STATE LAW GIVEN ON SCHOOL

BUS TRAFFIC

Texas school superintendents. news editors and other citizens have been requested to give state-wide emphasis and interpretation to the oft neglected Texas law which requires all vehicles to stop when approaching a school bus loading unloading children. Three state agen cies - The Texas Education Agency, the Texas Highway Department and the Texas Department of Public Safe-ty — joined in making the appeal.

Texas school buses were involved in 379 accidents in rural areas (out side city limits) during 1955. Three children and two adults were killed in these accidents.

The law says, in effect, that upon meeting or overtaking from either direction a school bus which has stopped on the highway or rural road for the purpose of receiving or dis-charging children, the driver shall stop immediately before passing, then proceed with due caution at a speed which is prudent and does not exceed 16 miles per hour.



#### A PECULIAR PEOPLE

From Titus 2:14 we learn that Christ gave himself for us that he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works. The Lord's people, therefore, are supposed to be "peculiar",

We usually think of peculiar people as people who are queer or eccentric, but the word "peculiar" is never used in this sense by the writers of the New Testament. The apostle Peter tells us why the Lord's people are peculiar.

Forasmuch then as Christ hath suffered for us in the flesh, arm yourselve slikewise with the same mind: for he that hath suffered in the flesh hath ceased from sin; that he no longer should live the rest of his time in the flesh to the lusts of men. but to the will of God. For the time past of our life may suffice us to have wrought the will of the Gentiles, when we walled in lasciviousness, lusts, excess of wine, revellings, banquetings and abominable idolatries; wherein THEY THINK IT STRANGE THAT YE RUN NOT WITH THEM TO THE SAME EXCESS OF RIOT . . . (I Peter 4:1-4).

The Lord's people are peculiar because they are not controlled by the lusts of the flesh, but by the will of God. This way of life is diametrically opposed to the common practice of mankind, but it is a way of life that will bring us the happiness and peace of mind that is so desperately sought after by all of God's children.
