**Harvest Remains Slow**

Slightly less than 2800 bales have been ginned here as cotton is very late and opening slowly due to cool nights. Only the early cotton is being harvested and is selling above the support bringing about \$1.55 for 500 lb bale. Some 1800 Mexican Nationals are here and the total for the season is expected to be quite a bit less than last year.

Last week end was a good business period but not up to par for the same time last year. Harvest hands were "milling" in the streets but not buying heavily.

Area farmers are "sweating" out the killing freeze date -- hoping it waits until spring. The average date is Nov. 4th but mid-October freeze would reduce the harvest greatly. Farmers are busy getting ready to strip and some are defoliating. The crop is estimated as far above average -- if the freeze is late.

**MAHON SEEKS INCREASE IN '62 COTTON ALLOTMENT**

Washington, D. C. — Representative George Mahon advises that he has urged Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman to fix the national cotton acreage allotment for the 1962 crop at a higher level than the 1961 allotment and in no case to reduce it. The 1961 allotment is 18,400,000 acres. The Secretary is required to make his decision by Oct. 15.

Mr. Mahon said that a moderate increase in 1962 over 1961 is necessary in order to make sure that the American cotton producer will be able to maintain his fair share of the world market in addition to supplying domestic needs. He said that a reduction would stimulate foreign production and be unacceptable to domestic growers.

Cotton growers and producers have appealed to Members of Congress and government officials in regard to the cotton acreage matter. Mahon stated that he had discussed the matter with various officials of the Department of Agriculture in addition to the Secretary of Agriculture and had wired the President and discussed the acreage situation with members of the White House staff.

**STATE HELPS CITIES HIT BY THE BIG BLOW**

Austin — Carla has since gone but her aftermath lingers on. A month after the big blow, a clear picture of the havoc she wrecked has emerged as state and local public health personnel continue with the rehabilitation work.

Part of Carla's wrath took the form of destroyed foods and drugs, extensive damage to water and sewage treatment plants and the exposure of thousands of people to the threat of disease.

Food and drug inspectors working the disaster area from Corpus Christi to Galveston report great losses from flooding and interrupted refrigeration. Inspectors face the double problem of inspecting and embargoing damaged and tainted merchandise and preventing scavenging among discarded goods at city disposal grounds.

The amount of food condemned as unfit for human consumption by reason of storm caused contamination will total millions of pounds before investigations are completed.

Damaged water and sewerage systems were quickly restored by highly trained municipal plant operators who pulled the motors and dried them out.

**FLU IS DUE TO HIT AREA**

Austin — Between now and mid-December is the critical period for taking immunizing shots against influenza. Flu is particularly for people in "high risk groups."

Health and medical authorities are in unanimous agreement as to the probability of an upswing in flu this fall and winter. Especially vulnerable are people with heart disease, pulmonary disease, diabetes and other chronic illnesses, persons over 65 and pregnant women.

Most of the 86,000 flu-triggered deaths between September 1957 and March 1960 were among people in these categories.

Some Asian flu outbreaks are expected, since they come in two to three year cycles. Also Texas is due for Type B flu outbreaks which usually come in four to six year cycles. Asian flu has been dormant in Texas since March 1960 and it has been more than six years since Type B has caused much of a flurry.

State Health Department officials say susceptible persons should be vaccinated early for maximum protection. Generally the most troublesome time for flu in Texas is toward the latter part of December.

To reduce the hazards to persons in high risk categories, it is recommended that they be immunized with a multiple virus vaccine — a product which will protect against more than one form of the disease well before the beginning of the flu season. Protective antibodies usually develop within two weeks after inoculation so it is important that the vaccine be administered before epidemics occur.

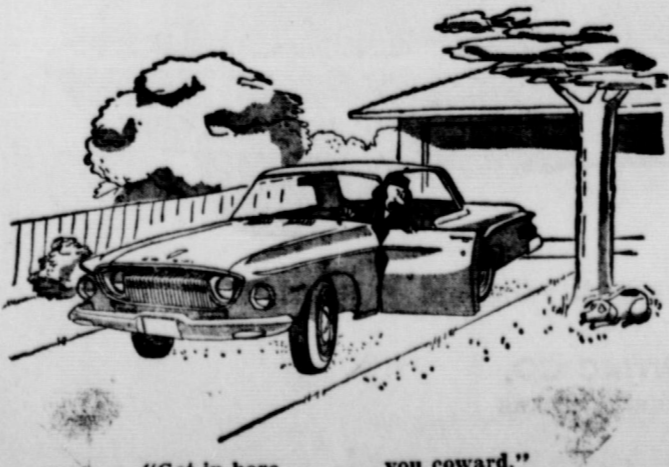

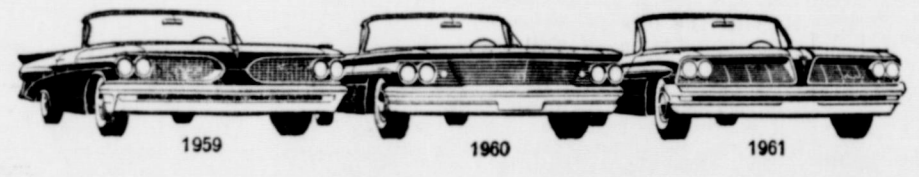

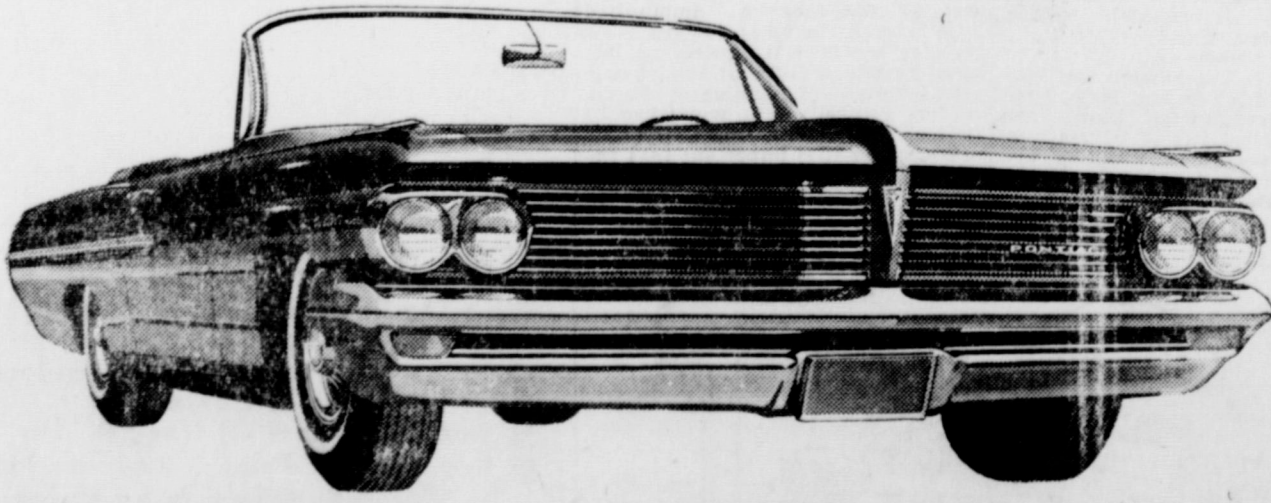

 regularly for infestations of these  
 pests. If they are discovered in the  
 grain, the storage structure should be  
 fumigated immediately. For further
