Street Work Going Forward; The First Caliche Layer Placed

Work on hard-surfacing Doak street through O'Donnell is going forward without interruption, in spite of inclement weather. For a day or two mud from melting snow and ice made it necessary for the workmen to labor in a slime pit, but they donned boots and stayed on the job.

The first layer of caliche was dumped last week, and water trucks have been making the rounds since that time, setting it down. The roller has gone over the stretch, crushing the huge lumps.

Paving will extend from curb to curb only through the two business blocks, but the state highway department will pour its regulation highway width on through town, finally connecting the loop with the highway after it crosses the railroad.

Between twenty-five and thirty men have been employed in this work for the past two weeks.

BONUS BILL EXPECTED TO HELP THIS TERRITORY

A. C. Lambert, adjutant of the Fern Allen post of the American Legion, states that approximately fifty-six men in the O'Donnell territory are eligible for receiving the soldier bonus as authorized by the recent passage of that bill by Congress.

As the majority of these men served in either the 36th or the 90th division, they will be eligible for the maximum amount, or around \$700 each. With these figures before us, it is quite evident that passage of this bill means that slightly more than \$39,000 will be due residents of our own territory. Almost two hundred thousand dollars will be due ex-service men in the county as a whole.

It is the general opinion that much of this money will be spent as soon as possible, clearing up debts, purchasing necessities which have almost become luxuries for scores of families, and then the purchase of those items which mean the difference between living and merely existing. On the other hand, it is also believed that some ex-service men will hold one or two of several more of these bonds as security against possible emergency, and as security to obtain credit from other sources.

Our readers are of course aware of the fact that the amount due each ex-service man will be paid, not in actual cash, but in "baby bonds" of \$50 valuation, such bonds redeemable at any postoffice.

Mr. J. M. Noble has the application blanks ready to be filled out and sent in to Washington, and asks that we announce to all eligibles that they come in and give him the necessary information.

3,033 POLL TAX RECEIPTS ISSUED TO LYNN CITIZENS

Aubra M. Cade, tax collector of Lynn county, reports that a total of 3,033 poll tax receipts were issued to residents of Lynn county last month, or 175 less than in 1934.

On the other hand, this figure is larger than for any other preceding year except 1928, when 3,200 were issued. 177 exemption certificates were issued during January also.

Mr. Cade's records show that poll tax receipts were issued in the following numbers on these years: 1930, 3,019; 1928, 3,200; 1926, 3,012; 1924, 2,658.

As we stated several days ago, all the necessary acreage for the right-of-way has already been secured with the exception of three tracts, which belong to non-resident owners. These will naturally need a bit more time than that property whose owners are county residents.

F. C. Stanley, engineer in charge of Lynn county work, stated that some 65 men are employed at present, moving back the fences, the poles for the telephone lines, and other preliminary work which must be done before the road bed can be prepared for the first layer of caliche.

P. O. Department Announces Exams For Postmastership

Postmaster Hal Singleton is this week in receipt of a notice from the post office department at Washington announcing that applications may now be received for the office of postmaster at the O'Donnell postoffice. All applications must be in the office at Washington by the close of February 21st.

The civil service examination to determine the eligibility of such applicants will be held some time immediately after the 21st, and each applicant will be notified personally when to appear before the examining board. Mr. Singleton stated Tuesday that this examination will probably be held at Tahoka, and that the postmaster general will appoint someone to hold said examination.

In view of the fact that Mr. Singleton has been a staunch Republican for many years, he is not placing an application for consideration.

We understand that several local parties plan to take this examination, so that it is still very uncertain just who will hold the job when Mr. Singleton's term expires in June. The following requirements are made of all applicants:

Applicants must submit to the examiner on the day of the examination their photographs taken within two years, securely pasted in the space provided on the admission cards sent them after their applications are filed. Types or proofs will not be accepted.

Age—Applicants for this examination must have reached their twenty-first birthday and must not have passed their sixty-sixth birthday on the date of close of receipt of applications. These age limits are waived in the case of veterans of the World War, the Spanish American War, and the Philippine Insurrection; provided that they get the benefit of such waiver, documentary proof of such service must be submitted with the application.

Residence—Applicants for this examination must have actually resided within the delivery of the vacancy office for one year immediately preceding the closing date for receipt of applications.

Applications—Form 10 and Form 222, containing full information as to the requirements to be met and the character of the examination to be given may be obtained from any one of the vacancy offices listed or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. Applications must be properly executed showing the examination point at which the applicant desires to be examined and must be filed with the Commission at Washington prior to the close of business on the date specified at the head of the announcement.

The Post Office department will not appoint to the position of postmaster any of the following: (a) The husband or wife of a rural carrier; (b) A person in a contract for carrying the mails, either as contractor, sub-contractor, or surety, nor any member of his immediate family.

Warning—All persons are warned against offering promising, paying, soliciting, or receiving any money of other valuable thing as a political contribution or otherwise for use of influence, support, or promise of support in obtaining appointment. Any such act is a violation of law, and offenders will be prosecuted.

WEST TEXAS TEACHERS TO MEET IN LUBBOCK

The annual meeting of the West Texas Teachers Association will convene in Lubbock this week-end, according to dispatches received at this office, and the enclosed program indicates that it will be a most interesting and enlightening session. The formal program will open on Friday, February 14, and will continue thru Saturday.

Dr. Bradford A. Knapp, president of Texas Technological college, will preside at the welcome meeting, and will deliver the welcome address. A. E. Sanders, superintendent of the Littlefield school system, will give the response.

Many other educational leaders of this part of the state will be present to take part in the various departments of the convention. One of the most interesting features, however, will be the address from Dr. W. C. Holden, head of the History Department at Tech, with the subject "Texas and West Texas, Yesterday and Today." This address is scheduled for 10:30 o'clock Friday evening. At 9:30 on the same evening, State Senator G. H. Nelson will speak on "Legislative Reforms for Texas."

Mr. Garrard will speak on "The part of the State Board of Education in the Production of a 'Vitalized Curriculum.'" More than 2,000 teachers from all over West Texas are expected to attend this meeting, and Sup. E. E. We hope to have a complete report of affairs of the convention as seen by local teachers in time for next week's Index.
