in electric power lines."
Other dangerous practices connection with kite flying include using metalic cord or wire for the kite string, making the kite frame of metal, flying kites in the rain when even a cotton kite string can become a dangerous conductor of electricity and trying to retrieve kite in case it gets caught in electr-

ic wires.

"I know thy works, that those are neither cold nor hot; I would then wert cold or hot. So because those are lukewarm and neither hot nor cold. I will spew thee out of my mouth." (Rev. 3:15, 16)

The apostic John's letters to the seven churches of Asia were written for the purpose of correcting certain beliefs, attitudes and practices that were prevaient in these particular congregations. practices that were prevalent in these particular congregations.
The church at Ephesus had left its first love, and the churches at Pergaum and Thyatira had succumbed to the teaching of false prophets. The church at Sardis was spiritually dead, and the church at Laodicea was too cold to be hot and too hot to be cold.

It was a"lukewarm" -church. These letters to the seven churches of Asia, like all of the letters of the New Testament, were written for a two fold purpose. First, to set forth principles that, if followed, would correct the deficiencies that existed in these particular congregations. Second, to provide all Christians of future generations with the same princip-les for correcting the same deficiencies as they arise in various congregations thruout the entire Christian dispensation. There were other churches in Asia besides these seven, but these seven were selected because Their problems were characteristic of the problems that continually beset the churches of Christ in every age. Just as the I phesian church had left its first love, so also have many church of the past and present left their first love. Just as the churches of Pergamum and Thyatira had succumbed to the teaching of false prophets, so also have many churches of the past and present succumbed to the doctrines of false teachers. Thus the problems of the seven churches of Asia are problems that have have existed and will continue to exist until the river of time comes

The problem of the church at Laodicca is the problem that prevails in many of the churches of Christ today. We are too LUKE-WARM! There is nothing that is more nauseating to the Lord than a lukewarm, tepid, flabby, half-hearted, limp, indifferent, listless Christian. The Lord will yound them out of His mouth!




