

Chickens Sold

Wednesday of last week Joe Eakers sold his first house of 4,000 broiler chickens to the Clary Poultry Co. of Lubbock for 27c per lb. \$853 profit was realized for the nine weeks of work. Construction started this week on a second house to be just south of the present house. In two weeks 8,000 chicks will be laid down for the fall crop. There will be one sex per house.

The chickens sold weighed an average of 2.96 lbs and 3,991 chickens were raised out of 4,000 or 99.99 percent livability. The chicken cost 19.7 per lb to raise and it took 2.48 lb. of feed to put on one lb of meat or 40.27 lbs of meat per 100 lbs of feed. Compared to recent figures from 20 because to recent figures from 20 houses at Terrill the average cost per bird was 19.69 compared to the 19.70 here.

There are now a total of 13 broiler houses operating here with S. L. Schooler of New Moore to build 2 and Vic Pyeatt of South of town having built one.

Through courtesy of Mr. Clary the Ed. enjoyed two broilers from the Eaker unit and we have never eaten sweeter nor more tender chicken, simply stated... it's remarkable.



Explains Expansion
SCHENECTADY, N.Y. — Why
does heat make things expand?

Matter is made of molecules which are in constant motion, and the higher the temperature, the faster they move. If you have a volume of gas in a rubber balloon, the pressure of these molecules against the rubber is balanced by its pull. Warming the gas makes the molecules move faster, so they push harder against the rubber. It yields a little, and the gas ex-

With cooling, their motion is slowed, they exert less pressure, and the volume of gas gets smaller. Something similar occurs in a liquid, and also in a solid, although the molecules are held more tightly together. The amount which a solid expands for the same rise in temperature is considerably less than with a gas or liquid.
