March 2, 1885 was a busy, happy day at Austin, Texas. On that day, 20,000 people gathered watch the impressive ceremonies celebrating the laying of the corner stone of the Texas State Capitol Building. The huge 18.000 pound d granite stone was hauled es from the quarries near Marble alls to Burnet by 15 yoke of oxen, was loaded onto a new railroad Burnet and was taken to Austin he railroad was built expressly to andle the huge blocks of Texas red anite that were used in building

The building was completed in September, 1888 at a cost of 3 million acres of Texas public lands that were set aside for that purpose by the State Constitution of 1876.

Texas Capitol is situated The Texas Capitol Is n a 26 acre site overlooking down own Austin. The largest State apitol Building in the nation is 09 feet high, 574 feet long and is st 300 feet wide.

It contains a total of 409 rooms, vaults. 924 windows and 404 ors. The building itself covers acres of grounds and its four pries contain approximately 18 res of floor space. The wainsing of the interior has an agregate length of 7 miles.

The Capitol is in the shape of Greek cross. At the center of the oss is a huge circular chamber or tunda which rises to the top of e dome. The terrazza floor in the otunda shows in mosaic designs, seals of the six nations ave ruled in Texas at various
