
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Q - 1 am planning to take on the-job training under the Korean GI Bill. How many hours - week is considered to be full-time training?

A -- Full-time training is con-sidered to be the standard work-week of the firm where you are taking your training, but it gen-erally may not be less than 36 hours a week

-- I applied for Korean Bill schooling shortly before my three- year starting deadline. Before I actually could begin class. I became ill. My deadline passed while I still was in bed, unable to go to school. Now that I am well again. will I be allowed to start under the Korean GI Bill?

No. The law resuires that you actually must have started your GI training within three years from the date of your separation from service. There are no exceptions to this provision of the law

--- I am a world war II vet-Q eran with a service connected dis-ability. I am in need of outpatient medical treatment for my ailment Can I just go to my own doctor and ask him to send the bill to VA?

A -- No. You must get prior authorization from VA. .n order to obtain outpatient medical care. Also, you must go to a doctor authorized to provide this treat-ment at Government expense.

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
