Warns About Kites

Safety rules for boys and girls who fly kites were outlined today by James Lemons, manager for Tex as Electric Service Co., in anticipat ion of the opening of ehe 1954 kite flying season.

As explained by Mr. Lemons, the five safety rules in order of their importance are:

First, fly your kite out in the open where it won't get caught in wires or trees. Second, use only string made of cotton, silk, linen, nylon or rayon. Third, use only wood in your kite frames. Fourth, fly kites only in good weather. You don't want to get them rain soaked. And fifth, if your kite should get caught in electric wires, call the Texas Electric Service Co. They will send someone to get it down for you
