Final deadline for application s midnight May 2, 1966. Those World War II and Korean Conflict veterans who failed

to buy GI insurance or who bought it and later dropped it now have the chance to buy a new form of GI insurance provided they have a service-connected disability.

They do not have to be receiving compensation payments from the VA to be eligible.

The insurance is available in a variety of plans ranging from a low cost modified life plan to 20-year endowment.

Further details may be obtained at any VA regional office.
