### DIVORCE AND REMARRIAGE NO. 2

From last week's examination of Matthew 19:3-9 we learn that one of the scriptural reasons for divorce and remarriage was fornication, or unfaithfulness on the part of one of the marriage part-ners. The second, and only other reason for divorce and remarriage, is abandonment of the Christian marriage partner by a non-

In the seventh chapter of the I Corinthian letter the apostle Paul sets forth certain inspired precepts with regard to marriage and the marriage relationship. In 7:8,9 he gives instructions to the unmarried. He advises them not to marry, and he gives this reason for this bit of advice: "I think therfore that this is good by reason of the distress that is upon us, namely, that it is good for a man to be as he is. Art thou loosed from a wife? seek not a wife" (I Cor. 7:26, 27.) In 7:10, 11 he gives instructions to the man and wife who are Christians. "But unto the married I give charge, yea not I, but the Lord. That the wife depart not from her husband ( but should she depart, let her remain unmarried, or else be reconciled to her husband); and that the husband leave not his wife." This passage reveals that a man and wife who are Christians have no scriptural right to remarry. They must either remain unmarried or be reconciled.

In 7:12 - 15 Paul gives instructions to the Christian who married to a non-Christian. "If any brother hath an unbelieving married to a non-Christian. "If any broader him not leave her . . wife, and she is content to dwell with him, let him not leave her . . the Yet if the unbelieving departeth, let him (or her) depart; the brother or sister is not under bondage in such cases . Christian man and wife is under bondage not to be remarried, but to be reconciled. The Christian partner who is forsaken by the un-believer is "not under bondage;" therefore, the inference is that the forsaken Christian is free to remarry. It is to be noticed that the Christian partner is not to take the initiative in bringing about a separation. The Christian must remain married to the unbeliever as long as the unbeliever is content to dwell with

These are the only scriptural reasons for divorce and remar-riage, and the man and woman who desires to be well-pleasing unto God will abide by them

### BILL TO HELP DROUTH AREA IS PROPOSED

Rep. George Mahon of the 19th Texas District, has joined with several other Texas Congressmen and Senators in introducing legislation in the new session of Congress designed to bring early assistance drouth-stricken areas of Texas and the Southwest. The proposal as worked out and presented was term ed a "two-fold approach to the drouth problem."

The bill was described in the floor of the house by Rep. Poage of Waco, chairman Poage of Waco, chairman of the House Committee on Agricult-ure, as calling for immediate assistance to farmers and ranchers in the wide area of Texas and the the wide area of Texas and the Southwest who are in desperate need of help. Mahon and Poage pointed out that the prime purpose of the bill would require the Department of Agriculture to make payments to land owners who will agree to defer the use of their depleted pasture lands for agriculture. pleted pasture lands for periods of not less than 12 months. The pro-gram would become effective im-mediately and would continue over mediately and would continue over a period of three years after the drouth is broken. Mr. Mahon explained that the present crisis could well become a permanent condition unless steps were taken to give the parched pasture land a chance to recover.

Another feature of the bill would instruct the Secretary of Agriculture to assist in providing protein feed concentrates such as cotton-seed cake. Members of the group said they felt the cake was needed immediately to maintain the range herds of the southwest and that type program would be cheaper and more effective than the hay or grain program now being carried out. "This bill would enable the stricken areas to take the steps which they know to be sound from a conservation standpoint but which they cannot afford to take in the absence of some Government pro-gram," the lawmakers explained.
