The speed of the press ranges from 3,000 to 8,000 impressions per hour and is completely automatic printing in multicolors. Printing from a photographic master or a plastic "master" the printing is sharp and needs no drying time.

Ours is the only such press between Lubbock and Big Spring. Most office and commercial forms are repeat forms. The masters are filed and quick exact reproduction in sharp printing results. The paper is printed from a rubber blanket.

Any complicated office form, letter head, envelope, etc are reproduced EXACTLY like the copy by photographic process. Such a system saves the type setting costs.

By fall The Index will have an office supply department as well.

### CARE GIVEN ON VARICOSE VEINS

With proper care and prompt treatment, varicose veins can be normal again. Varicose veins are caused by disturbances in the normal make up of the individual. Continued trouble in the veins may lead to such symptoms as pain in the legs. Swelling may occur because the skin is no longer properly nourished by the blood.

Continued malnourishment in the skin can lead to an ulcer. A danger signal for this complication is a brownish patch on the leg where the varicose veins are found.

Some of the treatments are injection of certain drugs which cause a diminishing of the bulging veins and occasional operations which tie off a portion of the affected vein. Another remedy is the bandaging of the leg with an elastic bandage to prevent some of the swelling and help overcome the back pressure and pooling of blood.

**60 PERCENT POLIO VICTIMS OF PRESCHOOL AGE**

Well over half of Texas' paralytic polio victims last year were less than five years of age, a final tabulation of the 1957 polio incidence shows. The record shows that of the 365 paralytic cases reported last year, 218 were pre-schoolers under five. That figures out to be 60 percent for Texas compared to 45 percent for the nation.

O. the remaining Texas cases, 44 were between ages 5 and 9, 23 in the 10 to 14 age group, 19 from ages 15 to 19 and 61 were over 20.

Clearly revealed is the need of emphasis on immunization of pre-school children, while at the same time keeping in mind that everyone up to 40 years of age should take the series of three shots.

Parents must take the initiative in seeing that their children are properly immunized.

Since the initiation of the 7 Step Cotton Program 12 years ago by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the average lint yield per harvested acre in the State has climbed from 134 pounds in 1946 to 251 pounds for 1957. The program brings together on the county and state basis committees representing every segment of the cotton industry. They work for the betterment of their industry.


