

Health Exams Are Important

-0-Credit Bull Mooser Teddy Roomvelt for starting what still stands as one of the most vital single phas-es of personal health protection, As President in 1908 he ordered per-iodic health examinations for all army officers.

A "periodic check-up" is simply a careful medical study of a pre-sumably healthy person, performed by the family physician to detect disease or body malfunction in an early stage. Early treatment reduc-es suffering and prevents some dis-eases from becoming cronic, and perhaps incurable.

Besides detecting disease before becomes too deep-rooted, the the becomes too deep-rooted, the check-up serves as a basis for bet-ter health practices for the patient and his family. The physician can discuss such problems as diet, ex-ercise, rest, work and play habits, and other activities which affect health.

How often and what type examin-ation should be biven varies with the parient's age, sex, occupation, heredity, past health, place of resi-dence, and economic status. Says the American Accademy of Pedia the American Acadamy of Pedia-

tries: "The normally healthy infant should be checked about six weeks during the first year, every three months during the second year, and once a year from the sixth to the twelfth year.

Most medical authorities believe that from about 12to age 40 or 45. annual health check-ups are ade-quate. After 45 some doctors advise examinations every nine mon-ths. These time schedules, keep in mind, ar suggested for normal people without previous serious or chronic illness.

No single examination can be applied to all persons, but all check-ups include a medical history, the actual hysical examination, and may include certain laboratory and x-ray procedures as determined to be necessary, The medical history gives the

physician clues as to what he should be especially alert for when he be-gins the examination. It will in-clude such things as social and oc-cupational habits, past illnesses, present symtoms. Armed with this advance knowledge the physician can frequently detect the possiblity physical signs become apparent to of disease long before abnormal the patient.

S. Senate race will produce something like \$1.500 in filing fees, only a-bout one cent of very dollar needed to hold the election. And the more candidates, the more time and cost is involved. and cost is involved. 


