

Well over half of Texas' paralytic polio victims last year were less than five years of age, a final tabulation of the 1957 polio incidence shows. The record shows that of the 365 paralytic cases reported last year, 218 were pre-snhoolers under five. That figures out to be 60 percent for Texas compared to 45 percent for the nation.
