Pool To Be Ready By Next Summer

The O'Donnell City improvement bonds were approved by a 7 to 1 majority in the city election here Saturday, according to City Secretary Mrs. Moody Everett. The vote was 162 to 23. A break down of voting is —

Street Improvements 162-24
New City Hall —162-24
Park Project 151 to 31

The improvements will include —

- A PARK
- A SWIMMING POOL
- A COMMUNITY HOUSE
- A CITY HALL-FIRE HALL

A total of 188 votes were cast representing an estimated 85 percent of eligible voters.

The project calls for spending \$50,000.00.

Mayor Jimmy Forbes and the Council composed of John Earles, Duh Middleton, Hugh Lott, Harvey Line and Homer Hardberger will certify the election as correct at the regular meeting Thursday nite.

The bonds already have a purchaser. Work will begin this winter on the park and by end of school the pool and the two buildings are expected to be completed. A site for the project is yet to be made. The City will likely sell the old park at North Y as business property.

Soft ball fans want to see a ball park built for nite games. Light fixtures are at the old park.

New Pontiac To Be Shown

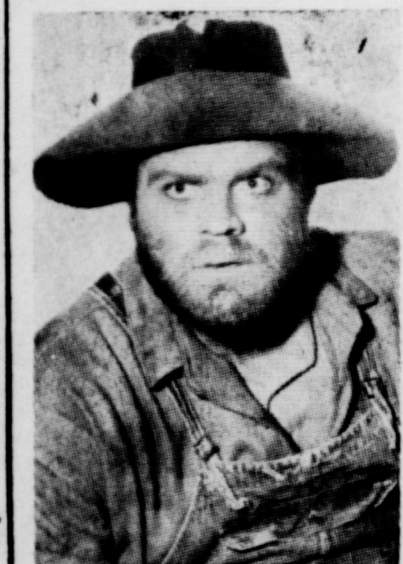
The beautiful new 1959 Pontiac line of fine cars will be shown this Thursday at Veach Pontiac Coffee and donuts will be served during the day.
