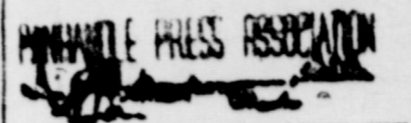

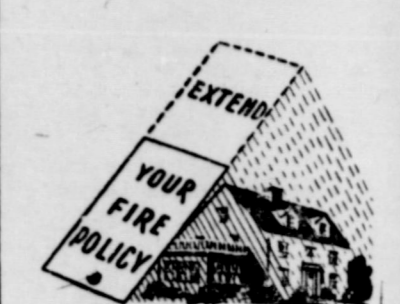

**Smart Prairie Dogs Build Huge Towns**

BAR HARBOR, Me.—If anyone ever tells you that your home town is going to the dogs, consider some towns that have always belonged to the dogs—prairie dogs. These squirrel like rodents are as capable in many ways of forming livable communities as man is.

Their social behavior, which has been studied by the staff of the Roscoe B. Jackson Memorial laboratory here, resembles that of clannish human communities. Prairie dog towns are often enormous, covering tens or even hundreds of square miles and providing homes for thousands of animals. Despite the continuity of the towns, cliques of as many as 40 dogs are formed. The members keep out strangers. Young and old dogs of both sexes do the excluding.

Members of a clique are happy when they are not fighting a war. They groom one another, play among themselves, defend one another against strangers, and work together to build their burrows in peace.

The advantages of social harmony are shown in adaption to the environment. Amount and kinds of food available are controlled. The "dogs" cooperate in furnishing themselves with numerous homes and refuges. Such advantages might easily be lost by overpopulation, which could cause mass starvation and disease. But the smart prairie dogs exercise and control the density of their num-

**Soldier Goes Home AWOL to Read Bible**

GROVE CITY, Pa.—A 22-year-old soldier went AWOL from his army post recently and took refuge in his hometown because he wanted to go to a Bible school. Three men seized him here recently and brought to an end his three-week armed holdout in his home.

Two Federal Bureau of Investigation agents and a military policeman persuaded the soldier to come from the house by posing as newspapermen and asking him to come out and pose for a picture. He left in the house the pistol and gun with which he had said he would resist arrest by shooting to kill.

The youth struggled with the agents for several minutes as his mother harangued the officers. He was overpowered, placed in the agents' automobile and taken away.

The soldier was Allen Keller, a blond, soft-spoken boy who left Camp Kilmer, N.J., in an overnight pass.

Keller's mother said the officers, who were dressed in civilian clothing, hustled her son into an automobile and drove away. She said she had learned shortly afterward that her son, who believed peace the only solution to the world's woes, may have been planning to kill himself.

She found a note in his clothing, she declared, saying that "laws made by the men in the government and their lack of understanding have caused me much pain and suffering, but forgive them." Mrs. Keller said her son wrote that he wished the note read at his funeral.

**Accountant Can Get Goods on Credit Easier Than Others**

URBANA - CHAMPAIGN, Ill.—When you want to buy goods on credit, you will find it a lot easier if you are an accountant or auditor than if you happen to be a laborer or farm hand, regardless of your income. Your occupation doesn't determine your credit rating, but it helps.

"The more specific factors which aid in determining reliability of risk are occupation, the amount and regularity of income, age, reserve assets of various kinds, character, and reputation," says Robert S. Hancock of the University of Illinois marketing faculty.

He recently studied occupations in relation to credit in cooperation with the Associated Credit Bureaus of America. He reports findings in "Current Economic Comment," quarterly journal of the University's Bureau of Economic and Business Research.

Business executives, accountants, and auditors got the best ratings from credit bureaus and department store credit managers. Next were independent and chain store retail managers, and a group including physicians, surgeons, and dentists. Public officials—federal, state, and local—ranked 19th in a list of 42 occupations. Transient and seasonal workers got the lowest rating.

A similar study made in 1941 at Illinois by marketing professor P. D. Converse gave army and navy officers next to the top rating, and ranked the medical men 12th and 14th as credit risks. In Hancock's study the officers dropped to 8th place, while doctors and dentists upped their rating.
