

Dr. Howard C. Key, Texas State College English professor, has been collecting stories about violent storms for 30 years tells the following "Twister Tales" relating the best of the more than a 1,000 yarns he has heard about tornadoes.

"Tornadoes are pretty much like people," Dr. Key says. "They have their likes and dislikes, their whims and ambitions, their impulses good and bad. They are all individuals."

From the folklore he has gathered, he made this psychoanalysis of the tornado personality:

1. Tornadoes are partial to infants. He has collected 32 stories about miraculous preservation of infants. One tornado skipping thru southeastern Kansas about 50 years ago gathered a six week old infant out of its cradle and deposited him unscathed but plastered with mud in a haystack a mile away.

2. A gentler aspect of the twister is its regard for flowers. On more than one occasion, houses and furniture have been scattered over many acres but a vase of roses will be left on the living room table. Dr. Key has heard this story from four states: Arkansas, Oklahoma, Texas and Louisiana.

3. But chickens and farm animals, tornadoes do not care for at all. One well authenticated storm picked a whole flock of 30 chickens absolutely clean and left them bolt upright, but dead, on their perches. Another whimsical funnel popped a rooster into a jug leaving only his head sticking out.

A farmer and his mule were yanked into the air by the wind, and somewhere aloft set the farmer down on the mule's back. The pair landed right side up about half a mile away but the mule hit the ground running and put another five miles between himself and home before stopping.

4. Tornadoes have a certain artistic quality. Here's what William Porter told of a 1893 tornado in Cisco, Texas —

"He found that instead of running toward the back room as he intended, he was waving his arms and legs somewhere in midair. Seconds later he slammed into some object that felt like a wire fence. Then he heard music and decided he was either dead or dying."

"It was their new player piano, the kind that had to be pumped with foot pedals. The suction of the storm had somehow started it going and it was appropriately playing 'Near My God to Thee' Both Mr. Porter and the piano were lodged in a big pecan tree 50 yards away. Neither was much damaged."

5. Tornadoes can be accommodating. One lady in a farm town had written her sister in Ponca City, Okla. 35 miles away. The letter was lying stamped and addressed on the dining room table and disappeared when a storm struck. The letter fell unopened in Ponca City in the yard of a neighbor only a block away from its intended address.

6. Tornadoes like to showoff. An eastbound Northern Pacific locomotive was unoccupied from its freight cars by a twister which set it down full steam ahead on a parallel track headed west. Tornadoes in East Texas and Arkansas have turned cast iron washpots inside out. One in central Kansas 40 years ago whipped together the branches of a 50 ft. cottonwood tree and dropped a cast iron wagon wheel over it the way you would put a ring on your finger.

## RADIATION CAN BENEFIT AND HARM MODERN MAN

Austin — For the past two weeks the Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee has been holding hearings in Washington in an attempt to unravel one of the knottiest problems of the day — the dangers of mass radiation exposures in this Atomic Age.

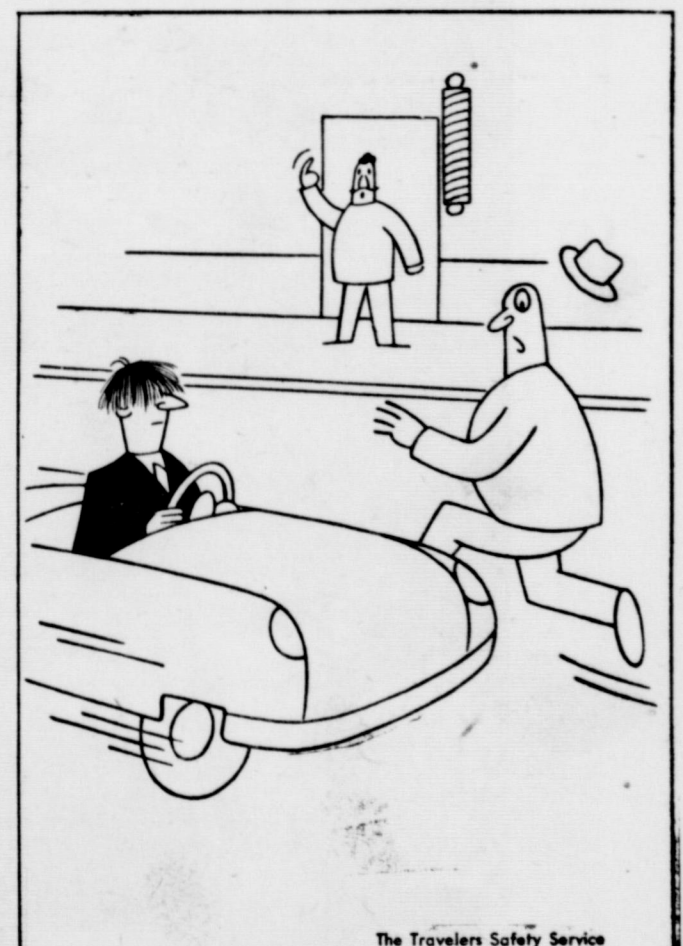
The committee is interested chiefly in the effects of radioactive "fall-out" from nuclear weapons tests, but there is much more to the story than that. The very nature of radiant energy makes it at once a boon and a peril to human health. Let's look at the "boon" side first.

For 60 years radiating devices in the skilled hands of technicians have been tools of unparalleled importance in diagnosing and treating various diseases. X-ray and fluoroscopic machines actually permit the physician or dentist to "photograph" the interior of the human body and aim beams of deep penetrating rays — sometimes pushed by 2 million volts of electricity — have long been among the most effective ways of treating diseases in practically any body organ.

These endless advantages are the reasons for possible peril. Radioactivity can accumulate in the body so little exposures from day to day may add up to big exposures after weeks or months. However, physicians take total exposure into account when they use radiation.

Since September the State Health Department has controlled radiation devices and materials used with the state. So far more than 1500 devices and materials have been registered, some 1400 of them in the realm of medical practice and research.

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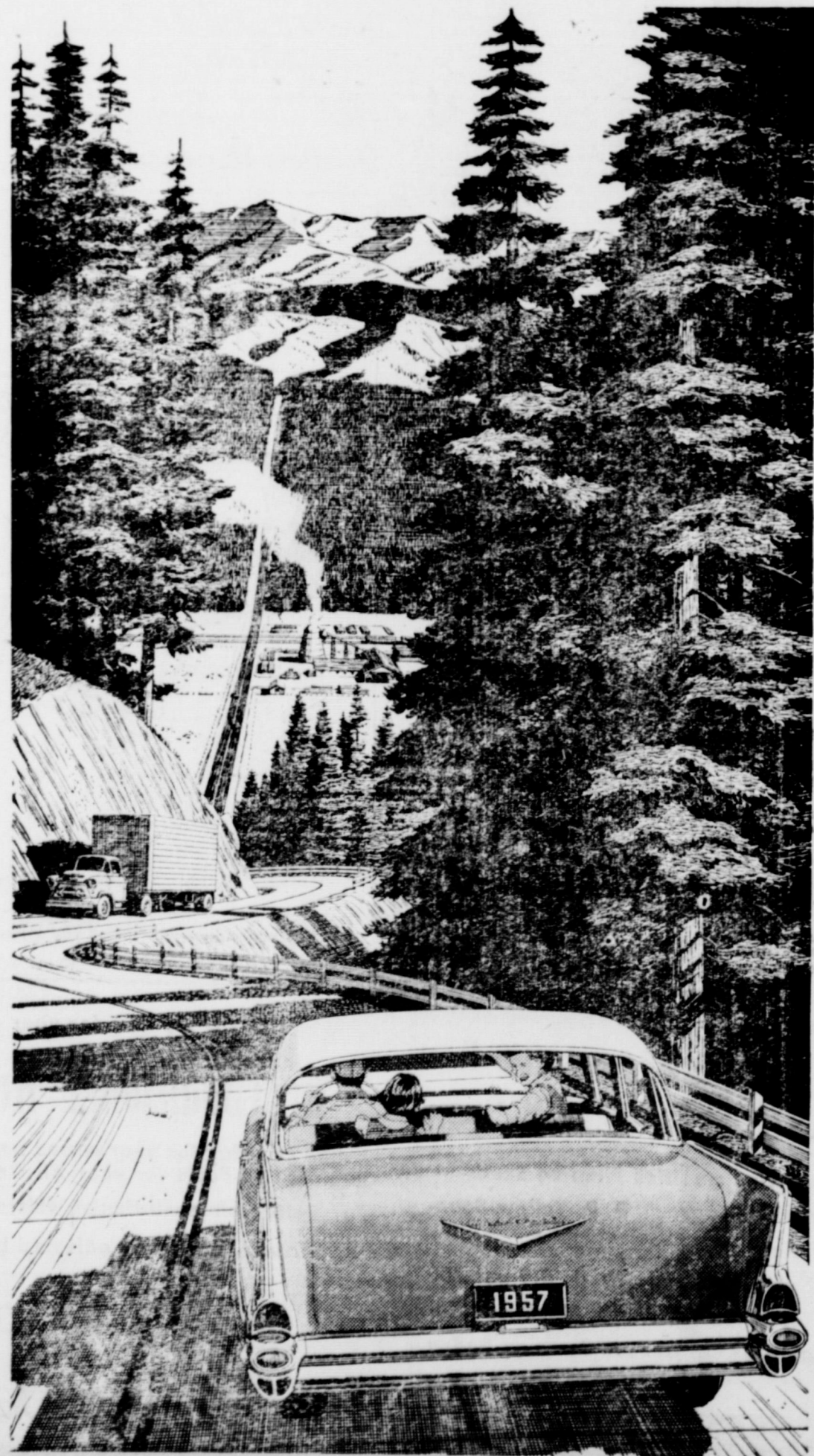

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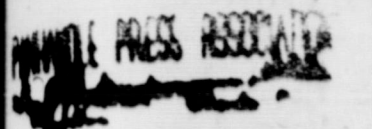

**S. S. Man Here 19th**

A representative of the Lubbock  
 Social Security office will be in O'  
 Donnell on June 19th at 3 p. m. at  
 the Elementary School and will be  
 glad to assist in all matters per-  
 taining to social security. More  
 than 100,000 severely disabled peo-  
 ple in communities all over the  
 nation will receive their first S. S.  
 disability insurance checks in Aug-  
 ust. But many other eligible dis-  
 abled workers 50 to 65 years of  
 age, some of them living in Texas,  
 have so far failed to make applica-  
 tion to their S. S. offices. Those who  
 have been disabled for work for a  
 long time must apply before June  
 30th or they will lose their rights  
 to these new benefits.

Any severely disabled person  
 who has worked under social secur-  
 ity for at least 5 years and who has  
 been disabled for 6 months or more  
 should get in contact with his S. S.  
 office right away. If he is between  
 50 and 65 years of age, he may be  
 eligible to have his S. S. record fro-  
 zen to protect his future right to  
 disability payments and also his  
 and his family's rights to old age  
 and survivors insurance benefits.

To be disabled under S. S. law  
 a worker must be unable to engage  
 in any substantial gainful activity.  
 It must be the kind of physical or  
 mental condition which shows up  
 in medical evidence and must have  
 lasted for at least six months.
