Meeting in a called session at Plainview Saturday morning, direct-ors of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority passed a resolution giving formal notice to the 11 mem-ber cities that the board intends to call an election on a contract with the United States government to fi-nance the Canaidan River dam and reservoir project and an adequate system to furnish the cities with

water. The meeting followed in the wake of House approval Friday of a \$300.-000 appropriation for advance planning on the project. The project was authorized by Congress by an act effective December 19, 1950.

Capacity Is Noted

The board's resolution, a statu-tory requirement, gave notice that the election would be called at the next directors meeting on September 12.

The hoard's resolution gives the cities notice that the reimbursable cost of the project will total an es-timated \$93 million and that the reservoir will provide 500,000 acre feet of conservation storage, 405 .-000 acre feet of sediment storage and 1.505 acre feet of dead storage with a dependable yield of 103,000 acre feet of water for the cities an-

nually. In addition to the dam and reervoir, the contract on which the cities will vote also will provide financing for the acquaduct system approximately 200 miles in length and pumping facilities at various points



RAINS, WIND, HAIL DOTTED HIGH PLAINS LAST WEEK

Rains, wind and hail dotted the High Plains Area during the past week. Over the remainder of the area hot, dry weather continued to provide much needed cotton maturing conditions. Thirps and fleahoppers have

passed out of the pest picture as far as this seaosn is concerned. When conidering the age of the squure damaged by fleahopper, the time required for this square to make cotton and the remaining cotton

cotton and the remaining cotton growing days, it is evident, that under normal conditions these pests are no longer of concern. Bollworm infestations are caus-ing severe damage in many cotton plantings in this area. The build up of this pest has been very erratic with medium-heavy infestations re-ported in Lynn, Crosby, Garza, Col-lingsworth, Midalnd, Reagan, Fish-er, Gaines, and Hockley counties. er, Gaines, and Hockley counties. Most of the eggs are being placed in the square or young bolls. If terminal inspections do not show

on the bracts, bloooms, and bolls. At the very first sign of any eggs or small worms be sure to check the squares an blooms closely for eggs and small worms. Con-siderable problems in obtaining sat-isfactory control have been noted where the worms were allowed to become large before control meausures were taken and due to the placement of the eggs down in the

plant where getting the insecticide on the worm is a bigger problem. Medium to heavy cabbage looper infestations have been reported in Lynn, Dawson and Yoakum counties. Considerable ragging has been noted in cotton plantings in many areas. These pests should be pois-oned when the worms are small to

obtain satisfactory control. Aphid builds ups have been prominent in some cases where bollworm contorl measuers have been taken. In case of heavy aphid eting and Research".
