## County Agent Is Doing Nice Work

Mr. R. E. Shaver has recently  
come to Lynn County as County  
Agent from Tulsa, where he was en-  
gaged to test the dairy herds of that  
section. Since coming here he has  
helped to increase the interest in  
better dairy cattle, having assisted in  
the purchase of 5 registered Jersey  
bulls and one registered heifer.

He has nine 4-H Clubs in process  
of organization in various parts of  
the county and expects to organize  
several more this spring. The farmers  
have kept him busy since coming  
here culling chickens, and assisting  
in terracing land. He reports that he  
has culled something like 4,000 hens,  
assisted in terracing about 1200 acres  
of land besides assisting Mr. B. M.  
Whitaker, Agricultural Manager of  
West Texas Chamber of Commerce in  
a two-day Terracing demonstration  
in this county.

## City Council Fix Summer Water Rate

At a regular meeting on Thurs-  
day night of last week the City Coun-  
cil set a new summer water rate to  
be effective beginning May 1st.

The new rate which applies to sum-  
mer irrigation allows the consumer  
a rate of 25 cents per thousand gal-  
lons for all water used above the  
minimum which is three thousand gal-  
lons.

The City Council fixed the above  
rate in order that all users may have  
a low water rate for the growing of  
lawns, trees and shrubbery which  
will be of untold benefit towards  
beautifying O'Donnell.

Mayor Wilder stated that the a-  
bove rate would remain in effect as  
long as the council deemed it neces-  
sary. The rate was made optional  
with the city council as to how long  
it will remain effective. In case the  
city water supply should become in-  
adequate the council has the right to  
revoke the above rate.

It is believed that all home own-  
ers will take advantage of the low  
water rate and within the next two  
years O'Donnell is expected to boast  
of her numerous beautiful lawns and  
trees. That would be something to

**MAY BEETLES THIS YEAR**

If certain broods of May Beetles, or "June bugs," which infest parts of the Middle West and East, keep their appointment as scheduled by their 3-year life cycle, they will appear this year; and many beetles this year means many white grubs next year. Once white grubs infests corn or any other field crop, it is impossible to save it, and prevention is therefore the safest plan. Crop rotations are especially important. A rotation of oats or barley, clover, and corn has proved very good in some sections, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Ground that is in cleanly cultivated corn or has a heavy stand of pure clover this year, or during any year the beetles are flying, will likely contain few grubs, as the beetles prefer land in small grain or timothy, or weeds in which to lay their eggs.

**"SACRED GRASS"**

Bermuda grass is known in India as "Sacred Grass," the belief being that it is a gift from some benevolent deity for the cows, but in parts of the United States it is called the "devil grass," on account of the difficulty in eradicating it when desired. On the whole, Bermuda grass is a decided blessing as pasture in the South. Many claim that it is less palatable and nutritious than other standard pasture grasses, but this idea is usually the result of poor management of the crop, the U. S. Department of Agriculture believes. Three things make for success in handling Bermuda grass. First, legumes should be seeded with it. It grows well in combination with white clover and lespedeza, and these legumes lengthen the grazing season and increase the nutritive value of the pasture. Second, the grass should not be allowed to get too large and stemmy; if the stock do not graze it closely enough, it should be mowed. Third, light applications of fertilizer, such as cotton seed meal or superphosphate, will keep the grass in a growing condition and are usually profitable.

**SLIGHT GRASSHOPPER DAMAGE ANTICIPATED**

College Station—The drone of the grasshopper hasn't had that menacing twang for the last few years because they've come to Texas in such small numbers as to be of little importance, and it is not anticipated that any general damage will be done this season. They were found laying their eggs in a few places last fall however, and farmers in scattered sections may soon find that something needs to be done about it. These eggs begin hatching in April, as a rule, especially if a period of warm rain occurs.

"Poisoned bran mash will be found effective wherever damage becomes serious," says R. R. Reppert, Entomologist in the Extension Service, and gives this formula: Mix up 20 pounds of bran, one pound Paris Green, two quarts of cane molasses, and six lemons, using both the juice and the rind. The lemons should be run thru a meat grinder. Mix up with enough water to make a thoroughly moist but not sloppy mash. Five pounds of this mixture should be enough for one acre of infested field applied broadcast. Usually it is unnecessary to poison an entire field but only the edges where the infestation is worst. Grasshoppers generally invade fields from adjoining pastures or woodlands and where they are found there in large numbers, it's wise to scatter poison along the fence rows or borders of these places, sometimes taking in a considerable margin.

**MANURE WORTH \$15.00 PER COW PER YEAR**

How dairy farmers can make \$15 more per cow each year by saving and spreading good old-fashioned manure is told by J. L. Thomas, Dairy Specialist in the Extension Service. "An average cow produces about 10 tons of manure annually," he declares, "and at least half of this can be saved if suitable barns and lots are provided and the herd managed properly. Manure is worth about \$3 per ton if applied on land. An example of its value is found in Franklin county where Ross Newsome has been conducting a cropping demonstration involving the use of manure for three years. He scattered ten tons each year on each of 3 acres. In 1925, before the manure was applied, this land produced one-third of a bale of cotton to the acre; in 1926 it raised 30 bushels of corn per acre; in 1927 more than a half a bale of cotton; and last year Mr. Newsome gathered 52 bushels of corn to the acre."

**STAKING AND PRUNING GIVES BETTER TOMATOES**

"In setting out tomatoes it's a good plan to plant them about two feet apart in the row, which is closer than is ordinarily advised, and later stake them. This increases the number of vines that can be grown in the garden, puts the fruit up where it is easy to gather and to spray, and makes pruning easy," says the horticulturist in the Extension Service, J. F. Rosborough. "Four-foot stakes should be used, driving them into the soil three or four inches away from the plants. Coarse twine or cloth strings are used for tying the plants to the stakes, and string should be carried along when pruning is done so that plants may be re-tied where needed.

"As tomato plants begin growth it is advisable to remove sucker sprouts at least once each week, otherwise these sprouts will tend to reduce the size of the fruit. It is true that pruning decreases the yield but it permits the production of earlier tomatoes and fruit that is drier and more uniform in size. Pruning should be done regularly from the beginning of the growing season, cutting off every sucker at the main stem. They emerge here at the base of the leaf."

Fly trapping to reduce screw worms that infest sores of live stock sometimes causing death and always resulting in various kinds of losses, has been conducted on a systematic scale by about 20 ranchers in Menard county for three years in co-operation with W. R. Nisbet, county agent. A total of 300 traps have been kept baited and periodically emptied by a man employed for the purpose, with results so favorable that the work is continuing this year. Screw worm cases were cut in half last year within the trapped area.

Meat loaf or roll is an economical meat dish. Some of the cheaper nuts can be used in making it. All that is not eaten hot is useful for cold slices, sandwiches, or hash. Any lean meat may be used. Allow a medium-sized onion to each 2 pounds of meat, and 1 egg to hold the chopped meat together. Fine dry bread-crumbs and any preferred seasoning may be added.

After an apple pie is baked, lay thin slices of cheese over the top and put in a very moderate oven until the cheese is melted. Serve at once while the cheese is warm.

**WHAT'S DOING IN WEST TEXAS**

CARBON saw the installation of a cream route on April 22, this is the result of co-operation of the community club with farmers. O. Stone and County Agent, Patterson, made a canvas of the territory south and west of Carbon and reported at a meeting of the club presided over by S. P. Rumph that conditions were favorable.

ROCHESTER is laying claim to being the smallest town in the world with talking pictures. Greenwale, owner of the Rochester Theatre says that the newly installed machinery will make it possible to feature all the latest telephone pictures. All talking pictures will be shown, the first three nights of the week.

SWEETWATER'S band will be in charge of Geo. H. Winter after May 1. Winter has a record of 24 years in band experience in university and industrial organizations. He was leader of four different army bands during the war. He will conduct classes in band and orchestra instruments at his Municipal Building offices.

MUNDAY will keep several hundred dollars at home since the establishment of a modern laundry there by Miss Jewell McKee of Knox City. The capacity of the plant will be increased as fast as the patronage justifies. The plant is equipped with several washing machines and a drying closet.

WINTERS will hold an annual "Living at Home Fair" beginning with June 20, 21, and 22, of this year. Exhibits by communities and individuals, 4-H Clubs, vocational agricultural judging contests, short courses and field day, a "Live at Home" Banquet and the opening of the airport will be featured.

STEPHENVILLE will start work on the paving of 70,000 square yards of brick pavement to begin soon. The contract went to the Thurber Brick Company whose price on concrete was \$2.01 for six inch thickness reinforced with 40 pound steel. The paving will amount to between six and ten miles.

**To Train Speed Under Best Conditions**  
 railway beds have been made as perfect as possible; when they have been straightened and as practicable leveled, and the best types of locomotives have been devised, how fast can we be able to carry us? In answer to this question, based on scientific examination of the rails involved, is furnished by authority on facts relating to railroads. One hundred miles an hour is the limit of speed suggested. For every important question that comes out of the first is: Within distance can a train run in an hour, or but little less than that, under the most favorable conditions a distance of nearly a mile would be required. ONE INVESTMENT THAT PAYS BIG DIVIDENDS

As a general rule, it is safe to avoid any suggested investment that pays more than an ordinary dividend. There is one investment, however, that has been known to pay more than 100 per cent annum, and is considered safe by thousands who have made investigations.

Only recently we received a report of a farmer in Texas who invested a few dollars in terracing a 26-acre field. He planted this field to cotton. He also planted the adjoining 50 acres to cotton, using the same kind of seed and giving them the same kind of cultivation.

We suggest to this farmer that he terrace his 50-acre field, and try turning under some green crops, legumes, preferred, and then note the difference in the yield the following season.

When seedling plants of tomato, cabbage, lettuce, and melon are found cut off near the ground, it is fairly certain that cutworms are the offenders. A poisoned-bran bait, made of 5 pounds of dry bran, 1-4 pound of white arsenic or Paris green, 1 pint of syrup or molasses, and 3 or 4 quarts of water, will kill the cutworms.

SOMETHING MUST BE DONE TO IMPROVE FARMERS SHAPE

The most complex and vexing politico economic problem of America today is the insecurity of American agriculture. For years this problem has engaged the attention of serious leaders of all shades of political and economic opinion.

The "Cooperative Pattern in Cotton," by Professor R. H. Montgomery of the University of Texas is the most brilliant and most concrete contribution to the discussion that has thus far appeared in print.

The book relates the intimate life history of the largest of the Southern co-operatives, the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association. The story of the organization of this Association (and, by analogy, of other large scale cotton co-operatives), its trials and tribulations, its rapidly expanding program of service functions for the farmer, its hopes and fears, its successes and failures, are portrayed in vivid and sympathetic style.

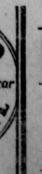
