**INSECT BITES KILL MORE PEOPLE THAN SNAKES**

Texans are rightfully fearful of snakes but the fact of the matter is more Texans have been dying over the years from the effects of insect bites than have died from snake bites. During the five year period from 1955 to 1960, snake bites claimed 13 Texas lives and during the same period insects resulted in the deaths of 30 persons. Last year there were 18 total snake and insect bite deaths in Texas, the largest number since 1944 when there were 23 such deaths.

In a recent national study involving a five year period, it was found bees, wasps, hornets and yellow jackets killed 86 persons compared with 71 from snake bites and 39 from spiders. Bees alone took 57 lives when victims were allergic to their poisons.

Around home look carefully in tall bushes and vines before trimming to make sure there are no insect nests. When exposed to snake ridden areas, carry a snake bite kit. If bitten, be still to keep circulation at a minimum rate while applying snake-bite procedures or waiting for help.

**Unsettled Weather Poses A Planting Problem**

There's a saying on the Plains that no two crop years are alike, and 1961 is proving it — in spades.

First off the bat the winter and early spring saw an all time subsoil season. The best in some 29 years. Some April cotton came up but didn't grow normally due to a cold spring. In May the soil was too dry to plant with any guarantee. The late spring rains just didn't arrive.

The frosting on an ill-fated cake is the current 15 days of stormy weather over the Plains packing a triple punch of cloudbursts, hail, and sandstorms. Much of the area cotton caught hail, and the 5 inch cloudburst of last week silted over what was left. Currently 75 percent of the area is replanting or "scratching" some farmers doing both. Many farmers have replanted three times and cottonseed is becoming in short supply.

What kind of harvest will we have? Probably a short early season run and the main crop is sure to be late. Chopping costs may be lower than average but poisoning costs may be up.

Another saying on the Plains: — "A crop can promise more and make less, and promise less and make more than anywhere else in the world."

**CARE IN HANDLING PESTICIDE IS ONLY COMMON SENSE**

Between now and fall, insecticides in back yard gardens will fog the air like smoke as the annual battle between gardener and garden pest is joined in earnest. And woe unto the insect — a single breath of the lethal spray, a single drop on hitting body, a single bite of spray covered green and his doom is sealed. Good riddance.

The insect's only consolation is a grim but satisfying one — his executioner, being human, is liable to the human disease of carelessness, prone to the very weapon he uses against the insect. So it is that the executioner may become the executed.

It is entirely possible to avoid this not too unlikely contingency, however. All that is required is the ability to read the following recommendations and the wit to accept them at face value.

1. Read the label carefully and make sure you understand it. The warning are never exaggerated. Always keep the material in its original container, covered and with the warning label attached.
2. Keep the pesticide away from children and pets. Never give a neighbor part of it in an unlabeled container. When you are not using it store the material on a high shelf or in a closet where it will not be exposed to excessive sun or cold. Never keep it around food or feed stuff.
3. Be extremely careful not to spill the insecticide on your skin and avoid breathing spray or dust. A damp handkerchief tied around your nose is a good safeguard.

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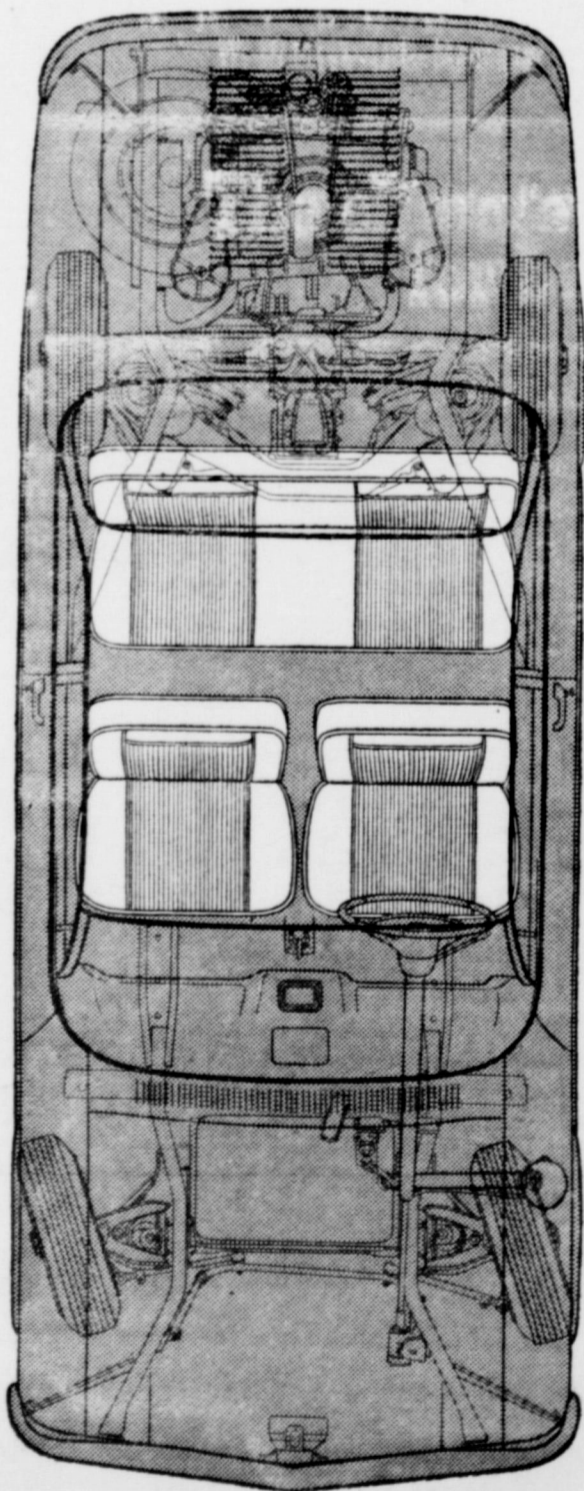

In the last days of the session, there are always enough people and groups to keep up a lively interest in every measure discussed in the Legislature. But one very large group, called the "silent segment", is composed of state workers who have at present an intense interest in pay prospects.

Legislative discussion thus far hold encouraging promise for them.

The salary question is wrapped up in the general appropriation bill. So far, it seems the extent of pay betterment for several thousand state workers is still to be defined. Not only is this true in the departments of the capitol and state office buildings in Austin, but in

thousands of administrative districts, hospitals and other institutions. The legislature has passed the state's first comprehensive job classification bill.

There is the general opinion that whatever the schedule increase becomes effective, they will not be pinched out at the lowest brackets but will range up into the \$6,000 to \$8,000 pay levels. The pay raise for teachers, plus the assurance that the pay schedule of junior college teachers will be adjusted upward, adds encouragement to betterment of general state pay schedules.

**A GOOD BREAKFAST IS VERY IMPORTANT TO HEALTH**

Austin — If you suffer from "ten o'clock hunger," better revise your breakfast habits. State Health Department nutritionists advise. More and more people are falling into the habit of skimpy breakfasting. Surveys show that two out of every nine children leave for school without breakfast and four out of ten workers leave for work with nothing to eat. "Ten o'clock hunger" is the expression nutritionists use to describe the body condition which comes with an inadequate breakfast. Victims usually feel weak and giddy by mid-morning. They may be hungry yet have no taste for lunch. Or, if they are able to eat a big lunch, they will become unbearably sleepy by early afternoon.

Studies with volunteers of all ages have proved conclusively that poor breakfast habits are directly responsible for fatigue, dullness, irritability and a general feeling of cussedness. Volunteers fed a good breakfast were more productive and alert, easier to get along with than their hungry counterparts. What a breakfast should consist of is dependent on physical activity, age, sex, weight and other factors.

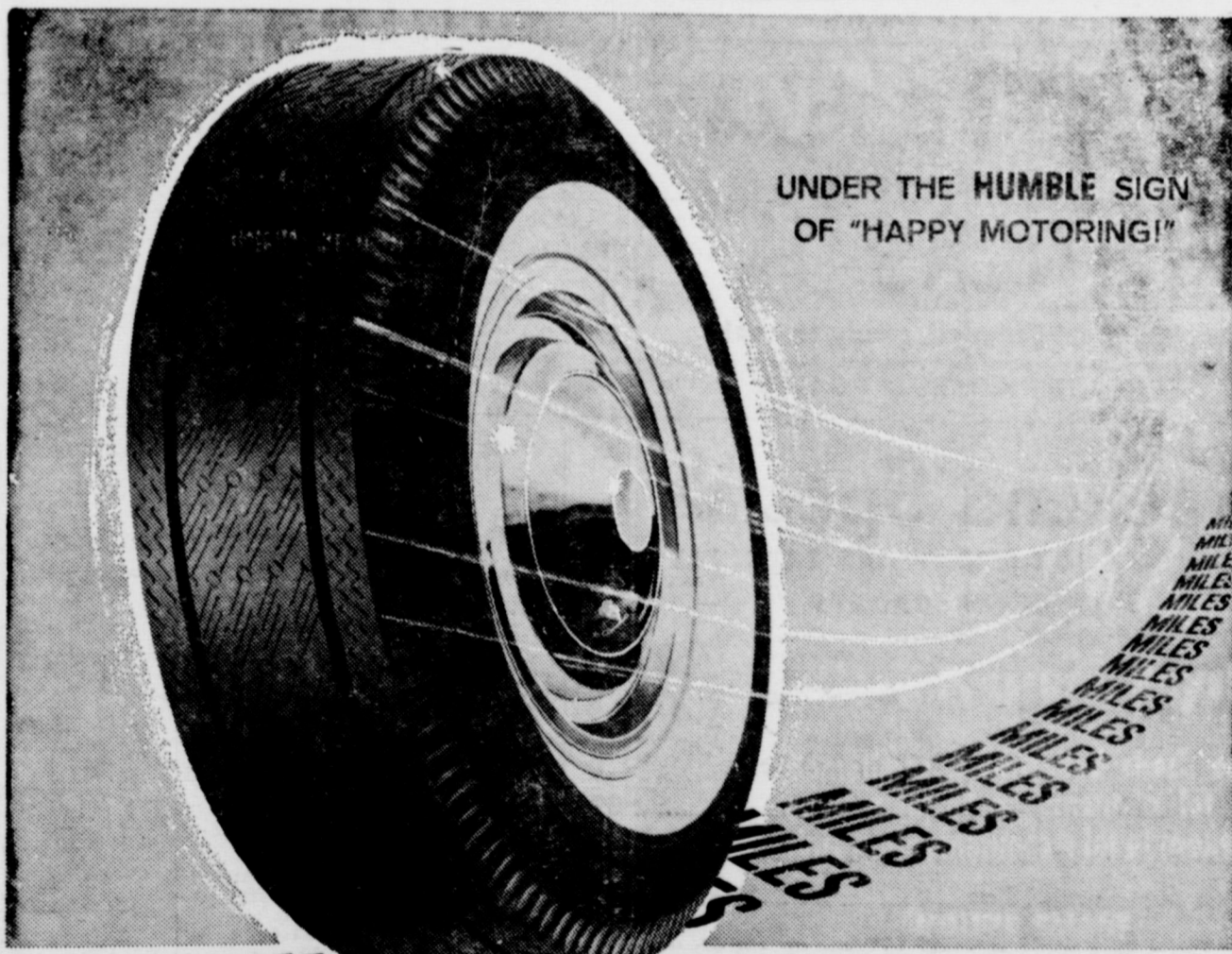
