NINE ACCIDENTS IN LYNN CO. LAST MONTH

The Highway Patrol investigated 9 accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of October, according to Captain E. L. Posey, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area. These wrecks accounted for four persons injured and a property damage of \$5,110.00.

With the indications that fall has changed into winter, it is time for our driving habits to change with it. Here are some tips to help the driver winterize his driving.

1. Frost or ice on bridges means to slow down before you reach the bridge. It is too late to do anything once you are on the slick surface.

2. Check your exhaust system thoroughly. Do not risk carbon monoxide poisoning.

3. Be extra careful at railroad crossings with windows up. In a sealed car you cannot hear the train.

4. Check the windshield wipers now. They will be carrying an increasing load from now on.

5. Clear all fog or any form of precipitation off windows. Do not just rub a small hole to peep thru. Use defrosters to help keep the windshield clear.

6. Make a definite, conscious attempt to adapt your driving habits to the changing season. Your life may depend on it.

THANKFUL FOR ERA OF BETTER PUBLIC HEALTH

Our forefathers proclaimed Thanksgiving Day for the purpose of expressing thanks, not only for the bountiful harvest but for the sturdy health and endurance that had permitted them to survive the hardships and exposure, that first rigorous year in America. Texans, this Thanksgiving Day, have much to be thankful for in the way of personal health and health of our communities. Increased standards of living and improved hospital facilities have given our infants a better chance of survival, our children and adolescents a healthier, happy life and our grownups longer life and usefulness.

Figures revealed by State Health Department show what strides have been made toward keeping our population alive and healthy. A few developments for which we should be particularly thankful are: Nearly one half million normal healthy babies were born to Texas parents during the two year period between Sept. 1, 1958 and August 31, 1960. This adds up to an average of 682 babies born each day. Only 151,000 Texans died during the same period, a ratio of more than three births to every death.

The excess of births over deaths during the two year period added some 347,000 to the State's population. That increase combined with newcomers now making their home in Texas swelled the population to 9.5 million. During the last 25 years deaths during the first year of life have dropped from 71 per thousand to less than 29 per thousand. And maternal deaths have dropped from 6.9 per thousand to a ratio of 0.3 per thousand.

Mr. Askew was a well known area pioneer, civic leader of his community and a man beloved by his neighbors and friends down thru forty years.

FOOD FADS NOT WISE

According to an advertisement for a book extolling the virtues of fruit and vegetable juices, fresh raw fruit juice can be described as Nature's atomic cleanser and fresh raw vegetable juice as its atomic regenerator. Such statements have little basis in fact although raw vegetables and fruit are necessary to a balanced diet supplementing other kinds of food.

Relying on a single food or food group is a common type of food fad practiced in the United States. There are dozens of fad diets -- high protein, no starch, no meat, yogurt -- many of which incorporate the use of supporters or so-called food supplements.

Food supplements come in many forms. They can be taken as a liquid, a powder mixed with liquid -- or most common -- as vitamin pills.

The advertising of some dietary supplements proclaims the fact that they are derived from natural vitamins, minerals or other nutrients with organic fertilizers and never exposed to any insect or other spray.

The fact is vitamins, no matter what their original source, constitute only the value of the actual vitamins, minerals or other nutrients from which they are compounded. In other words, vitamin B 1 is the same whether it is chemically produced or broken down from an organic food source.

The American food supply is the best in the world. Adequate use of common foods will supply all nutritional needs of the majority of persons. Yet millions of Americans are wasting money on various special foods and vitamin mixtures.

Our American tax system depends upon the voluntary compliance by tax payers. The Extension Service people are to be commended on doing their part to promote a better understanding of the tax laws. When a tax payer understands the tax law he can pay all the tax he owes but he won't pay more than he owes.









For something different, hollow out two heads of red cabbage and fill each with one of these delectable dips. Set the cabbage heads on large platters and surround with crackers.



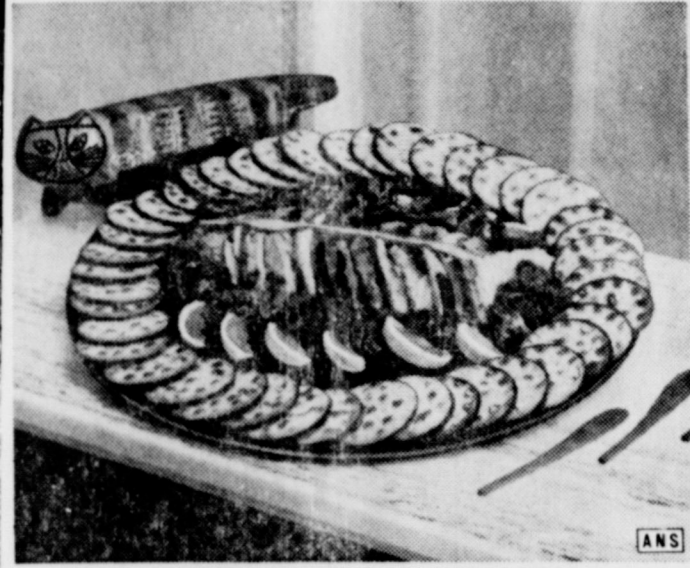
HOLIDAY DIP
