Governor Price Daniel today strongly urged all Texans to join in the Crusade to conquer cancer by designating April as Cancer Control Month in Texas and Tuesday, April 15 as Texas Cancer Control Day.

Urging all Texans to join in the crusade against this disease, Governor Daniel called attention to the fact that in 1957 alone cancer killed more than 10,000 Texans. "It is estimated," he said, "that there are more than 60,000 cancer cases in this State, and the number continues to grow."

Praising the present Texas Cancer Control Program now supported by the annual April educational fund-raising Crusade, Governor Daniel stated, "Remarkable advances have

been made in the control of cancer, to the extent that the disease can now be arrested in one out of three cases. The American Cancer Society has played a significant role in these advances through its threefold program of education, service to the patient, and research."

Pointing up the fact that "the medical resources of our nation are centered today on developing a cure for cancer," he emphasized that with our present knowledge of the disease, "half of those who develop cancer could be saved if they would accept the personal responsibility of informing themselves of the dangers of cancer and heed the message of the American Cancer Society to have regular health checkups."

"Through the efforts of the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society," he continued, "lives are being saved -- and many more will be saved in the future."

To continue support of its attack on cancer, the American Cancer Society is seeking \$30,000,000 nationally during the April Crusade to intensify its program of research, education and service to cancer patients.

The Texas Division of the Society was successful in raising over \$1,084,000 last year for Research, education and service in Texas, and anticipates that it will reach or exceed this figure through the coordinated efforts of its 80,000 volunteers in Texas this year.

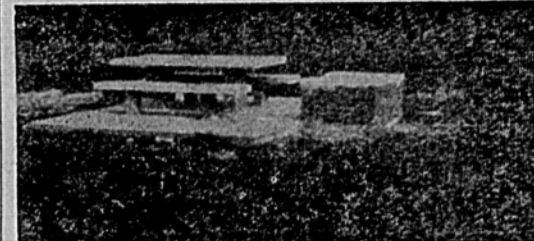
## Terry Joy Stops Novice In No-Hitter

### Texas Traffic Safety Quiz . . . .

(Ed. Note: One each month, the Texas Traffic Safety Council will present the Texas Traffic Safety Quiz, prepared by the Safety Education Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety and distributed by the Texas Press Association.)

Q—If I signal properly for a turn in mid-block, do I have

the same legal protection as in making a left turn at an intersection?

A—No. At an intersection, the driver who is meeting you and who is far enough away to slow down safely, is required to yield for you to turn left, provided you have signaled properly. He is not required to yield to you in mid-block only when your vehicle will not interfere with the movement of other traffic. (Some city ordinances prohibit the mid-block left turn, espec-

ially in business areas.)

Q—Are blinking lights a legal signal for making turns, the same as hand signals?

A—Yes. If you are talking about directional signals mounted on each side of the car, front and rear, which a driver can turn on and off. A warning for a turn may be given by either a directional light signal or a hand and arm signal, or by both. (At night, the directional signal is safer.)

Q—If I am backing out of an angle-parking stall, does a car coming up from behind me have the right of way? If it does, how can I get out when traffic is heavy?

A—Yes. A driver starting from a parked position is responsible for the start being made with safety. The best thing for you to do is wait for a break in traffic. If there is a signal light at the intersection behind you, wait until the light is red before you start backing.

Q—A truck had two signs on the back of its trailer. The left sign read: "Passing Side". The right sign said: "Suicide." This truck passed me on the right side. Was this an illegal pass?

A—No if the right side of the roadway was wide enough for two lines of traffic to move safely. The signs referred to driving off the pavement of a two-lane road to pass on the right side. Such a pass on the right side is illegal.

Q—What is the speed limit for pick-ups outside of towns?

A—60 MPH in daytime, 55 at night. These limits apply to all commercial vehicles which have a rated load capacity of 1,500 pounds or less.

### Storm Cellar Is Good Insurance

If you were to see the destructive, black funnel of a tornado rushing directly toward your home, where would you and your family go for protection and safety?

No, this question is not far-fetched. In fact, many Texans have experienced this and other similar disasters from time to time. Many of them had never realized the value of a safe place just as we never miss the water until the well goes dry.

But, why not construct a storm cellar before a tornado strikes to remind you that you need one? It can be constructed easily without any special skills and only a few special tools.

Since tornadoes generally travel from southwest to northeast, the storm cellar should be located southwest of the house. Its entrance should face northeast. It should be located far enough from the house that a falling wall, large trees or other debris will not block the entrance. Too, select a well-drained site which can be landscaped to harmonize with the home surroundings.

Storm cellars should be constructed strong enough to withstand the impact of falling debris. It should also be watertight, economical and relatively easy to keep.

The size of the cellar depends on expected use. For an extended period of comfortable occupancy, allow about ten square feet of floor area per person. Short occupancy requires only about two square feet per person. Adequate ventilation should be provided.

Instructions on constructing a satisfactory storm cellar plus other information, such as other uses for the cellar, food storage, for example, is contained in a Texas Agricultural Extension Service leaflet, L-388, "The Disaster Cellar." It may be obtained from local county agents or the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

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### SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

Important new information, including results of a farm pond survey just completed in Texas, was released today by H. N. Smith, State Conservationist, of the Soil Conservation Service.

Smith stated that the survey was made in response to questions raised during the recent drought concerning the effect of conservation measures on water supply. Municipal and industrial users of water were greatly interested in the outcome of the survey.

Farm ponds were singled out for the study, because some had felt that they might have more effect on water yield than any other single practice. When the survey was begun, little definite information was available as to the number of ponds, their location, or the real effect they might have on water supply.

Information gathered included total number of farm and ranch ponds by major watersheds, surface area, drainage area, capacity and depth. Any pond built by a farmer or rancher primarily for livestock water was considered as a farm or ranch pond. From these data, such information as the percent of total land area draining through ponds, the total surface area by watersheds and for the state, the total capacity, and other items could be compiled.

The information was gathered on a representative sampling basis. In addition to its being expanded on a major river watershed basis, it also can be calculated on a land resource area basis, thus increasing the usefulness to water planners.

The survey revealed that for the state as a whole there are almost 342,000 farm ponds. When filled to capacity, these ponds had an original total storage of approximately 932,000 acre-feet. When the survey was made, an estimated 100,000 acre-feet of the original capacity had been filled by sediment. The total surface area of the ponds was about 248,000 acres, and the total drainage area 12,737,000 acres. The average pond capacity when full was 2.72 acre-feet, the average surface area 0.72 acre-feet, the average minimum depth 10.57 feet, and the average drainage area per pond 37.25 acres.

For three of the major river watersheds in the state, the survey revealed the following: Watershed - Brazos; No. of Ponds, 93,000; Average Capacity,

2.61 acre feet; Aver. surface area, 1.72 acres; aver. drainage area 36.06 acres.

Trinity - No. of ponds, 61,800; average capacity 1.97 acre feet; aver. surface area, 0.52 acres; aver. drainage area, 19.36 acres.

Colorado - no. of ponds, 34,300; average capacity 3.12 acre feet; aver. surface area, 0.82 acres; aver. drainage area, 50.77 acres.

The total area draining through ponds comprises only 7.55 percent of the land area of Texas. This varied from a low of 0.44 percent in the Coast Prairie Resource Area to a high of 26.26 percent in the Reddish Prairie Resource Area of Northern Central Texas.

Smith stated that in many areas of the state, farm ponds are the major source of usable livestock water available to the farmer or rancher, and they play a vital role in the management of livestock grazing resources.



OLD-AGE AND SURVIVORS INSURANCE NEWS

The last article covered "quarters of coverage" and explained how this measure of Social Security coverage is obtained.

Now, how many of these quarters do you need to be eligible for payments?

To be eligible for Social Security when you reach the retirement age, you must be "fully insured." In order to be fully insured, you need quarters of coverage equal to one-half the time since 1950 (or since the year in which you reached 21 if that was after 1950) up until you reach the retirement age or up to the time of your death.

These quarters may have been earned at any time after 1936 or at any age, so long as the total is equal to half the time since 1950 (or age 21) up to the retirement age or death.

A person reaching the retirement age now would need 14 quarters of coverage. Next year at this time he would need 16, the year after 18, etc. The minimum requirement in any case is 6 and the maximum is 40 quarters or 10 years.

The retirement age for women is 62 and for men it is 65. So any man born 1906 or later and any woman born 1909 or later will need 40 quarters of coverage to get retirement benefits.

Some death benefits are payable when the worker is only "currently insured." You will be currently insured if you have at least six quarters of coverage out of the 13 calendar quarters ending with the quarter of death.

"Fully insured" and "currently insured" are explained fully in the booklet called "Your Social Security." There is also a handy chart from which you can determine how many quarters you need. Write for your free copy - Social Security Administration, P. O. Box 1641, Abilene, Texas.

### Lake Cleaned Fish Get Big First Year

Case history on a renovated Texas lake shows how fast bass will grow under proper conditions, according to the Director of Inland Fisheries of the Game and Fish Commission.

According to a report made by Ken Jurgens, Aquatic Biologist, a city lake at Taylor, covering three acres, was completely renovated in April, 1957. Rough fish were eradicated with a netting survey. A month later the lake was fertilized at the rate of 200 pounds to the acre.

In June, 800 bass fingerlings were stocked.

In November, a netting showed the bass ran from 6-8 inches in length. By January of this year they had reached 8-10 inches. Today they are running 10-11 inches in length.

Plans now are being made to pass an ordinance limiting fishing in this lake to persons under 16 years of age. It will be known as the "kid's fishing hole" for the city of Taylor, if the proposed ordinance passes.

"The handling of this lake is a fine example of what can be done to improve fishing," the Director said. "Where we have been able to go in and do a total kill and then restock the lakes with game fish under proper conditions the growth has been very remarkable."

"This same practice can be put into effect on private ranch tanks to improve the quality of fishing," he said. "Every time any water is renovated and then properly stocked someone benefits. We have enough ranch tanks in Texas to provide some very fine fishing. If they are put to use, it will relieve the pressure elsewhere."

As memory comes rolling down to the Spreading Pecan Tree, down at the forks of the creek in Buck's cow pasture at the head of Pecan Bayou

away out in the back country, the old "get-rich-in oil" propaganda puts its shadow on all my childhood slate pictures. I remember when a man without stock in Spindletop, Corsicana, Moran Shallow, of many of the other Texas fields, was viewed with pity -- he never had a chance to get wealthy. Then the next best bet to separate a man from his money was Arizona copper mining stock, a gold mine in Nevada, or a re-discovery of a lost vein along the Sacramento in California, and the mall had lots of beautiful stocks, bonds, shares and partnerships, to offer in an unending stream.

The copper shares were offered to Texans, the oil stock to the western inhabitants, and competition was close.

But weary of the abundance of offers, the invitations to buy, the bids, the proposals to invest, seeing thousands of dollars diverted from the legitimate payment of taxes to fake stock and bonds, a tax official, one C. M. Zander of the territory of Arizona, presented a brand new proposition, one yet worthy of consideration.

Phoenix, Arizona, May 1, 1910

Dear Friend:

Knowing that you have some interest in "Skin Games," I take the liberty of presenting to you what seems to be a most wonderful business proposition. Perhaps you will wire me the amount of stock that you wish to subscribe to, toward the formation of this company.

The object of this company is to operate a large cat ranch in or near Kyrene, Arizona, where land can be purchased cheap for the purposes.

To start with, we will collect about, say one million cats. Each cat will average twelve (12) kittens per year. The skins run from 10 cents each for the white ones, to seventy-five cents for the pure black. This will give us twelve million skins a year to sell at an average price of thirty cents each, making our revenue about ten thousand dollars per day gross.

A man can skin about sixty cats per day for two dollars, it takes about one hundred men to operate the ranch, and therefore the net will be about nine thousand, eight hundred dollars per day.

Mr. Zander was killed in an airplane accident in the 1930's while campaigning for Governor of Arizona. This was originally typed on the stationery of Valley Realty and Trust Company of Phoenix. Mr. Zander was at one time Chairman of the Tex Commission of the State of Arizona.

### Tax Relief For Storm Victims

Taxpayers suffering casualty losses from tornadoes, floods and other disasters during 1957 may deduct their losses on their Federal tax returns for that year. A. E. Fogle, Jr. of Internal Revenue Service, Abilene, said.

Amount of loss to be deducted is measured by the fair market value of the property just before the casualty, less its fair market value immediately after the casualty (but not more than the adjusted basis of the property) reduced by any insurance or compensation received.

Mr. Fogle explained that the term "casualty" means an identifiable event of a sudden, unexpected or unusual nature. Generally, this means that the loss must result from a sudden destructive force.

"Damage from a normal process, or from progressive deterioration of property through a steadily operating cause - such as the steady weakening of a foundation from usual weather elements - is not a casualty loss."

For taxpayers with casualty loss headaches from storms and such Mr. Fogle prescribes Revenue's free ten page Publication No. 155.
