Two Men Lost Lives in Blizzard Last Week

SEARCHING PARTIES FIND BODIES BILL WALKER AND L. J. MARTIN SUNDAY

This community, which has had its share of tragedies, was stunned and shocked Sunday morning when searching parties at last found the bodies of Bill Walker, 39, and L. J. Martin, 22, who lost their lives on Friday night in the blizzard which swept this section.

Bodies of the two were found within a hundred feet of each other, and less than a mile from shelter which they could have found in an abandoned farm home. Scores of men from Lamesa, O'Donnell, and their own community. Harmony had been combing the canyons and prairies for hours in the vain hope that they might have taken refuge in some more sheltered nook and still have survived the fury of the storm.

The two, accompanied by two companions, John Hemmingsway and Hubert Walker, had made a business trip to Lamesa early Friday, and hurrying to reach their homes and families before the worst of the storm, had taken a little-used cut-off road across the ranch. The engine of the car failed as they came out of the canyon, and the four spent some time trying to start it and continue the journey. Falling in this, they then started walking toward the house just as the worst of the storm broke, and were able to see the others some distance back down the trail. They waited several minutes, and when they failed to arrive at the shelter, it was presumed that they had gone on to an abandoned house, whose lights could be seen occasionally through the snow, in the hope that they might secure assistance in reaching their homes. The two men accordingly left their refuge, and themselves went on to the house, learning that the others had not

reached there. By that time no one could face the storm, either aboard or in cars, so they remained with the family until morning, when they went on home.

A search was immediately started for the lost men, but their bodies were not found until Sunday morning.

Double Funeral Rites Tuesday
The bodies were brought to O'Donnell, from where a Higginbotham Funeral Home car took them to Lamesa. Funeral rites were held Tuesday afternoon at Harmony, eight miles southeast of here. Hundreds of friends gathered to pay their respects and to offer condolences to the bereaved families.

Rev. J. H. Crawford of the Methodist Church led in the last tributes.

Mr. Walker is survived by his wife and nine children, the oldest of whom is a member of this graduating class here.

Mr. Martin, who was a student in the public schools here and who was married to Miss Beverly Bingham about a year ago, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George J. Martin.

Both men come from prominent families of this section. The Walker family came here many years ago, and its members have for years taken a leading part in affairs of their community. During his school days here, L. J. was one of the most popular students, among his classmates and teachers alike. The tragedy would have been shocking in any circumstances, but in view of the prominence and popularity of both men, it has stunned the entire community.

Friends Pay Tribute
Many and varied have been the tributes paid to the two by their friends and acquaintances throughout the community.

Rollin McCord Enters Race For District Attorney



County Attorney Rollin McCord authorized the Index this week to list his name in our regular candidate column as an aspirant to the office of district attorney of the 106th judicial district, which embraces the counties of Dawson, Guiness, Yoakum, Terry, Lynn and Garza.

Rollin expects to make a very active and thorough canvass of the district in the interest of his candidacy. He already has a wide acquaintance throughout the district, having had occasion to attend many public gatherings of various kinds in many communities in this portion of the South Plains. He has also gained a wide acquaintance through his activities as county at-

torney of Lynn county and through his attendance upon the courts.

Rollin McCord was practically reared in this county. Coming to the county with his parents when he was a mere child, he received his common school education in this county. Later he attended several institutions of higher learning, included in his college training was a course in law, but he did not begin the practice of this profession immediately after his college work. On the other hand he accepted a job of quite a different type and made good in it. During this time he married and he and his bride soon thereafter came to Tahoka to make this their home.

In due time, Mr. McCord took the bar examination and was admitted to the practice of the law, hanging out his shingle in Tahoka something more than four years ago. Soon thereafter he became a candidate for county attorney and was nominated in the primaries of 1936. Taking office the first of January, 1937. He is now serving his second term in that position, having been re-elected without opposition.

In the performance of his duties as county attorney, Mr. McCord has never permitted himself to become the tool of those seeking revenge or undertaking to vent their spleen upon some one. He has prosecuted only such offenders as really appeared to be willful violators of the law. He has been scrupulously fair with those accused of minor offenses. He can be depended upon to carry the same spirit of fairness into the work of the district attorney's office in the event of his election. On the other hand, he promises to represent the State to the very best of his ability in all cases coming up for prosecution in the district courts of his district.

On his record as a man and an official, he is making the race for district attorney, and he will appreciate the vote and active support of every voter in the district.

SALARY AID PAYMENT IS MADE TO TEACHERS

AUSTIN, Feb. 16.—Payment of the first 50 per cent of teacher salary aid from rural school aid funds amounting to \$1,672,703, was announced Friday by State Superintendent of Public Instruction L. A. Woods.

State school officials said they hoped it would be possible to pay the entire 1939-40 salary and instead of a reduced percentage, due to lack of funds, as in the past.
