James Lemmons, our local Tex s Electric man, told us that his ife's grandfather, H. S. House Rebuilt Three Times

One nite while the Earl was ntertaining 40 guests with a rinking party, fire destroyed the rge beautiful ranch house. After uying the land, Mr Miller re-nilt the house at the exact spot f the former house. The house as since been rebuilt three imes, always at the same exact cation of the original house.

Mr. Lemmons said that as he recalled stories of the Earl that he was a good looking, cultured Englishman who died at 40 as the results of excessive use of fire-water. He always had lots of noney. One time he walked into Big Spring bar and ordered a drink of spider juice. Not being served as promptly as he desired, Earl became angry and purchased the bar . . . there and then. Another time he found the local hotel filled with "no vacancy" sign out. Yep, he bought the hotel and threw the guests out Rode To Hounds

Mr. Lemmons said the Earl. althou a titled Englishman, was tough as an old boot and he enoyed bar-room fights with the owboys. One of his sports was iding to hounds dressed in the tradition of the English fox hunts. Jim said he doubted last week's yarn about the bear but that the remains of the Earl was returned to England for burial. Big Spring Was Trading Center For This Area

In 1949 Big Spring celebrated its 100th birthday. Mr Lemmons said that he and others pumped the original spring to cause it to flow for the observance. The spring, now dry, is at the upper end of the T. and P. Lake on the

San Angelo road. settlers here, among them Glenn Allen, tell-us that they freighted supplies from Big Spring, Lamesa, Tahoka, Lubbock had not come into being or were merely tiny ranch villages. Big Spring at time of Civil War was the only "town" between Abilene and the all-Spanish town of El

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
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Hearing Important

Most of us take our hearing for granted. It probably has never occurred to us what a change it would make in our lives if we were suddenly deprived of it. We seldom think of the numerous sounds we hear during the day, sounds which keep us in close touch with the world about us. For those who can't hear, or who have difficulty hearing, it's almost like living in a different world, declared Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer.

There are many children, more than a million it's estimated, who live in this other world. They have either been born deaf or have lost much, or maybe all, of their hear-ing since birth. Being somewhat somewhat cut off from the world, the deaf communicate his feelings and need to others. A sense of inferiority and hostility is frequently the result.

Most hearing loss in children i the result of repeated colds and in-fections in the ears, nose, and throat. Such infections can cause what we know as conduction deafness. If such infections are not treated early, a child's hearing may receive permanent damage. Hearing loss may follow measles, scarlet influenza, or meningitis These diseases may result in what is referre to as nerve deafness.

Enlarged adenoids, the result of infections, account for many cases of partial loss of hearing. The overgrown adenoids block up the little tubes that 'lead from the throat to the ears. These tubes must be open and clear for good hearing. For these children, curing infection isn't enough. Their ade-noids may have to be removed. Otherwise, they may suffer permanent hearing loss.

Not all children with a hearing loss can regain it. A serious infection, such as meningitis, can completely destroy the patient's hearing ability. As soon as deafness is suspected the child should be taken to an ear specialist for a complete examination
