What is a high school "drop out"? More off than not he is little Johnny next door or perhaps little Jane down the street. They are kids you know.

Books may be written, and have been written, of this recent problem (which is a problem every nation of the world.)

This is not a "canned" editorial supplied by the Job Corps — with all research material supplied.

This column comes from the hearts of a man and wife who have a son — we Smiths (as the John Does of the world) have a "drop out" — less a fault of the child but more of the parents — and to a minor extent the school.

Harvest Near End

A round up of bins within the city showed 16,409 bales being ginned or about 35 percent of 1963 crop. The grain crop was estimated at 15 percent of 1963 crop. The cotton harvest is 99 percent complete and the grain harvest is complete.

A very dry and a very warm winter is cause for concern for the 1965 crop year. Some soil is too dry to be plowed. Within the city currently there are more vacant houses than during the peak of the 1953 drouth. Two local men are buying up farm property and the independent farmer is disappearing replaced by the "factory" farmer.

Route Boxes Must Be Maintained, Says Mr. Line

Postmaster Odie Line said this week "May we appeal to postal customers on rural routes to help their rural carriers make mail deliveries during bad winter weather. The post office has three rural routes over this area. Mr. Line listed these points of concern: 1. Approaches to rural mail boxes must be kept open by patrons. 2. Obstructions to delivery of mail on rural routes should be removed or minimized to the fullest extent possible.

Unless approaches are cleared, it may be necessary to temporarily withhold delivery of mail, Mr. Line said. Rural carriers are not required to perform service on foot when roads normally used can not be traveled but they are expected to make every reasonable effort to serve as many of their patrons as possible.

Wonderful for a party since it may be made the day before! GERMAN'S CHOCOLATE KIDNEY CAKE. 1 package (4 oz.) sweet cooking chocolate, 1 tablespoon water, 25 double Graham crackers. Dash of salt, 3 egg yolks, 1 cup heavy cream. Melt chocolate in water in saucepan over low heat, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add salt. Then add egg yolks, one at a time, beating well after each. Cool. Meanwhile, whip the cream; then fold a little into the cooled chocolate mixture. Blend well. Fold in the remaining cream, blending well. Chill. On serving platter, place 2 of the double crackers and to each spread with chocolate mixture. Top with alternate layers of crackers and chocolate mixture. Frost sides and top with chocolate mixture. Garnish with chocolate curls, if desired. Chill 6 to 12 hours in refrigerator. Slice and serve. Makes 6 servings.

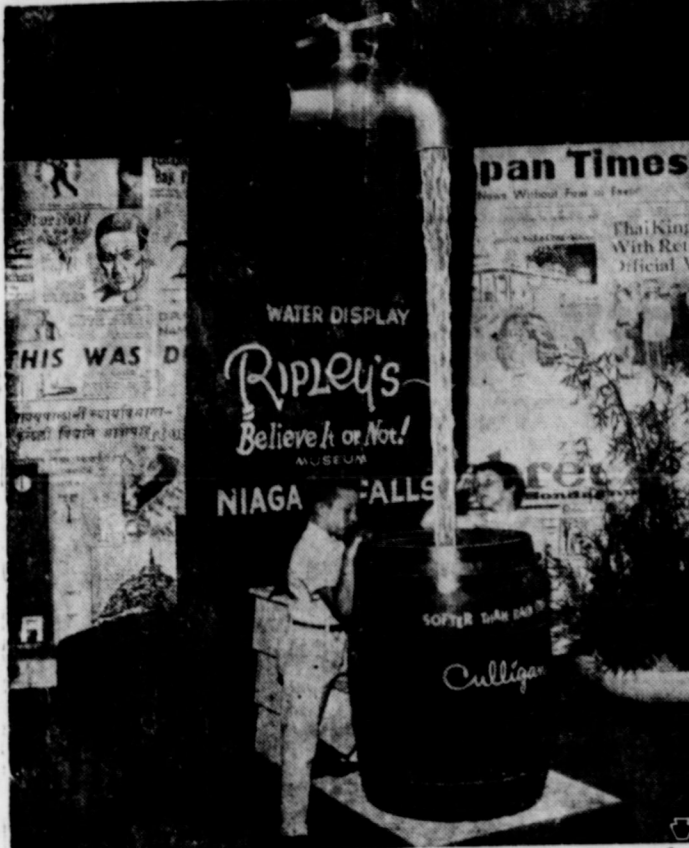

AMISH CAPITAL

This Town Has More Buggies Than Autos

ARTHUR, Ill.—On the streets you'll find more horses and buggies than automobiles. The hitch-rack is used every day in the week except Sunday.

For this is the home of one of the larger sects of Amish people in the country. Approximately 1,500 Amish live on the farms nearby. They are prosperous and friendly. They've never gotten in trouble, and mind their own business.

But strangers stare at them because the men are whiskered, wear homemade clothing and flat black hats. The women dress just as severely, and keep their heads covered. They dislike the automobile, and use the horse exclusively.

Hitch Rack Rules

Arthur has entire streets where the hitch-rack reigns. Signs are posted, prohibiting autos to park in these areas. The highways near Arthur are filled with the black-topped buggies of the Amish farmers.

Strangely the Amish have preserved many Old World traits, and yet form a harmonious segment in the area surrounding them. For although Arthur is known as "Capital of Amishland," there has never been any friction between these people and their non-Amish neighbors. They are extreme pacifists.

Make Own Clothes

Mention of the word Amish generally brings to mind a vague mental picture of queer, Quaker-looking people who ride in horse-drawn vehicles and wear plain clothes of their own making.

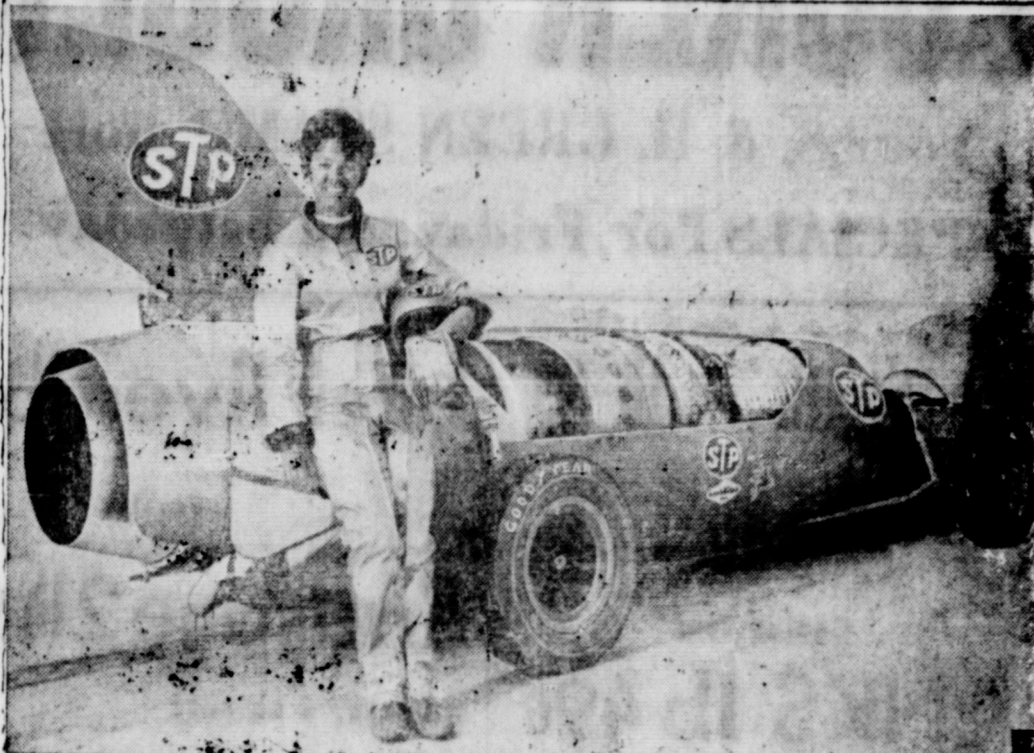

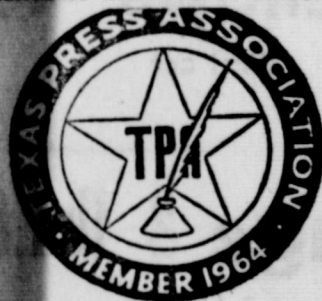

German's Chocolate "Quickie"



Only three steps are called for in making this excellent chocolate dessert, yet the recipe definitely belongs in any collection of glamour desserts. Wonderful for a party since it may be made the day before!

GERMAN'S CHOCOLATE ICEBOX CAKE
1 package (4 oz.) sweet cooking chocolate
1 tablespoon water
Dash of salt
2 egg yolks
1 cup heavy cream
12 double graham crackers

Melt chocolate in water in saucepan over low heat, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add salt. Then add egg yolks, one at a time, beating well after each. Cool. Meanwhile, whip the cream; then fold a little into the cooled chocolate mixture. Blend well. Fold in the remaining cream, blending well. CHILL.

On serving platter, place 2 of the double crackers end to end; spread with chocolate mixture. Top with alternate layers of crackers and chocolate mixture. Frost sides and top with chocolate mixture. Garnish with chocolate curls, if desired. Chill 8 to 12 hours in refrigerator. Slice and serve. Makes 8 servings.

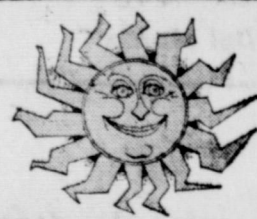

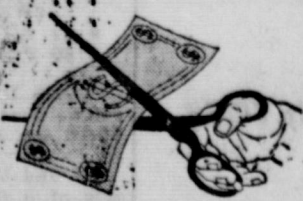
