedling disease, Pseudo-  
monas wilt, root knot, Verticillium  
wilt and boll rots.





Health Exams Are Important

...Credit Bull Mooseer Teddy Roosevelt for starting what still stands as one of the most vital single phases of personal health protection. As President in 1908 he ordered periodic health examinations for all army officers.

A "periodic check-up" is simply a careful medical study of a presumably healthy person, performed by the family physician to detect disease or body malfunction in an early stage. Early treatment reduces suffering and prevents some diseases from becoming chronic, and perhaps incurable.

Besides detecting disease before it becomes too deep-rooted, the check-up serves as a basis for better health practices for the patient and his family. The physician can discuss such problems as diet, exercise, rest, work and play habits, and other activities which affect health.

How often and what type examination should be given varies with the patient's age, sex, occupation, heredity, past health, place of residence, and economic status. Says the American Academy of Pediatrics:

"The normally healthy infant should be checked about six weeks during the first year, every three months during the second year, and once a year from the sixth to the twelfth year.

Most medical authorities believe that from about 12 to age 40 or 45, annual health check-ups are adequate. After 45 some doctors advise examinations every nine months. These time schedules, keep in mind, are suggested for normal people without previous serious or chronic illness.

No single examination can be applied to all persons, but all check-ups include a medical history, the actual physical examination, and may include certain laboratory and x-ray procedures as determined to be necessary.

The medical history gives the physician clues as to what he should be especially alert for when he begins the examination. It will include such things as social and occupational habits, past illnesses, present symptoms. Armed with this advance knowledge the physician can frequently detect the possibility of physical signs become apparent to of disease long before abnormal the patient.

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN

Experienced capital observers are pointing to the April 4 election of a U. S. Senator as real evidence of Texas' conspicuously inadequate filing fees.

Our state has followed the rule of keeping filing fees in all legislative races, state and national, far below the fees in other races.

The effect of these low fees is shown in the April 4 list of almost 40 candidates for the office of U. S. Senator.

How does this affect Texas participation in this election?

The former choice of checking the name for which one wants to vote has changed, and now all candidates a voter does not want need to be scratched out. This means a long and tedious voting chore with the longest ballot in Texas history facing the voter April 4.

To help pay the cost of the election, the candidates in the U. S. Senate race will produce something like \$1,500 in filing fees, only about one cent of very dollar needed to hold the election. And the more candidates, the more time and cost is involved.

Observers say the filing fees should be much higher, to control the number of entrants in such a race, and to help more to pay the

costs of the elections.

It would also eliminate the possibility of anyone joining such a race for publicity. And, if there should be anyone like that in this race, he would probably not even be interested in the outcome of the race—he probably has no qualifications for the high office he seeks. It makes it hard for conscientious Texas voters to be able

to decide on the most qualified man for the job.

The low filing fee could prompt people to use the race for publicity, without thinking too much about it, say observers.

Such a publicity seeker, or crank, is offered a free ride to jump in the race, get his name in the newspapers, and maybe on TV, on the ballots and in other places. And he

has no possibility of getting more than a ludicrous handful of votes. And Texas pays the bill.
