### ACCIDENTS TAKE TOLL

Take all deaths among children from 1 to 4 years old caused by the so called childhood diseases, and they would total a little more than half the child deaths caused by accidents.

Figures released by the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the State Department of Health, show accidental deaths in 1948 killed 593 children under 4 years of age and 218 of them under one year, while the combined deaths from diseases of childhood killed only 324 in the same age group.

The report shows one of every 3 deaths in the 5 to 9 age group is accidental; four of 10 deaths in the 10 to 19 age group is accidental and very little decline is noted in that rate thru the other age groups under 30.

State and local health officials can prevent epidemic diseases and safeguard food and water supplies but it is up to the individual citizen to protect himself from untimely death by accident.

Attention to details is the biggest reason why some hog farms earned \$2,000 more than so-called others during the past year. F. J. Reiss, farm management specialist in the Illinois college of agriculture, said that 128 high income hog farms averaged \$10,200 earnings from swine last year, while 161 less-efficient farms took in only \$8,000. Extra care at farrowing, control of parasites, helped.

**Flashlight Regarded  
'Must' In Farm Homes**  
Survey Shows Many Needs  
For Use in Rural Areas

Even a farmhouse with electricity doesn't have enough light to illuminate all the places in and about a home where darkness means danger.

This was apparent from recent surveys disclosing that inside as well as outside a flashlight is a farm "must" for nighttime safety as well as convenience.

The principal uses of flashlights



A luminous flashlight is ideal for the denroom since it helps eliminate stumbling and groping for light switches.

revealed by the surveys have just been summarized in the following commandments for safety in the dark:

1. Carry Flashlights—On dark stairways to prevent falls. On highways at night. On your bicycle. In the car; one for changing tires, one for safety signalling by companion.

2. Keep Flashlights—Handy in the kitchen for outside chores at night or trips to the cellar. Near the bed; a luminous flashlight is ideal for the bedroom since it helps eliminate stumbling and groping for light switches. In the medicine cabinet; helps you find the right medicine, or to make a throat examination.

3. Use Flashlights—When gas fumes are suspected to be present. When you are changing a fuse in the fuse box. When checking the nursery or baby's crib at night.

According to W. S. Allen, general manager of the electrical division of Olin Industries, Inc., New Haven, Conn., the best general purpose flashlight is the two-cell, fixed focus type with a luminous case that glows in the dark. It can be located without stumbling or lighting matches. Under ideal conditions it will throw a beam 700 feet.

**Radiant Heating Use  
Valuable to Farmers**  
Its Advantages Outweigh  
Initial Expensive Costs

Radiant heating, one of the newest developments in construction of farm buildings, has many advantages which outweigh its high initial cost, according to a publication dealing with building methods, materials and techniques.

As an example of a successful radiant heating system, the publication describes the installation of

such a system in a turkey house on the farm of W. E. Wright in Mitchell county, Iowa.

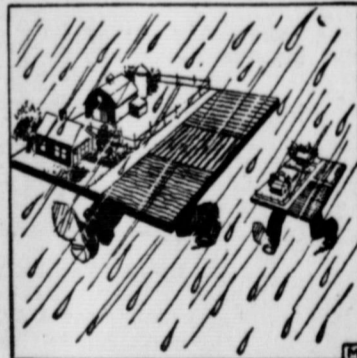
This house, a double Quonset measuring 60 by 220 feet, is heated by hot water which circulates through copper tubing imbedded in concrete floor slabs.

The radiant heated floor is divided into quarters, enabling the temperature of each zone to be regulated independently. The temperature usually is kept between 50 and 70 degrees in the winter. About 3,500 breeder hens, or 20,000 poult can be housed in the building and can be cared for by three men.

Water for the system is heated by an oil burner in a room on the south side of the structure. Supplementary unit heaters are used when required during extremely cold weather.

The story of the radiant heating system used in the turkey house described was carried in the American Builder magazine.

**Making Most of Rain**



Whether your farm loses two or 20 tons of topsoil per acre yearly due to erosion, depends on how you handle the water that falls on sloping fields.

Making rain work for instead of against you, is largely a matter of good soil management. Agronomists have found that soils high in organic matter soak up more water quickly and store it for growing crops.

Water "walks" instead of runs off well-managed land that has the benefit of soil-building rotations, deep-rooted legumes, plenty of fertilizer and conservation tillage methods. Water makes a quick getaway on naked, overcropped land that has been mined of its organic matter and plant nutrients.

**More Trucking Comfort

**Uncle Sam Conducts  
Crop Report Service  
Surrounds Compilation  
Of Data With Secrecy**

A question which pops up almost every time anyone talks with a farmer is: "How's the crop coming along?"

Of course, the individual farmer can only reply concerning the condition of his own, or his neighbor's crops, and he is as interested in the question of how the nation's

crops are coming along as is anyone else—in fact more vitally interested than anyone else except other farmers.

The only person who knows how the "crop is coming along"—that is, the nation's overall crops—is a mythical person, Uncle Sam; but he knows and he tells.

His information is gathered from 41 U.S. crop reporting offices, compiled in Washington, and released on or about the 10th of every month as a service of the agriculture department's bureau of agricultural economics. There are about 500 reports made each year, and the farmer who follows these reports knows what is happening in the field of agriculture and he regulates the operation of his own fields accordingly.

The farmers, themselves, are the reporters, having been sending information to the government ever since 1862 when crop reporting began during Lincoln's administration. No pay is received by the farmers for this work, yet some of them have faithfully kept up reports for 40 years.

### Caution Urged In Use Of Chemicals, Sprays

However, these can often have just the opposite effect on people. Even though the container may not bear the skull and crossbones label, caution is necessary since many substances are harmful in some ways to man, despite the fact that they may not be definitely poisonous.

The whole story of safety in use of insecticides, it was pointed out, is simply precaution.

### Technique Is Outlined For Reclaiming Leather

One way to bring mildewed leather back into service in short order, say home management specialists, is to wipe it with a cloth wrung out in diluted alcohol.

Use one cup of denatured alcohol to one cup of water. Then, if necessary, wash with thick suds of mild, neutral soap, or saddle soap; wipe with a damp cloth, and dry in an airy place. When dry polish with good wax dressing.

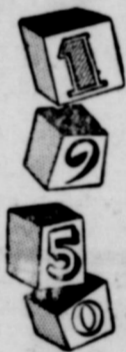

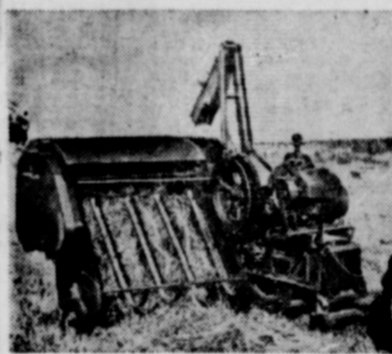
