In a very charming manner, Mrs. Noble began the Christmas customs of many lands by telling of the meaning of Christmas and its origin 2,000 years ago in Bethlehem one Holy Night. Mrs. Calvin Partain accompanied by Mrs. C. A. Doss at the piano, sang of this Holy Night so many years ago, and regardless of racial origin or geographical location, the celebrations of Christmas are similar— for running through all of them, in word and song, is the recognition of the greatest of all Holy Nights so long ago, yet still rings out, "Peace on Earth, Good Will to Men".

Some of the special customs in different lands were revealed by Mrs. Noble with illustrations. In Austria, at Christmas, great emphasis is placed upon light. Three large candles are especially prepared and as the family gathers around on Christmas Eve, the father lights the first candle. The second candle is lit on Christmas Day and the third on New Year's Day. Yule log is used in many countries. Bulgaria lights their Yule log before breakfast on Christmas Day. England lights their Yule log on Christmas Eve. "The Tree of Light" is used in China instead of the Christmas tree. This tree is decorated with brilliant paper flowers. In Czechoslovakia, it is the custom of all the people to visit their friends and foes and forgive any misunderstandings that have arisen during the year. As the carol singers march through the villages singing, each carries a small Bethlehem scene. Nearly all countries use the Bethlehem Scenes in their Christmas celebrations. The "pinata" is a pretty custom of our friends South of the Border in Mexico. A number of countries remember the animals and birds on Christmas Eve with extra sheaves of feed. Denmark and Norway include this remembrance in their festivities.

**Deadline Is Set
 On GI Insurance**

"The finest Christmas present is future security for the family," Jack Coker, manager of the Veterans Administration regional office at Waco, says. Pointing out that service-connected veterans have less than five months to take advantage of the re-opening of GI insurance.

Final deadline for application is midnight May 2, 1966. Those World War II and Korean Conflict veterans who failed to buy GI insurance or who bought it and later dropped it now have the chance to buy a new form of GI insurance provided they have a service-connected disability.

They do not have to be receiving compensation payments from the VA to be eligible.

The insurance is available in a variety of plans ranging from a low cost modified life plan to 20-year endowment.

Further details may be obtained at any VA regional office.

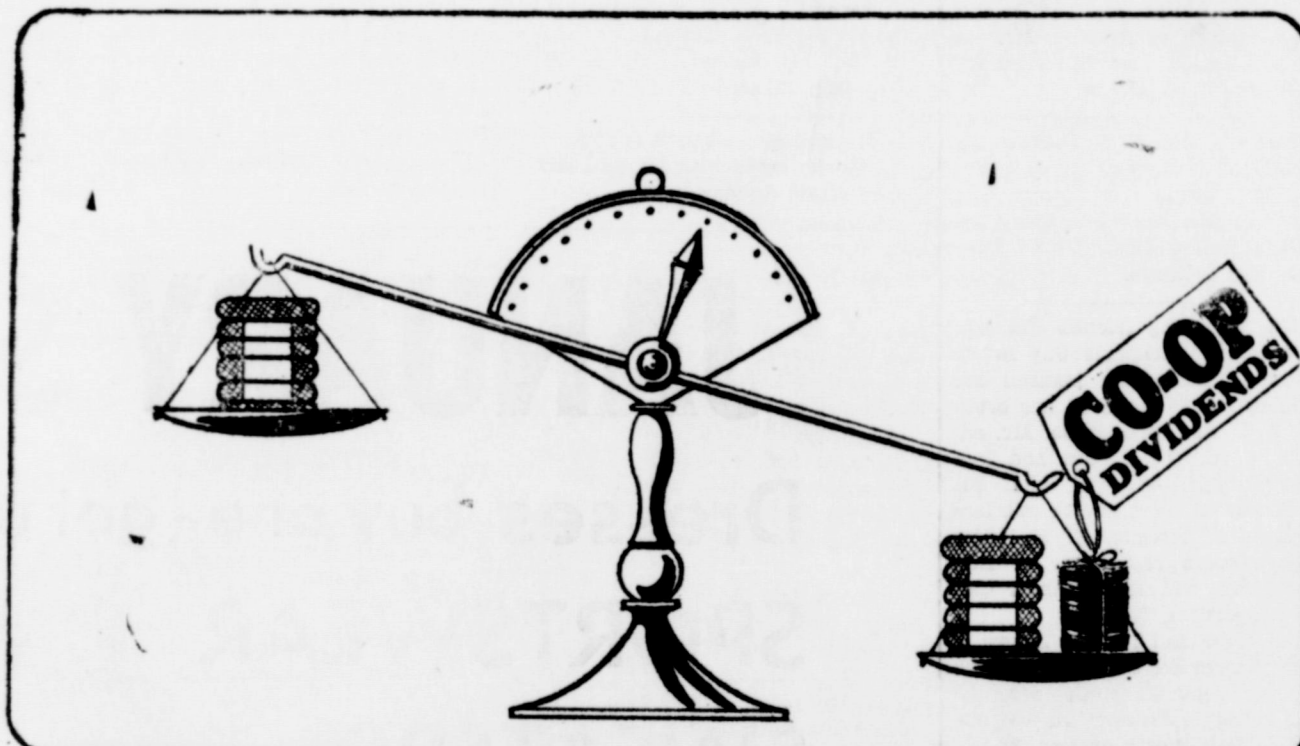

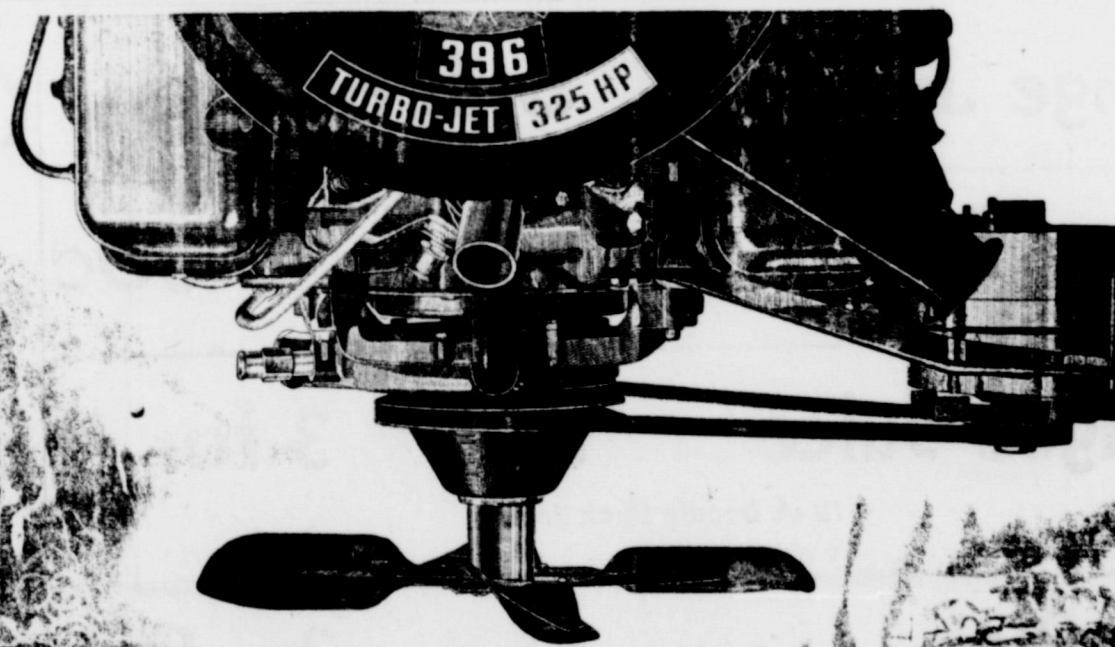
