DEATH CLAIMS SON OF MR. AND MRS. BARNES

Tracheo-bronchitis was fatal Christmas morning for the infant of Mr. and Mrs. Ellis Barnes, the baby passing away about eleven o'clock in a Lubbock hospital where he had been under treatment for several days.

Funeral services for little Ellis Dean were held from the First Baptist church at three o'clock last Thursday afternoon, with Rev. Bryan, assisted by Rev. O. M. Addison, conducting the rites in the presence of scores of sorrowing friends. Interment was made in the city cemetery.

Little Ellis Dean was born June 9, 1939, being just past eighteen months old when he was taken. An unusually handsome and friendly little fellow, he was a pet and favorite of everyone who knew him, so that his death was a personal grief to the entire community. While his illness was at first not considered serious, his parents thought it better to leave him in the hospital, where his mother and sister, Bobbie Lucille, were already receiving medical treatment. Within a few hours, it became necessary to put a tube in his throat, and a special nurse was called from Oklahoma City. All efforts to save him were unavailing, and the end came shortly before noon on Christmas day.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ellis Barnes, his sister, Bobbie Lucille, his grandparents, Mrs. A. J. Barnes of this place and Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Townzen of Brownfield, and other relatives here.

The index joins with other friends in extending deepest sympathy to the bereaved family.

NEW OFFICIALS TAKE OFFICE THIS WEEK

Several Changes in County Jobs

Wednesday, January 1st, began a New Year in more senses than one for on that day county and district officials elected in November began their tenure of office.

There were several changes in the official family, there being several new holders of precinct, county and district offices.

The 30th Senatorial District will be represented the next four years by a new senator, Marshall Formby, of Dickens having been elected to succeed Senator G. H. Nelson who was not a candidate for re-election.

There will also be a new representative, Hop Halsey of Lubbock, who succeeds Alvin R. Allison of Levelland, who unsuccessfully sought a promotion to the office of State Senator.

A Tahokan, County Attorney Rollin McCord stepped into the office of District Attorney, a place which he won in a hot contest over a candidate from every county in the district except Evakum. He succeeded Truett Smith, who did not run for re-election after serving two terms. Mr. Smith will engage in private law practice at the present, his office being located in the Dean Wilson building.

District Judge Louis E. Reed was not up for election he having two more years to serve of his present four-year term.

Miss Hattie Server will continue as district clerk of Lynn county. She had no opponent in the election. She will begin her third term in that office.

Chester Connolly will succeed Judge P. W. Good in the office of County Judge. Judge Good, who has held that office two terms, has not made definite plans for the future.

R. P. Weather will take the office as Tax Assessor-Collector, to succeed A. M. Cade, who has been in office the past 5 terms.

Mr. Cade has no statement to make concerning his future plans just now, but will remain in Tahoka for the present, he stated Saturday.

Calloway Huffaker will serve as county attorney, the place vacated by Rollin McCord. He was elected without opposition.

Sheriff B. L. Parker, who has served as sheriff of Lynn county for the past ten years, and as a deputy prior to that time, will finish his sixth term of office, Sheriff Parker, who has served as president of the West Texas Peace Officers Association, is one of the best known officers in this part of the state. He had two opponents in the first primary and won in the second.

Mrs. Lois Daniel, county treasurer, and Walter Mathis, county clerk, will each begin serving their second terms. Neither of these had opposition in the recent election.

The tenure of office of the county superintendent, like the district judge, is four years, so Mrs. Lenora M. Tunnell has two more years of her present term.

Waldo McLaurin is the only commissioner to remain in office. He will continue as Commissioner from Precinct 3.

W. O. Anderson will succeed George Small as Commissioner for Precinct 4.

Leon Ennings succeeds Tom Hale as Commissioner for Precinct 4.

Mr. Hale ran for sheriff as was not a candidate for Commissioner.

PROGRESS IS MADE ON RIGHT-OF-WAY

Right-of-way for the proposed paved county highway extending west from O'Donnell to a point where it crosses the Lynn-Dawson line near Welch was practically cleared, the Commissioner's court announced recently, although not quite all of the deeds have been procured. The remainder of the deeds are expected any day, and it is hoped that the right-of-way will be definitely procured by the first of the year.

Little progress has been made on the proposed highway through Wilson to the Lubbock county line toward Slaton, however, although the commissioners have been working on that road diligently.

If these right-of-ways can be procured, and bonds can be voted in the county, there is a possibility of securing aid from the state to hard-surface these roads, although there is no positive assurance of such aid.

The project will be the first major problem to confront the incoming Commissioner's Court and County Judge.

DALLAS AIRPLANE COLLEGE, INC. OPENS WITH H. E. BYRNE, PRES.

Many Thousand Trained Workers will be needed in Dallas Airplane Factories.

Occasioned by the need for trained workers in the Aircraft industry throughout the United States, and the fact that plants in Dallas alone will need many thousand trained workers, H. E. Byrne, for many years identified with the training of young men and young women of Texas and the Southwest for office positions has opened the Dallas Airplane College, Inc., as a department of the old established Byrne College and School of Commerce in Dallas, and is offering approved work for work in the aircraft industry.

Special attention has been given the arrangement of the plant and equipment and students will be taught to overcome the very problems that will confront them in an airplane factory. All instructors are government licensed men of long experience in the aircraft industry, so training in the Dallas Airplane College may, in a sense, be classed as apprenticeship in the factories. A decided advantage, however, is that the course requires only from six to eight weeks and each student receives personal instruction. Much stress is placed on sheet metal theory and in practical shop work in aircraft fabrication. Instructors maintain a sympathetic understanding of the students' problems and no individual who possesses unusual ability is overlooked.

Dallas is fast becoming the Southwest's center of the aircraft industry and the training offered by the Dallas Airplane College will be of special interest to those young men who do not feel inclined to office positions.

Prospective students, their families and friends are cordially invited to visit the college which will prove an interesting experience in ascertaining just what goes into the manufacture of an airplane.

SHRIMP A LA CREOLE

Though fried chicken and baked ham usually hold first place in the mind of the visitor to the South who has enjoyed a real southern dinner, there is usually a place in his memory for fine seafood dishes such as

- Shrimp A La Creole
- 100 fine shrimp
- 1 large onion
- 1 tablespoon margarine
- No. 2 1/2 can tomatoes, or 12 fresh tomatoes.
- 4 celery stalks
- 1 clove of garlic
- 1 sprig of thyme
- 2 bay leaves
- salt and pepper to taste
- a dash of tabasco

Boil the shrimp in water seasoned with plenty of pepper, garlic, onion, bay leaf, thyme, etc. Peel off shells when shrimp have boiled about 20 minutes, leaving them whole. Place in a dish. Chop fine 1 onion and brown it with tablespoon of margarine. Add tomatoes, celery, garlic, thyme, bay leaf, salt, pepper and a dash of tabasco. After this mixture has cooked for 10 minutes, add the whole shrimp and let cook for ten minutes more. Serve over rice. Yields 8 to 10 servings.
