Coffee and tea are not neces sarily safe because of boiling, and carbonated or noncarbonated soft drinks from unfamiliar sources should be avoided. And dor't forget that ice cubes from polluted water can contaminate any drink.

Unless you are sure that the local milk is absolutely safe, and that the custards, ice cream, ect. made from safe milk, you had bet-ter steer clear of them.

It is well to know which foods are most susceptible to bacterial growth as these are especially dangerous unless they are properly prepared, handled, and stored.

Egg and milk mixtures, including custards and mayonnaise type salad dressings, ham, turkey and chicken, either in salads or sandwiches, and potato salad - - one of the popular picnic foods - - are often quickly suspected, when food infections occur in summer.

Ham sandwiches used to be considered safe because of the slow salt laden curing methods employed in the past. But, today, most hams are tenderized and are subject to spoilage without proper refrigera-
