OF CANCER, SAYS DOCTOR -0-Fear of cancer cannot help its

victim, and unreasonable fear should be replaced by intelligent action concerning this disease, is the opinion of Dr. Holle, Commiss ioner of Health. The doctor said that cancer can

usually be cured in its earlier stages, before it spreads to other areas of the body. This has been demonstrated by the fact that many persons have been treated successfully by surgery, radium, or x-ray and are now living, many years after a definite diagnosis of early cancer was made. Many people post pone diagnosis when they suspect cancer either because they dread to hear the truth or because they be-

lieve that a cure is impossible.

In the treatment of cancer, time is the most important factor, according to Dr. Holle. To produce satisfactory results, treatment satisfactory results, must begin early in the course of the disease while the cancer is

confined to a small area. Persons suspecting cancer should consult their doctor as soon as they notice any unexplainable lump, unusual discharge, a persistant sore on any part of the body or any change in the appearance of a mole or wart. It is disastrious to wait for pain as this is a late symptom that usually doesn't occur until the malignant growth has made much

A WAY TO GET A FREE COLLEGE EDUCATION

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson has announced that Civil Service exams for Texas boys seeking appointment in 1957 to the Army, Navy and Air Force service schools will be held November 20 at 71 cities and towns thruout the state. Senator Johnson uses the results of these exams as a guide in making his appointments to the academies. Vegetables Spark Lazy Appetites With Their Appeal

DON'T try to stuff your family with hearty meals all of the time! Right now with warm weather slowly making itself felt, they're apt to show a distinct lack of interest in meals.

Vegetable combinations make excellent main dishes if you add a protein food such as eggs or cheese to them. Besides, it's an excellent way to keep the food budget trim.

Green peppers stuffed with this corn mixture are a pretty as well as nourishing and interesting vegetable dish. You'll want to keep this recipe on file for the next several months:

Corn-Pepper Bake

- (Serves 6) 6 large green peppers
- 4 slices bacon 1 egg
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 2 tablespoons finely diced onion 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon sugar (optional) 1½ teaspoons salt
- 1½ teaspoons salt 1½ cups milk, scalded
- 2 cups cooked corn


