LOTT PHARMACY CARE IN HANDLING PESTICIDE IS ONLY COMMON SENSE -0-

Between now and fall, insecticidin back yard gardens will fog the air like smoke as the annual battle between gardener and garden pest is joined in earnest. And woe unto insect - a single breath of the lethal spray, a single drop on hi tiny body, a single bite of spray covered green and his doom is seal ed. Good riddance

The insect's only consolation is a grim but satisfying one — his ex-ecutioner, being human, is liable to the human disease of carelessness prone to the very weapon he uses aganst the insect. So it is that the executioner may become the execut-

It is entirely possible to avoid this not too unlikely contingency, however. All that is required is the ability to read the following recommendations and the wit to accept them at face value.

1. Read the label carefully and make sure you understand it. The warning are never exaggerated. Always keep the material in its original container, covered and with the warning label attached.

2. Keep the pesticide away from children and pets. Never give a neighbor part of it in an unlabeled container. When you are not using it, store the material on a high shelf or in a closet where it will not be exposed to excessive sun or cold Never keep it around food or feed

3. Be extremely careful not to spill the insecticides on your skip and avoid breathing spray or dust. A damp handkerchief tied around your nose is a good safeguard,



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
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
